### Synonyms of "Congeal" as a verb (12 Words)

<b>cake</b>	(of a thick or sticky substance) dry or harden into a solid mass. <i>His clothes were <b>cased</b> in mud.</i>
<b>clot</b>	Form or cause to form clots. <i>A blood protein known as factor VIII <b>clots</b> blood.</i>
<b>coagulate</b>	Cause (a fluid) to change to a solid or semi-solid state. <i><b>Coagulated</b> blood.</i>
<b>concentrate</b>	Compress or concentrate. <i>The nation s wealth was <b>concentrated</b> in the hands of the governing elite.</i>
<b>dry</b>	Remove the moisture from and make dry. <i><b>Dry</b> clothes.</i>

<b>gel</b>	Apply gel to the hair. <i>Short <b>gelled</b> hair.</i>
<b><u>harden</u></b>	Cause to accept or become hardened to habituate. <i>She <b>hardened</b> her heart.</i>
<b>jell</b>	(of a project or idea) take a definite form or begin to work well. <i>We went out there and tried to win but we just didn't <b>jell</b>.</i>
<b>set</b>	Set in type. <i>The Home Secretary <b>set</b> in motion a review of the law.</i>
<b><u>solidify</u></b>	Make solid or more solid cause to solidify. <i>Social and political pressures helped to <b>solidify</b> national identities.</i>
<b>stiffen</b>	Become stiff or stiffer. <i>He <b>stiffened</b> when he saw his boss enter the room.</i>
<b>thicken</b>	Make viscous or dense. <i><b>Thicken</b> the sauce with flour.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Congeal" as a verb

- *The ballet failed to congeal as a single oeuvre.*
- *The blood had congealed into blobs.*

## Associations of "Congeal" (30 Words)

<b><u>ancestry</u></b>	The evolutionary or genetic line of descent of an animal or plant. <i>He was proud of his Irish <b>ancestry</b>.</i>
<b>antigen</b>	Any substance (as a toxin or enzyme) that stimulates an immune response in the body (especially the production of antibodies).
<b><u>blood</u></b>	Blood samples or tests. <i>A mixed <b>blood</b>.</i>
<b>circulation</b>	Movement to and fro or around something, especially that of fluid in a closed system. <i>Three 20 minute sessions a week which make you breathe a bit harder can improve <b>circulation</b>.</i>
<b>clog</b>	Dance a clog dance. <i>The market is being <b>clogged</b> by these operations.</i>
<b>clot</b>	Form or cause to form clots. <i>A <b>clot</b> of dead leaves.</i>

<b>coagulant</b>	An agent that produces coagulation. <i>An injection of blood <b>coagulant</b>.</i>
<b>coagulate</b>	Change from a liquid to a thickened or solid state. <i>Blood had <b>coagulated</b> round the edges of the gash.</i>
<b>coagulation</b>	The process of forming semisolid lumps in a liquid. <i>A supplement that inhibits blood <b>coagulation</b>.</i>
<b>consanguineous</b>	Relating to or denoting people descended from the same ancestor. <i><b>Consanguineous</b> marriages may give rise to recessive syndromes.</i>
<b>erythrocyte</b>	A red blood cell, which (in humans) is typically a biconcave disc without a nucleus. Erythrocytes contain the pigment haemoglobin, which imparts the red colour to blood, and transport oxygen and carbon dioxide to and from the tissues.
<b>genealogy</b>	The study and tracing of lines of descent. <i>The <b>genealogies</b> of the kings of Mercia.</i>
<b>gladiator</b>	(ancient Rome) a professional combatant or a captive who entertained the public by engaging in mortal combat.
<b>hemoglobin</b>	A hemoprotein composed of globin and heme that gives red blood cells their characteristic color; function primarily to transport oxygen from the lungs to the body tissues. <i>Fish have simpler <b>hemoglobin</b> than mammals.</i>
<b>inhibitor</b>	A thing which inhibits someone or something.
<b>intercellular</b>	Located between cells. <i><b>Intercellular</b> spaces.</i>
<b>jell</b>	(of a project or idea) take a definite form or begin to work well. <i>He decided to do a different film that would <b>jell</b> at the box office.</i>
<b>jugular</b>	Of the neck or throat. <i>He always goes for the <b>jugular</b>.</i>
<b>leukocyte</b>	Blood cells that engulf and digest bacteria and fungi; an important part of the body's defense system.
<b>lipid</b>	An oily organic compound insoluble in water but soluble in organic solvents; essential structural component of living cells (along with proteins and carbohydrates).
<b>milk</b>	Any of several nutritive milklike liquids. <i>I am <b>milking</b> this for all it s worth.</i>
<b>parentage</b>	The state of being a parent. <i>This ice cream boasts American <b>parentage</b>.</i>

<b>plasma</b>	<p>A fourth state of matter distinct from solid or liquid or gas and present in stars and fusion reactors a gas becomes a plasma when it is heated until the atoms lose all their electrons leaving a highly electrified. <i>Particles in space exist in the form of a <b>plasma</b>.</i></p>
<b>primogenitor</b>	<p>An ancestor in the direct line.</p>
<b><u>progenitor</u></b>	<p>A person or thing from which a person, animal, or plant is descended or originates; an ancestor or parent. <i>His children were the <b>progenitors</b> of many of Scotland s noble families.</i></p>
<b>serum</b>	<p>The blood serum of an animal used to provide immunity to a pathogen or toxin by inoculation or as a diagnostic agent. <i>Doctors treated the bites of carpet vipers with <b>serum</b> produced from local snakes.</i></p>
<b><u>solid</u></b>	<p>Of good quality and condition solidly built. <i>A <b>solid</b> mass of flowers.</i></p>
<b>tourniquet</b>	<p>A device for stopping the flow of blood through a vein or artery, typically by compressing a limb with a cord or tight bandage.</p>
<b>transfuse</b>	<p>Pour out of one vessel into another. <i>It is usual to <b>transfuse</b> blood screened for cytomegalovirus.</i></p>
<b>transfusion</b>	<p>The introduction of blood or blood plasma into a vein or artery. <i>Major bleeding necessitating <b>transfusions</b>.</i></p>
