<b>general opinion</b>	A fact about the whole (as opposed to particular.
<b>general view</b>	A fact about the whole (as opposed to particular.
<b><u>harmony</u></b>	The combination of simultaneously sounded musical notes to produce a pleasing effect. <i>Man and machine in perfect <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b>majority opinion</b>	The age at which persons are considered competent to manage their own affairs.
<b>majority view</b>	The property resulting from being or relating to the greater in number of two parts; the main part.
<b>oneness</b>	The quality of being united into one. <i>The <b>oneness</b> of all suffering people.</i>
<b><u>solidarity</u></b>	Unity or agreement of feeling or action, especially among individuals with a common interest; mutual support within a group. <i>Factory workers voiced <b>solidarity</b> with the striking students.</i>
<b>unanimity</b>	Everyone being of one mind. <i>There is almost complete <b>unanimity</b> on this issue.</i>
<b><u>unison</u></b>	Corresponding exactly. <i>Good <b>unisons</b> are formed by flutes oboes and clarinets.</i>
<b><u>unity</u></b>	Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action. <i>He took measures to insure the territorial <b>unity</b> of Croatia.</i>

## Associations of "Consensus" (30 Words)

<b><u>accede</u></b>	Take on duties or office. <i>By now John had died and Henry III had <b>acceded</b>.</i>
<b><u>accord</u></b>	Agreement or harmony. <i>Opposition groups refused to sign the <b>accord</b>.</i>
<b>admittedly</b>	Used to express a concession or recognition that something is the case. <i><b>Admittedly</b> the salary was not wonderful.</i>
<b><u>agree</u></b>	Show grammatical agreement. <i>The two stories don't <b>agree</b> in many details.</i>
<b><u>agreed</u></b>	United by being of the same opinion. <i><b>Agreed</b> in their distrust of authority.</i>
<b>agreement</b>	Compatibility of observations. <i>A trade <b>agreement</b>.</i>

<b><u>approbation</u></b>	Official recognition or approval. <i>A term of <b>approbation</b>.</i>
<b>approval</b>	A feeling of liking something or someone good. <i>His decision merited the <b>approval</b> of any sensible person.</i>
<b>approve</b>	Believe that someone or something is good or acceptable. <i>They would not <b>approve</b>.</i>
<b>assent</b>	To agree or express agreement. <i>He nodded <b>assent</b>.</i>
<b><u>coincide</u></b>	Be in agreement. <i>Publication is timed to <b>coincide</b> with a major exhibition.</i>
<b><u>compromise</u></b>	Make a compromise arrive at a compromise. <i>He won't accept any decisions which <b>compromise</b> his principles.</i>
<b><u>concord</u></b>	Arrange the words of a text so as to create a concordance. <i>Their ideas <b>concorded</b>.</i>
<b>concur</b>	Happen or occur at the same time; coincide. <i>The authors <b>concurred</b> with the majority.</i>
<b>concurrence</b>	A point at which three or more lines meet. <i>The incidental <b>concurrence</b> of two separate tumours.</i>
<b><u>conform</u></b>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The countryside should <b>conform</b> to a certain idea of the picturesque.</i>
<b><u>consent</u></b>	Permission for something to happen or agreement to do something. <i>He had <b>consented</b> to serve as external assessor on the panel.</i>
<b><u>correspond</u></b>	Be equivalent or parallel, in mathematics. <i>The doctor and I <b>corresponded</b> for more than two decades.</i>
<b>ok</b>	An expression of agreement normally occurring at the beginning of a sentence. <i>Things are <b>okay</b>.</i>
<b>permission</b>	An official document giving authorization. <i>He received <b>permission</b> to go to Brussels.</i>
<b>ratification</b>	The action of signing or giving formal consent to a treaty, contract, or agreement, making it officially valid. <i>The <b>ratification</b> of the treaty.</i>
<b>ratify</b>	Sign or give formal consent to (a treaty, contract, or agreement), making it officially valid. <i>Both countries were due to <b>ratify</b> the treaty by the end of the year.</i>

<b>resolution</b>	Computer science the number of pixels per square inch on a computer generated display the greater the resolution the better the picture. <i>The peaceful <b>resolution</b> of all disputes.</i>
<b>sanction</b>	Give sanction to. <i>The scheme was <b>sanctioned</b> by the court.</i>
<b>settlement</b>	The property given under a settlement. <i>The <b>settlement</b> of the boundary disputes.</i>
<u>treaty</u>	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year <b>treaty</b> of solidarity.</i>
<b>unanimity</b>	Everyone being of one mind. <i>There is almost complete <b>unanimity</b> on this issue.</i>
<u>unanimous</u>	(of two or more people) fully in agreement. <i>The doctors were <b>unanimous</b> in their diagnoses.</i>
<b>unanimously</b>	Without opposition; with the agreement of all people involved. <i>We voted <b>unanimously</b>.</i>
<u>yes</u>	An affirmative answer or decision, especially in voting. <i>I was hoping for a <b>yes</b>.</i>
