## Confluence as a Noun

### Definitions of "Confluence" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “confluence” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A flowing together.*
- *A place where things merge or flow together (especially rivers).*
- *An act or process of merging.*
- *The junction of two rivers, especially rivers of approximately equal width.*
- *A coming together of people.*



## Synonyms of "Confluence" as a noun (8 Words)

- concourse** A wide hallway in a building where people can walk.  
*A vast **concourse** of onlookers.*
- conflux** A flowing together.
- convergence** The act of converging (coming closer).  
*These bivalves have assumed similar characters by **convergence**.*
- joining** A set containing all and only the members of two or more given sets.  
*The **joining** of hands around the table.*
- junction** The action or fact of joining or being joined.  
*The **junction** of Queen s Road and Lancaster Avenue.*
- meeting** The social act of assembling for some common purpose.  
*Next year the **meeting** will be in Chicago.*
- merging** The act of joining together as one.  
*The **merging** of the two groups occurred quickly.*

**watersmeet** A place where two streams meet.



### Usage Examples of "Confluence" as a noun

- *Pittsburgh is located at the confluence of the Allegheny and Monongahela rivers.*
- *A major confluence of the world's financial markets.*
- *The confluence of the Rivers Ouse and Foss.*
- *Farther down the Tigris at its confluence with the Euphrates.*





## Associations of "Confluence" (30 Words)

**beck**      A beckoning gesture.

<b>brook</b>	A natural stream of water smaller than a river (and often a tributary of a river. <i>The Lake District boasts lovely lakes and babbling <b>brooks</b>.</i>
<b>carp</b>	Raise trivial objections.
<b>creek</b>	Any member of the Creek Confederacy (especially the Muskogee) formerly living in Georgia and Alabama but now chiefly in Oklahoma. <i>A sandy beach in a sheltered <b>creek</b>.</i>
<b>downstream</b>	Situated in or towards the part of a sequence of genetic material where transcription takes place later than at a given point. <i>Deforestation could have disastrous consequences for <b>downstream</b> regions.</i>
<b>eel</b>	Used in names of unrelated fishes that resemble the true eels e.g electric eel moray eel.
<b>erosion</b>	Erosion by chemical action. <i>The problem of soil <b>erosion</b>.</i>
<b>estuary</b>	The tidal mouth of a large river, where the tide meets the stream.
<b>flow</b>	The rate or speed at which something flows. <i>The museum had planned carefully for the <b>flow</b> of visitors.</i>
<b>fluvial</b>	Of or found in a river. <i><b>Fluvial</b> deposits.</i>
<b>ford</b>	A shallow area in a stream that can be forded.
<b>inlet</b>	An arm off of a larger body of water (often between rocky headlands). <i>An air <b>inlet</b>.</i>
<b>irrigate</b>	Supply with a constant flow or sprinkling of some liquid, for the purpose of cooling, cleansing, or disinfecting. <i><b>Irrigate</b> the wound.</i>
<b>irrigation</b>	(medicine) cleaning a wound or body organ by flushing or washing out with water or a medicated solution. <i>The river supplies water for <b>irrigation</b> of agricultural crops.</i>
<b>lamprey</b>	Primitive eellike freshwater or anadromous cyclostome having round sucking mouth with a rasping tongue.
<b>loch</b>	An arm of the sea, especially when narrow or partially landlocked. <i><b>Loch</b> Lomond.</i>
<b>majority</b>	More than half of the votes. <i>In the <b>majority</b> of cases all will go smoothly.</i>
<b>raft</b>	Make into a raft. <i><b>Raft</b> wood down a river.</i>

<b>river</b>	Used in names of animals and plants living in or associated with rivers e.g. river dolphin. <i>Great <b>rivers</b> of molten lava.</i>
<b>riverbank</b>	The bank of a river.
<b>rivulet</b>	A very small river or stream. <i>Sweat ran in <b>rivulets</b> down his back.</i>
<b>sedimentary</b>	Produced by the action of water.
<b>stream</b>	Something that resembles a flowing stream in moving continuously. <i>She was <b>streaming</b> with sweat.</i>
<b>subsidence</b>	The gradual caving in or sinking of an area of land. <i>The race was abandoned because of <b>subsidence</b> of the track.</i>
<b>terrapin</b>	A type of prefabricated one-storey building for temporary use.
<b>thames</b>	The longest river in England; flows eastward through London to the North Sea.
<b>tigris</b>	An Asian river; a tributary of the Euphrates River.
<b>trout</b>	Flesh of any of several primarily freshwater game and food fishes.
<b>upstream</b>	In the opposite direction from that in which a stream or river flows; nearer to the source. <i>Watch your footing and always face <b>upstream</b>.</i>
<b>vale</b>	A valley (used in place names or as a poetic term). <i>The <b>Vale</b> of Glamorgan.</i>
