oneness	The quality of being united into one. <i>The oneness of all suffering people.</i>
<u>solidarity</u>	Unity or agreement of feeling or action, especially among individuals with a common interest; mutual support within a group. <i>Factory workers voiced solidarity with the striking students.</i>
unanimity	Everyone being of one mind. <i>There is almost complete unanimity on this issue.</i>
<u>unison</u>	Corresponding exactly. <i>Good unisons are formed by flutes oboes and clarinets.</i>
<u>unity</u>	Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action. <i>He took measures to insure the territorial unity of Croatia.</i>

Associations of "Consensus" (30 Words)

<u>accede</u>	Take on duties or office. <i>By now John had died and Henry III had acceded.</i>
<u>accord</u>	Agreement or harmony. <i>Opposition groups refused to sign the accord.</i>
admittedly	Used to express a concession or recognition that something is the case. <i>Admittedly the salary was not wonderful.</i>
<u>agree</u>	Show grammatical agreement. <i>The two stories don't agree in many details.</i>
<u>agreed</u>	United by being of the same opinion. <i>Agreed in their distrust of authority.</i>
agreement	Compatibility of observations. <i>A trade agreement.</i>

<u>approbation</u>	Official recognition or approval. <i>A term of approbation.</i>
approval	A feeling of liking something or someone good. <i>His decision merited the approval of any sensible person.</i>
approve	Believe that someone or something is good or acceptable. <i>They would not approve.</i>
assent	To agree or express agreement. <i>He nodded assent.</i>
<u>coincide</u>	Be in agreement. <i>Publication is timed to coincide with a major exhibition.</i>
<u>compromise</u>	Make a compromise arrive at a compromise. <i>He won't accept any decisions which compromise his principles.</i>
<u>concord</u>	Arrange the words of a text so as to create a concordance. <i>Their ideas concorded.</i>
concur	Happen or occur at the same time; coincide. <i>The authors concurred with the majority.</i>
concurrence	A point at which three or more lines meet. <i>The incidental concurrence of two separate tumours.</i>
<u>conform</u>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The countryside should conform to a certain idea of the picturesque.</i>
<u>consent</u>	Permission for something to happen or agreement to do something. <i>He had consented to serve as external assessor on the panel.</i>
<u>correspond</u>	Be equivalent or parallel, in mathematics. <i>The doctor and I corresponded for more than two decades.</i>
ok	An expression of agreement normally occurring at the beginning of a sentence. <i>Things are okay.</i>
permission	An official document giving authorization. <i>He received permission to go to Brussels.</i>
ratification	The action of signing or giving formal consent to a treaty, contract, or agreement, making it officially valid. <i>The ratification of the treaty.</i>
ratify	Sign or give formal consent to (a treaty, contract, or agreement), making it officially valid. <i>Both countries were due to ratify the treaty by the end of the year.</i>

resolution	Computer science the number of pixels per square inch on a computer generated display the greater the resolution the better the picture. <i>The peaceful resolution of all disputes.</i>
sanction	Give sanction to. <i>The scheme was sanctioned by the court.</i>
settlement	The property given under a settlement. <i>The settlement of the boundary disputes.</i>
<u>treaty</u>	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year treaty of solidarity.</i>
unanimity	Everyone being of one mind. <i>There is almost complete unanimity on this issue.</i>
<u>unanimous</u>	(of two or more people) fully in agreement. <i>The doctors were unanimous in their diagnoses.</i>
unanimously	Without opposition; with the agreement of all people involved. <i>We voted unanimously.</i>
<u>yes</u>	An affirmative answer or decision, especially in voting. <i>I was hoping for a yes.</i>
