<u>straight</u>	Simple straightforward. <i>He is not being as straightforward as it appears.</i>
<u>succeeding</u>	Coming after something in time; subsequent. <i>Over the succeeding decades recording equipment got cheaper.</i>
<u>successive</u>	In regular succession without gaps. <i>They were looking for their fifth successive win.</i>
<u>unbroken</u>	Marked by continuous or uninterrupted extension in space or time or sequence. <i>The unbroken quiet of the afternoon.</i>
uninterrupted	Continuing in time or space without interruption. <i>The window gives an uninterrupted view of the mountains.</i>

<u>episode</u>	A happening that is distinctive in a series of related events. <i>This change is followed by an episode in this new key.</i>
homologous	Having the same relation, relative position, or structure. <i>The wing of a bat and the arm of a man are homologous.</i>
incessant	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>Night and day we live with the incessant noise of the city.</i>
interlocking	The act of interlocking or meshing. <i>A design of interlocking leaves.</i>
<u>nonstop</u>	(of a journey especially a flight) occurring without stops. <i>How many nonstops are there to Dallas.</i>
ordered	Having a systematic arrangement; especially having elements succeeding in order according to rule. <i>An ordered sequence.</i>
perpetual	Occurring repeatedly; so frequent as to seem endless and uninterrupted. <i>The perpetual struggle to maintain standards in a democracy.</i>
<u>repetitive</u>	Repetitive and persistent. <i>Repetitive movement.</i>
row	The act of rowing as a sport. <i>Row the boat across the lake.</i>
sequel	A part added to a book or play that continues and extends it. <i>The sequel to Home Alone.</i>
<u>sequence</u>	Ascertain the sequence of amino acid or nucleotide residues in a protein DNA etc. <i>The poems should be read in sequence.</i>

successively	Immediately one after another. <i>He served successively as a major and a lieutenant colonel.</i>
unceasing	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The unceasing efforts of the staff.</i>
uninterrupted	Continuing in time or space without interruption- James Jeans. <i>Moving midweek holidays to the nearest Monday or Friday allows uninterrupted work weeks.</i>
