centrist	Supporting or pursuing a course of action that is neither liberal nor conservative. <i>A centrist politician.</i>
cozen	Trick or deceive. <i>He was able to cozen a profit.</i>
damage	Suffer or be susceptible to damage. <i>She was awarded 284 000 in damages.</i>
deceive	Deliberately cause (someone) to believe something that is not true, especially for personal gain. <i>He had deceived her with another woman.</i>
deception	A thing that deceives. <i>Obtaining property by deception.</i>
defect	A shortcoming, imperfection, or lack. <i>The property is free from defect.</i>
defraud	Deprive of by deceit. <i>She defrauded the customers who trusted her.</i>
delude	Be false to; be dishonest with. <i>Too many theorists have deluded the public.</i>
demerit	A mark awarded against someone for a fault or offence. <i>They discussed the merits and demerits of her novel.</i>
disadvantage	Put at a disadvantage hinder harm. <i>This rule clearly disadvantages me.</i>
downside	The negative aspect of something otherwise regarded as good or desirable. <i>A magazine feature on the downside of fashion modelling.</i>
drawback	A feature that renders something less acceptable; a disadvantage or problem. <i>The main drawback of fitting catalytic converters is the cost.</i>

failing	A flaw or weak point. <i>Received failing grades.</i>
<u>fault</u>	Of a rock formation be broken by a fault or faults. <i>A fire caused by an electrical fault.</i>
<u>harm</u>	Cause or do harm to. <i>I can t see any harm in it.</i>
hoodwink	Conceal one's true motives from especially by elaborately feigning good intentions so as to gain an end. <i>Staff were hoodwinked into thinking the cucumber was a sawn off shotgun.</i>
illusion	A deceptive appearance or impression. <i>Stripes embellish the surface to create the illusion of various wood grain textures.</i>
<u>inadequacy</u>	A lack of competence. <i>The inadequacy of unemployment benefits.</i>
injury	Damage to a person's feelings. <i>All escaped without serious injury.</i>
<u>memorize</u>	Commit to memory; learn by heart. <i>He memorized thousands of verses.</i>
misconceive	Interpret in the wrong way. <i>Some academic latinists did misconceive Pound s poem in that way.</i>
<u>misunderstanding</u>	Putting the wrong interpretation on. <i>There must be some misunderstanding I don t have a sister.</i>
<u>no</u>	Not in any degree or manner not at all. <i>He was unable to change his automatic yes to a no.</i>
party	Have or participate in a party. <i>The party of the first part.</i>
perfidious	Tending to betray; especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>A perfidious lover.</i>
<u>shortcoming</u>	A failing or deficiency. <i>He is so forthright about his shortcomings it s hard to chastise him.</i>
swindle	Deprive of by deceit. <i>A businessman swindled investors out of millions of pounds.</i>
thaumaturgy	An illusory feat; considered magical by naive observers. <i>He attracts people by his thaumaturgy.</i>
