hush Become quiet or still; fall silent.

ignorant Angry or quick-tempered.

This **ignorant** pin brained receptionist.

ignore Bar from attention or consideration.

He **ignore**d her outraged question.

inaudible Impossible to hear; imperceptible by the ear.

Inaudible pulses of high frequency sound.

mute Muffle the sound of a musical instrument especially by the use of a mute.

The great church was **mute** and dark.

muted In a softened tone.

The **muted** hum of the distant traffic.

Accompanied by or introducing no random fluctuations that obscure the

noiseless real signal or data.

The cycle is a **noiseless** form of transport.

quiescent Causing no symptoms.

The **quiescent** melancholy of the town.

Become quiet or quieter.

The car has a **quiet** economical engine.



reticence The quality of being reticent; reserve.

The traditional emotional **reticence** of the British.

secretiveness The trait of keeping things secret.

Serenity A title given to a reigning prince or similar dignitary.

An oasis of **serenity** amidst the bustling city.

silently Without speaking.

He **silently** cursed himself for his actions.

stillness (poetic) tranquil silence.

Absolute **stillness** greeted our gaze.

sucker Of a plant produce suckers.

What s needed is a **sucker** sorry brave volunteer to test it out.

Free from disturbance; calm.

tranquil

A lake of tranquil blue water reflecting a tranquil blue sky.

tranquility A disposition free from stress or emotion.

tranquilize Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to.

unobtrusive Not conspicuous or attracting attention.

A quiet **unobtrusive** life of self denial.

wordless (of a play, book, or other work) without words or speech.
