<b>sequential</b>	Forming or following in a logical order or sequence. <i><b>Sequential</b> processing of data files.</i>
<b>serial</b>	Pertaining to or composed in serial technique. <i><b>Serial</b> concerts.</i>
<b><u>solid</u></b>	Of good quality and condition solidly built. <i>Ice is water in the <b>solid</b> state.</i>
<b><u>straight</u></b>	Simple straightforward. <i>He is not being as <b>straightforward</b> as it appears.</i>
<b><u>succeeding</u></b>	Coming after something in time; subsequent. <i>Over the <b>succeeding</b> decades recording equipment got cheaper.</i>
<b><u>successive</u></b>	In regular succession without gaps. <i>They were looking for their fifth <b>successive</b> win.</i>
<b><u>unbroken</u></b>	Marked by continuous or uninterrupted extension in space or time or sequence. <i>The <b>unbroken</b> quiet of the afternoon.</i>
<b>uninterrupted</b>	Continuing in time or space without interruption. <i>The window gives an <b>uninterrupted</b> view of the mountains.</i>

<b>cession</b>	The act of ceding. <i>The <b>cession</b> of twenty important towns.</i>
<b>constant</b>	(of a person) unchangingly faithful and dependable. <i>A man <b>constant</b> in adherence to his ideals.</i>
<b><u>continual</u></b>	Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>His plane went down after <b>continual</b> attacks.</i>
<b><u>continuation</u></b>	A part added to a book or play that continues and extends it. <i>Once a separate village it is now a <b>continuation</b> of the suburbs.</i>
<b>continuing</b>	Remaining in force or being carried on without letup. <i>The act provided a <b>continuing</b> annual appropriation.</i>
<b>continuity</b>	The property of a continuous and connected period of time. <i>They have provided the country with a measure of <b>continuity</b>.</i>
<b>continuous</b>	Continuing in time or space without interruption- James Jeans. <i>A <b>continuous</b> bout of illness lasting six months.</i>

<b><u>episode</u></b>	A happening that is distinctive in a series of related events. <i>This change is followed by an <b>episode</b> in this new key.</i>
<b>homologous</b>	Having the same relation, relative position, or structure. <i>The wing of a bat and the arm of a man are <b>homologous</b>.</i>
<b>incessant</b>	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>Night and day we live with the <b>incessant</b> noise of the city.</i>
<b>interlocking</b>	The act of interlocking or meshing. <i>A design of <b>interlocking</b> leaves.</i>
<b><u>nonstop</u></b>	(of a journey especially a flight) occurring without stops. <i>How many <b>nonstops</b> are there to Dallas.</i>
<b>ordered</b>	Having a systematic arrangement; especially having elements succeeding in order according to rule. <i>An <b>ordered</b> sequence.</i>
<b>perpetual</b>	Occurring repeatedly; so frequent as to seem endless and uninterrupted. <i>The <b>perpetual</b> struggle to maintain standards in a democracy.</i>
<b><u>repetitive</u></b>	Repetitive and persistent. <i><b>Repetitive</b> movement.</i>
<b>row</b>	The act of rowing as a sport. <i><b>Row</b> the boat across the lake.</i>
<b>sequel</b>	A part added to a book or play that continues and extends it. <i>The <b>sequel</b> to Home Alone.</i>
<b><u>sequence</u></b>	Ascertain the sequence of amino acid or nucleotide residues in a protein DNA etc. <i>The poems should be read in <b>sequence</b>.</i>
<b>sequential</b>	Forming or following in a logical order or sequence. <i>A series of <b>sequential</b> steps.</i>
<b>serial</b>	A serialized set of programs. <i><b>Serial</b> concerts.</i>
<b>seriatim</b>	In a series; one after another. <i>It is proposed to deal with these matters <b>seriatim</b>.</i>
<b>series</b>	(mathematics) the sum of a finite or infinite sequence of expressions. <i>A <b>series</b> circuit.</i>
<b><u>streak</u></b>	Cover a surface with streaks. <i>Had a <b>streak</b> of bad luck.</i>
<b>subsequence</b>	Something that follows something else. <i>An affair which appeared in due <b>subsequence</b> in the newspapers.</i>

*They were looking for their fifth **successive** win.*
- successively** Immediately one after another.  
*He served **successively** as a major and a lieutenant colonel.*
- unceasing** Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.  
*The **unceasing** efforts of the staff.*
- uninterrupted** Continuing in time or space without interruption- James Jeans.  
*Moving midweek holidays to the nearest Monday or Friday allows **uninterrupted** work weeks.*
