- *Compulsory military service.*

Synonyms of "Conscription" as a noun (2 Words)

draft A procedure whereby sports players are made available for selection or reselection by the teams in a league, usually with the earlier choices being given to the weaker teams.

*The first **draft** of the party s manifesto.*

muster A group of peacocks.

*He attended the **musters** which were called to train all able bodied men.*

| compulsory | Involving or exercising compulsion; coercive. <i>The abuse of compulsory powers.</i> |
| corporal | A rank of non commissioned officer in the army above lance corporal or private first class and below sergeant. <i>What seemed corporal melted as breath into the wind.</i> |
| corps | A main subdivision of an army in the field, consisting of two or more divisions. <i>At 9 30 a m the press corps was handed what looked to be a routine list of orders.</i> |
| demobilize | Retire from military service. <i>He was demobilized in February 1946.</i> |
| disarm | Allay the hostility or suspicions of. <i>Her charm disarmed the prosecution lawyer completely.</i> |
| disarmament | The reduction or withdrawal of military forces and weapons. <i>The public wanted peace and disarmament.</i> |

| forced | Forced or compelled. <i>Forced heartiness.</i> |
| forcible | Done by force. <i>They could only be deterred by forcible appeals.</i> |

| obligatory | (of a ruling) having binding force. <i>An obligatory contribution.</i> |
| regiment | Assign to a regiment. <i>Every aspect of their life is strictly regimented.</i> |
| sergeant | A rank of non commissioned officer in the army or air force above corporal and below staff sergeant. |
