## **Conscientiously as an Adverb**

### **Definitions of "Conscientiously" as an adverb**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “conscientiously” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *In a way that is motivated by one's moral sense of right and wrong.*
- *In a thorough and responsible way.*
- *With extreme conscientiousness.*



## Synonyms of "Conscientiously" as an adverb (2 Words)

**religiously** With extreme conscientiousness.  
**Religiously** inspired art.

**scrupulously** With extreme conscientiousness.  
The policies must be **scrupulously** observed.

- *People who are conscientiously opposed to killing.*
- *He could not conscientiously take the oath.*
- *A conscientiously detailed legislative history.*

<a href="#">assay</a>	Determine the content or quality of (a metal or ore). <i>I <b>assayed</b> a little joke of mine on him.</i>
<b>assiduity</b>	Constant or close attention to what one is doing. <i>The <b>assiduity</b> with which he could wear down his opponents.</i>
<b>attempt</b>	Make an effort or attempt. <i>An <b>attempt</b> to halt the bombings.</i>
<a href="#">contend</a>	To make the subject of dispute, contention, or litigation. <i>Factions within the government were <b>contending</b> for the succession to the presidency.</i>
<b>contribute</b>	Contribute to some cause. <i>He <b>contributed</b> to a private pension.</i>
<b>diligent</b>	Quietly and steadily persevering especially in detail or exactness. <i>After <b>diligent</b> searching he found a parcel.</i>
<b>effort</b>	Earnest and conscientious activity intended to do or accomplish something. <i>In an <b>effort</b> to reduce inflation the government increased interest rates.</i>
<b>endeavor</b>	Earnest and conscientious activity intended to do or accomplish something. <i>Wished him luck in his <b>endeavor</b>.</i>
<b>endeavour</b>	Try hard to do or achieve something. <i>An <b>endeavour</b> to reduce serious injury.</i>
<b>exertion</b>	Physical or mental effort. <i>She was panting with the <b>exertion</b>.</i>
<b>filibuster</b>	Obstruct proposed legislation with a filibuster. <i>The bill was defeated by a Senate <b>filibuster</b> in June.</i>
<b>futilely</b>	In a futile and unproductive manner.
<b>jimmy</b>	To move or force, especially in an effort to get something open. <i>In Britain they call a <b>jimmy</b> and jemmy.</i>
<b>overexertion</b>	Excessive exertion; so much exertion that discomfort or injury results.
<b>pains</b>	An effortful attempt to attain a goal.
<b>practise</b>	Carry out or perform (a particular activity, method, or custom) habitually or regularly. <i>I need to <b>practise</b> my French.</i>
<a href="#">pry</a>	Inquire too closely into a person's private affairs. <i>I m sick of you <b>prying</b> into my personal life.</i>

<b>reconstruction</b>	A <b>reconstruction</b> of the accident would be staged to try to discover the cause of the tragedy.
<b>render</b>	To surrender someone or something to another. <i>The pianist <b>rendered</b> the Beethoven sonata beautifully.</i>
<b>strenuous</b>	Taxing to the utmost; testing powers of endurance. <i>The government made <b>strenuous</b> efforts to upgrade the quality of the teaching profession.</i>
<b>strive</b>	Struggle or fight vigorously. <i>We must <b>strive</b> to secure steady growth.</i>
<b>striving</b>	An effortful attempt to attain a goal.
<b>struggling</b>	Engaged in a struggle to overcome especially poverty or obscurity. <i>A financially <b>struggling</b> theater.</i>
<b>suicide</b>	A person who commits suicide. <i>A <b>suicide</b> blast caused more deaths.</i>
<b>taxing</b>	Not easily borne; wearing. <i>A <b>taxing</b> schedule.</i>
<b>tireless</b>	Showing sustained enthusiastic action with unflagging vitality. <i>A <b>tireless</b> campaigner.</i>
<b>toil</b>	Productive work (especially physical work done for wages). <i>Richard <b>toiled</b> to build his editorial team.</i>
<b>travail</b>	Work hard. <i>Creation may <b>travail</b> in pain but it cannot escape its destiny.</i>
<b>try</b>	An act of trying something new or different to see if it is suitable effective or pleasant. <i>She s not here but you could <b>try</b> her room.</i>
<b>workmanlike</b>	Worthy of a good workman. <i>The book is a <b>workmanlike</b> job with chronology and bibliography and index.</i>
