According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “congregate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

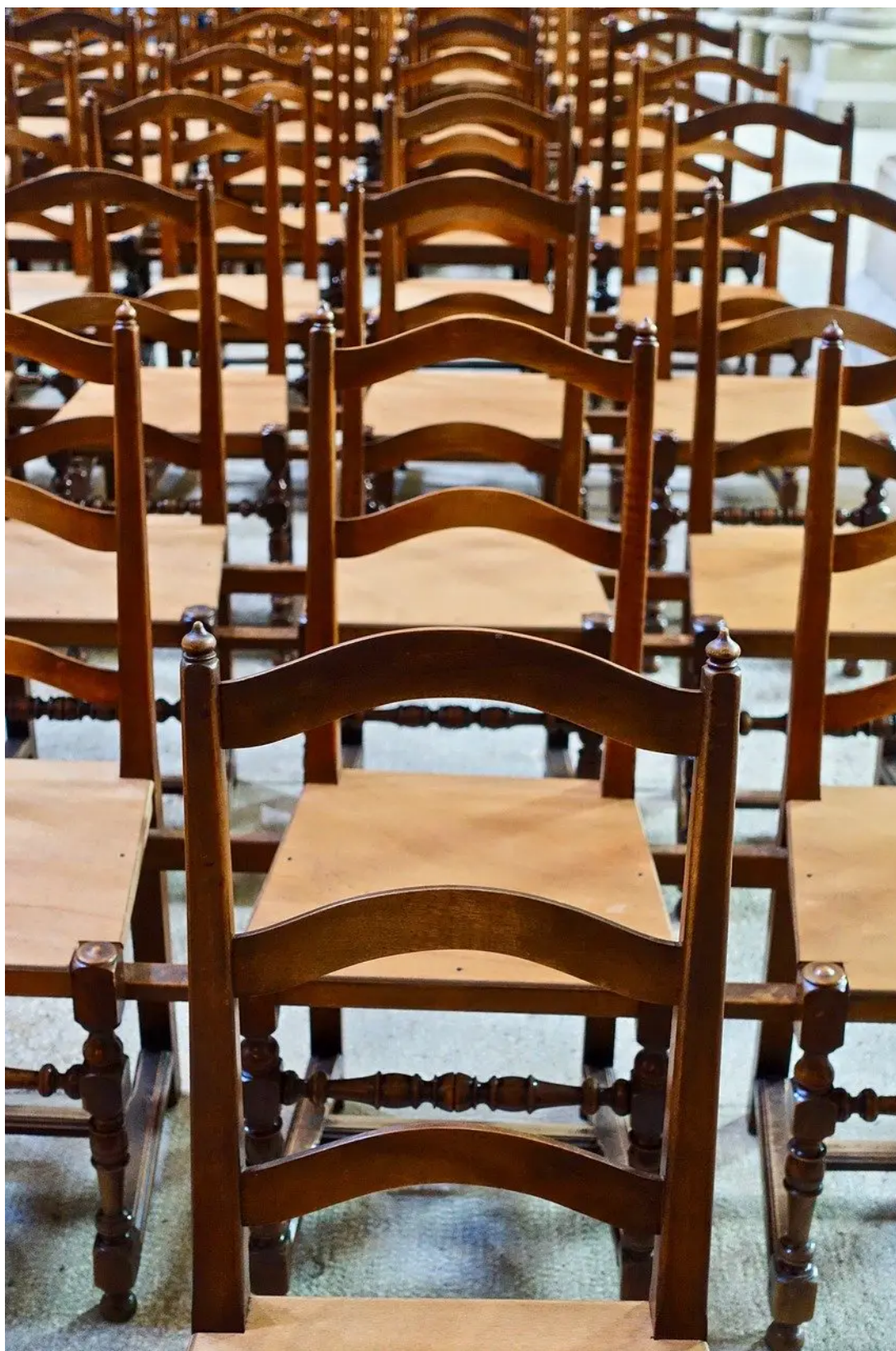
- *Gather into a crowd or mass.*

Synonyms of "Congregate" as a verb (16 Words)

amass	Gather together in a crowd or group. <i>The soldiers were amassing from all parts of Spain.</i>
<u>assemble</u>	(of people) gather together in one place for a common purpose. <i>Assemble your colleagues.</i>
<u>cluster</u>	Gather or cause to gather into a cluster. <i>Students tended to have marks clustering around 70 per cent.</i>
collect	Gather or collect. <i>The children were collected from school.</i>
come together	Be a native of.

