fogey	A very old-fashioned or conservative person. <i>A bunch of old fogeys.</i>

Synonyms of "Conformist" as an adjective (10 Words)

accepted	Generally approved or compelling recognition. <i>The accepted consensus within the church.</i>
conforming	Adhering to established customs or doctrines (especially in religion. (of surgery or medical treatment) intended to control rather than eliminate a condition, with existing tissue preserved as far as possible.
conservative	<i>The film was not cheap 30 000 is a conservative estimate.</i> (of a bid) intended to convey a particular meaning according to an agreed convention.
conventional	<i>Conventional bourgeois lives.</i>
customary	In accordance with convention or custom. <i>It is customary to mark an occasion like this with a toast.</i>
established	Brought about or set up or accepted especially long established. <i>America had no established Church.</i>
normal	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Normal curiosity.</i>
orthodox	Of or pertaining to or characteristic of Judaism. <i>Orthodox medical treatment.</i>
regular	In accord with regular practice or procedure. <i>A regular soldier.</i>
standard	Conforming to or constituting a standard of measurement or value or of the usual or regularized or accepted kind. <i>It is standard practice in museums to register objects as they are acquired.</i>

accept	Make use of or accept for some purpose. <i>The college accepted her as a student.</i>

acquiesce	Accept something reluctantly but without protest. <i>Sara acquiesced in his decision.</i>

<u>agreed</u>	(of two or more parties) holding the same view or opinion on something. <i>We are agreed that what is needed is a catchy title.</i>
<u>approbation</u>	Official recognition or approval. <i>A term of approbation.</i>
approve	Prove; show. <i>The budget was approved by parliament.</i>
assent	Agreement with a statement or proposal to do something. <i>The Prime Minister assented to the change.</i>
compliance	Excessive acquiescence. <i>The appalling compliance with government views shown by the commission.</i>
compliant	Having the property of compliance. <i>Children compliant with the parental will.</i>
comply	Act in accordance with a wish or command. <i>We are unable to comply with your request.</i>
<u>configuration</u>	The fixed three-dimensional relationship of the atoms in a molecule, defined by the bonds between them. <i>The outcome depends on the configuration of influences at the time.</i>
<u>conform</u>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The changes were introduced to conform with international classifications.</i>
conformance	Correspondence in form or appearance. <i>Conformance testing.</i>
conforming	Adhering to established customs or doctrines (especially in religion).
conformism	Orthodoxy in thoughts and belief.
<u>consent</u>	Give an affirmative reply to; respond favorably to. <i>He had consented to serve as external assessor on the panel.</i>

<u>correspond</u>	Take the place of or be parallel or equivalent to. <i>Margaret corresponded with him until his death.</i>
<u>denomination</u>	A group of religious congregations having its own organization and a distinctive faith. <i>He flashed a fistful of bills of large denominations.</i>
follow	Choose and follow as of theories ideas policies strategies or plans. <i>Her bad deed followed her and haunted her dreams all her life.</i>
ideology	Imaginary or visionary theorization. <i>The ideology of republicanism.</i>
obediently	In a manner that shows willingness to comply with an order or request; submissively. <i>Obediently she slipped off her right shoe and stocking.</i>
orthodox	Relating to Orthodox Judaism. <i>An orthodox view of the world.</i>
permission	An official document giving authorization. <i>He received permission to go to Brussels.</i>
resignedly	With resignation and acceptance; in a resigned manner.
submission	The action of presenting a proposal, application, or other document for consideration or judgement. <i>What was the date of submission of your proposal.</i>
