- *Come together, usually for a purpose.*

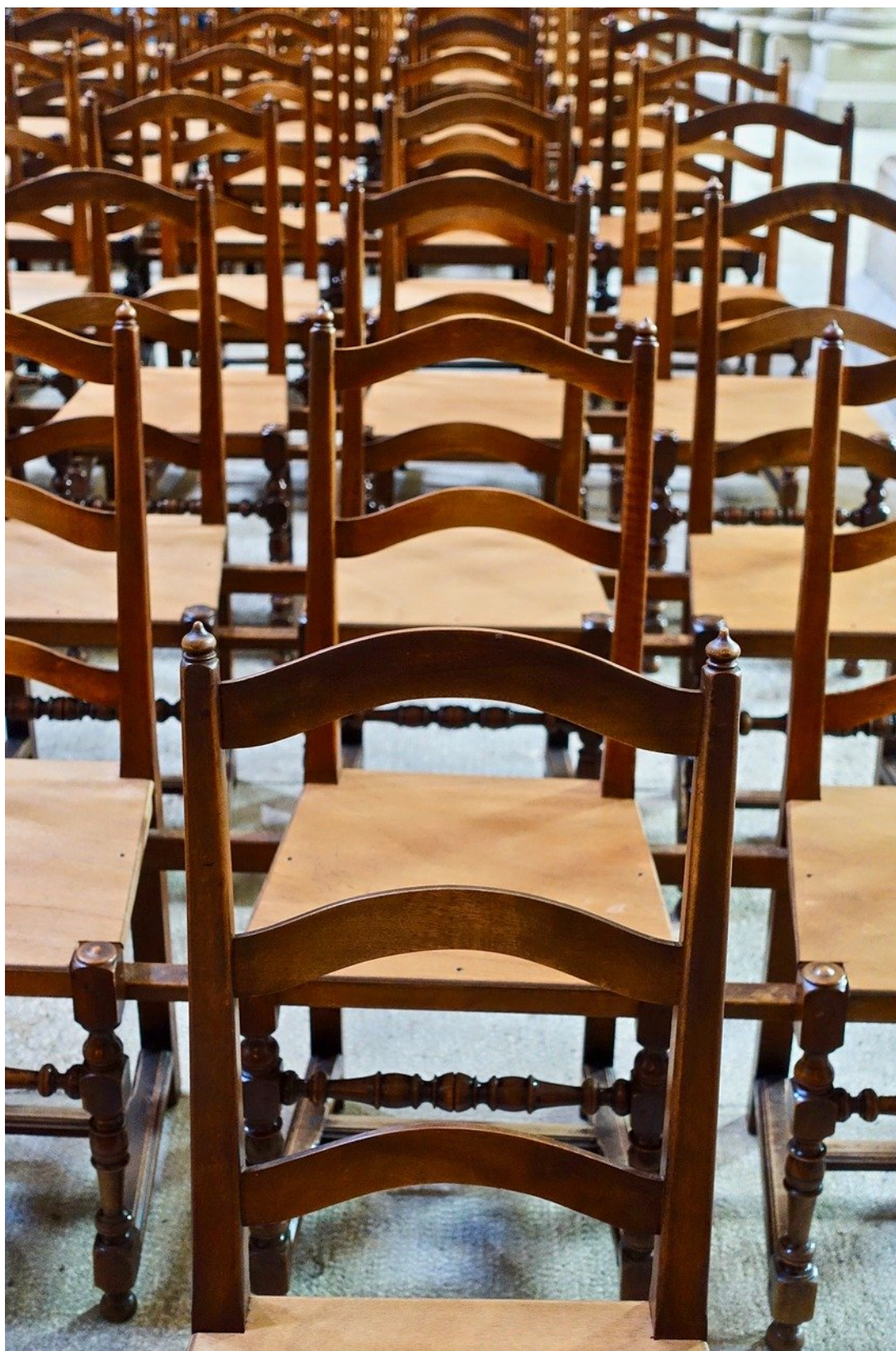


## Synonyms of "Congregate" as a verb (16 Words)

- amass** Gather together in a crowd or group.  
*The soldiers were **amassing** from all parts of Spain.*
- assemble** (of people) gather together in one place for a common purpose.  
***Assemble** your colleagues.*
- cluster** Gather or cause to gather into a cluster.  
*Students tended to have marks **clustering** around 70 per cent.*
- collect** Gather or collect.  
*The children were **collected** from school.*
- come together** Be a native of.