<u>convene</u>	Meet formally. <i>The committee had convened for its final plenary session.</i>
crowd	Cause to herd drive or crowd together. <i>Men in straw boaters and waxed mustaches crowded the verandah.</i>
flock together	Come together as in a cluster or flock.
<u>gather</u>	Collect or gather. <i>Gather some stones.</i>
get together	Evoke an emotional response.
group	Form a group or group together. <i>Growers began to group together to form cooperatives.</i>
meet	Meet by design be present at the arrival of. <i>In the final group match England will meet the Australians.</i>
muster	Gather or bring together. <i>Reporters mustered outside her house.</i>
<u>rally</u>	Drive in a rally. <i>A series of meetings to rally support for the union.</i>
<u>rendezvous</u>	Meet at a rendezvous. <i>I rendezvoused with Bea as planned.</i>
throng	Flock or be present in great numbers. <i>Tourists thronged to the picturesque village.</i>



Usage Examples of "Congregate" as a verb

- *The crowds congregated in front of the Vatican on Christmas Eve.*
- *Some 4,000 demonstrators had congregated at a border point.*

- accumulate** Gather; build up.
*Her goal was to **accumulate** a huge fortune.*
- accumulation** Several things grouped together or considered as a whole.
*The **accumulation** of paperwork on her desk.*
- aggregation** Several things grouped together or considered as a whole.
*A desktop **aggregation** app that brings together Facebook Twitter and LinkedIn.*

amass	Gather together or accumulate (a large amount or number of material or things) over a period of time. <i>The soldiers were amassing from all parts of Spain.</i>
assemblage	The action of gathering or fitting things together. <i>A loose assemblage of diverse groups.</i>
<u>assemble</u>	Create by putting components or members together. <i>We assembled in the church basement.</i>
<u>assembly</u>	A group of people elected to make laws or decisions for a particular country or region. <i>A decree guaranteeing freedom of assembly.</i>
batch	Batch together assemble or process as a batch. <i>A batch of letters.</i>
<u>bunch</u>	Form into a bunch. <i>She bunched the needles together.</i>
cheering	Shouting for joy or in praise or encouragement. <i>Cheering news.</i>
<u>cluster</u>	Gather or cause to gather into a cluster. <i>Noble metal clusters supported on an acidic carrier.</i>
<u>cohort</u>	A group of people with a common statistical characteristic. <i>The 1940 4 birth cohort of women.</i>
collect	Gather or collect. <i>I ve started collecting stamps.</i>
collection	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>She left the envelope in the office for collection.</i>
<u>convene</u>	Call together. <i>The students were convened in the auditorium.</i>
convoke	Call together or summon (an assembly or meeting). <i>She sent messages convoking a Council of Ministers.</i>
crowd	Cause to herd drive or crowd together. <i>The crowd of tall buildings.</i>
cumulate	Attach two double bonds to the same carbon atom. <i>Cumulate gabbro.</i>
<u>flock</u>	Of birds congregate in a flock. <i>Tourists flock to Oxford in their thousands.</i>
<u>gather</u>	A part of a garment that is gathered. <i>She lay gathering her thoughts together.</i>

gathered	Brought together in one place. <i>The gathered folds of the skirt.</i>
gathering	The act of gathering something. <i>A family gathering.</i>
<u>heap</u>	Form a heap. <i>Her clothes lay in a heap on the floor.</i>
help	Give help or assistance be of service. <i>The skimpy manual isn't much help for beginners.</i>
herd	Cause to herd drive or crowd together. <i>The children resembled a fairy herd.</i>
<u>jam</u>	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>The band dedicated about a quarter of the set to new jams.</i>
sectional	Relating to or based upon a section (i.e. as if cut through by an intersecting plane). <i>The chairman of the commission looked on sectional interests as a danger to the common good.</i>
socialize	Take part in social activities; interact with others. <i>He never socializes with his colleagues.</i>
<u>stack</u>	Fill or cover a place or surface with stacks of things. <i>Stack a truck with boxes.</i>
<u>swarm</u>	Of flying insects move in or form a swarm. <i>The garden was swarming with bees.</i>
