<u>observe</u>	Observe with care or pay close attention to. <i>She observed that all the chairs were already occupied.</i>

run with the pack	Be diffused.

suit	Adapt something to. <i>They took care to suit their answers to the questions put to them.</i>

Concurrence of opinion.

*There is good **accordance** between the values.*

adapt

Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions.

*A large organization can be slow to **adapt** to change.*

Deserving to be admitted.

***Admissible** evidence.*

admittedly	As acknowledged. <i>Admittedly the salary was not wonderful.</i>
<u>agree</u>	Consent or assent to a condition or agree to do something. <i>Yes dreadful isn't it she agreed.</i>
<u>agreed</u>	(of two or more parties) holding the same view or opinion on something. <i>The agreed date.</i>
<u>approbation</u>	Approval or praise. <i>A term of approbation.</i>
approval	A feeling of liking something or someone good. <i>Words of approval seldom passed his lips.</i>
approve	Prove; show. <i>They would not approve.</i>
assent	Agreement with a statement or proposal to do something. <i>Guest house then Frank assented cheerfully.</i>
<u>coincide</u>	Happen simultaneously. <i>Our views on this matter coincided.</i>
comply	Act in accordance with someone's rules, commands, or wishes. <i>We are unable to comply with your request.</i>
concur	Happen or occur at the same time; coincide. <i>That's right the chairman concurred.</i>
conformance	Correspondence in form or appearance. <i>Conformance testing.</i>
conforming	Adhering to established customs or doctrines (especially in religion).
<u>consensus</u>	A general agreement. <i>Those rights and obligations are based on an unstated consensus.</i>
<u>consent</u>	Give permission for something to happen. <i>He indicated his consent.</i>
<u>correspond</u>	Take the place of or be parallel or equivalent to. <i>My Russian pen pal and I have been corresponding for several years.</i>
<u>exactly</u>	Used to emphasize the accuracy of a figure or description. <i>They met in 1989 and got married exactly two years later.</i>
fit	Make fit. <i>Well are you fit.</i>
obediently	In an obedient manner. <i>The dog had been sitting obediently by her side.</i>
<u>obligation</u>	A debt of gratitude for a service or favour. <i>I have an obligation to look after her.</i>

ok	An expression of agreement normally occurring at the beginning of a sentence. <i>Things are okay.</i>
ratify	Approve and express assent, responsibility, or obligation. <i>Both countries were due to ratify the treaty by the end of the year.</i>
respectively	Separately or individually and in the order already mentioned (used when enumerating two or more items or facts that refer back to a previous statement). <i>The brothers were called Felix and Max respectively.</i>
unanimity	Agreement by all people involved; consensus. <i>There is almost complete unanimity on this issue.</i>
unanimously	Of one mind; without dissent. <i>A committee of MPs has unanimously agreed to back his bill.</i>