<b><u>convene</u></b>	Meet formally. <i>The committee had <b>convened</b> for its final plenary session.</i>
<b>crowd</b>	Cause to herd drive or crowd together. <i>Men in straw boaters and waxed mustaches <b>crowded</b> the verandah.</i>
<b>flock together</b>	Come together as in a cluster or flock.
<b><u>gather</u></b>	Collect or gather. <i><b>Gather</b> some stones.</i>
<b>get together</b>	Evoke an emotional response.
<b>group</b>	Form a group or group together. <i>Growers began to <b>group</b> together to form cooperatives.</i>
<b>meet</b>	Meet by design be present at the arrival of. <i>In the final group match England will <b>meet</b> the Australians.</i>
<b>muster</b>	Gather or bring together. <i>Reporters <b>mustered</b> outside her house.</i>
<b><u>rally</u></b>	Drive in a rally. <i>A series of meetings to <b>rally</b> support for the union.</i>
<b><u>rendezvous</u></b>	Meet at a rendezvous. <i>I <b>rendezvoused</b> with Bea as planned.</i>
<b>throng</b>	Flock or be present in great numbers. <i>Tourists <b>thronged</b> to the picturesque village.</i>





## Usage Examples of "Congregate" as a verb

- *The crowds congregated in front of the Vatican on Christmas Eve.*
- *Some 4,000 demonstrators had congregated at a border point.*

<b>amass</b>	Gather together or accumulate (a large amount or number of material or things) over a period of time. <i>The soldiers were <b>amassing</b> from all parts of Spain.</i>
<b>assemblage</b>	The action of gathering or fitting things together. <i>A loose <b>assemblage</b> of diverse groups.</i>
<b>assemble</b>	Create by putting components or members together. <i>We <b>assembled</b> in the church basement.</i>
<b>assembly</b>	A group of people elected to make laws or decisions for a particular country or region. <i>A decree guaranteeing freedom of <b>assembly</b>.</i>
<b>batch</b>	Batch together assemble or process as a batch. <i>A <b>batch</b> of letters.</i>
<b>bunch</b>	Form into a bunch. <i>She <b>bunched</b> the needles together.</i>
<b>cheering</b>	Shouting for joy or in praise or encouragement. <i><b>Cheering</b> news.</i>
<b>cluster</b>	Gather or cause to gather into a cluster. <i>Noble metal <b>clusters</b> supported on an acidic carrier.</i>
<b>cohort</b>	A group of people with a common statistical characteristic. <i>The 1940 4 birth <b>cohort</b> of women.</i>
<b>collect</b>	Gather or collect. <i>I ve started <b>collecting</b> stamps.</i>
<b>collection</b>	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>She left the envelope in the office for <b>collection</b>.</i>
<b>convene</b>	Call together. <i>The students were <b>convened</b> in the auditorium.</i>
<b>convoke</b>	Call together or summon (an assembly or meeting). <i>She sent messages convoking a Council of Ministers.</i>
<b>crowd</b>	Cause to herd drive or crowd together. <i>The <b>crowd</b> of tall buildings.</i>
<b>cumulate</b>	Attach two double bonds to the same carbon atom. <i><b>Cumulate</b> gabbro.</i>
<b>flock</b>	Of birds congregate in a flock. <i>Tourists <b>flock</b> to Oxford in their thousands.</i>
<b>gather</b>	A part of a garment that is gathered. <i>She lay <b>gathering</b> her thoughts together.</i>

<b>gathered</b>	Brought together in one place. <i>The <b>gathered</b> folds of the skirt.</i>
<b>gathering</b>	The act of gathering something. <i>A family <b>gathering</b>.</i>
<u>heap</u>	Form a heap. <i>Her clothes lay in a <b>heap</b> on the floor.</i>
<b>help</b>	Give help or assistance be of service. <i>The skimpy manual isn't much <b>help</b> for beginners.</i>
<b>herd</b>	Cause to herd drive or crowd together. <i>The children resembled a fairy <b>herd</b>.</i>
<u>jam</u>	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>The band dedicated about a quarter of the set to new <b>jams</b>.</i>
<b>sectional</b>	Relating to or based upon a section (i.e. as if cut through by an intersecting plane). <i>The chairman of the commission looked on <b>sectional</b> interests as a danger to the common good.</i>
<b>socialize</b>	Take part in social activities; interact with others. <i>He never <b>socializes</b> with his colleagues.</i>
<u>stack</u>	Fill or cover a place or surface with stacks of things. <i><b>Stack</b> a truck with boxes.</i>
<u>swarm</u>	Of flying insects move in or form a swarm. <i>The garden was <b>swarming</b> with bees.</i>
