## Synonyms of "Consent" as a verb (19 Words)

<b>abide by</b>	Put up with something or somebody unpleasant.
<b>accede to</b>	Take on duties or office.
<b>accept</b>	Make use of or accept for some purpose. <i>Please <b>accept</b> my present.</i>
<b>acquiesce in</b>	To agree or express agreement.
<b>agree to</b>	Consent or assent to a condition or agree to do something.
<b>allow</b>	Allow the presence of or allow an activity without opposing or prohibiting. <i>I cannot <b>allow</b> you to see your exam.</i>
<b>approve</b>	Officially agree to or accept as satisfactory. <i>He <b>approved</b> himself ripe for military command.</i>
<b>assent to</b>	To agree or express agreement.
<b>comply with</b>	Act in accordance with someone's rules, commands, or wishes.

<b>concede to</b>	Acknowledge defeat.
<b>concur with</b>	Be in accord; be in agreement.
<b>conform to</b>	Be similar, be in line with.
<b>give in to</b>	Move in order to make room for someone for something.
<b>give permission for</b>	Organize or be responsible for.
<b>go along with</b>	Go through in search of something; search through someone's belongings in an unauthorized way.
<b>go for</b>	Move away from a place into another direction.
<b>sanction</b>	Impose a sanction or penalty on. <i>Foreigners in France illegally should be sent home their employers <b>sanctioned</b> and border controls tightened up.</i>
<b>submit to</b>	Yield to another's wish or opinion.
<b>yield to</b>	Give or supply.



## Usage Examples of "Consent" as a verb

- *He consented to a search by a detective.*
- *He had consented to serve as external assessor on the panel.*



## Associations of "Consent" (30 Words)

### accede

Agree to a demand, request, or treaty.  
*Elizabeth I **acceded** to the throne in 1558.*

### accept

Make use of or accept for some purpose.  
*This tentative explanation came to be **accepted** by the men.*

### acceptance

The process or fact of being received as adequate, valid, or suitable.  
*Her **acceptance** of the gift encouraged him.*

### accord

Agreement or harmony.  
*A peace **accord**.*

<b>acquiesce</b>	To agree or express agreement. <i>Sara <b>acquiesced</b> in his decision.</i>
<b>acquiescence</b>	Agreement with a statement or proposal to do something. <i>A murmur of <b>acquiescence</b> from the assembly.</i>
<b>acquiescent</b>	Ready to accept something without protest, or to do what someone else wants. <i>His <b>acquiescent</b> mood.</i>
<b>admittedly</b>	As acknowledged. <i><b>Admittedly</b> the salary was not wonderful.</i>
<b><u>affirmative</u></b>	Expressing or manifesting praise or approval. <i><b>Affirmative</b> sentences.</i>
<b><u>agree</u></b>	Be agreeable or suitable. <i>He <b>agreed</b> to leave her alone.</i>
<b><u>agreed</u></b>	Discussed or negotiated and then accepted by all parties. <i><b>Agreed</b> in their distrust of authority.</i>
<b><u>approbation</u></b>	Approval or praise. <i>A term of <b>approbation</b>.</i>
<b>approve</b>	Believe that someone or something is good or acceptable. <i>The budget was <b>approved</b> by parliament.</i>
<b>approving</b>	The formal act of approving. <i>The wine drew <b>approving</b> comments from across the table.</i>
<b>assent</b>	Express approval or agreement. <i>He gave his <b>assent</b> eagerly.</i>
<b><u>coincide</u></b>	Be present at the same place and at the same time. <i>On Friday afternoons we generally <b>coincided</b>.</i>
<b>comply</b>	Act in accordance with a wish or command. <i>All second hand furniture must <b>comply</b> with the new regulations.</i>
<b><u>concord</u></b>	Arrange by concord or agreement. <i>A pact of peace and <b>concord</b>.</i>
<b>concur</b>	Happen or occur at the same time; coincide. <i>In tests cytogenetic determination has been found to <b>concur</b> with enzymatic determination.</i>
<b><u>conform</u></b>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The pressure to <b>conform</b>.</i>
<b>conformance</b>	Correspondence in form or appearance. <i><b>Conformance</b> to international standards.</i>
<b>conforming</b>	Adhering to established customs or doctrines (especially in religion).



<b><u>consensus</u></b>	A general agreement. <i>There is a growing <b>consensus</b> that the current regime has failed.</i>
<b><u>correspond</u></b>	Be equivalent or parallel, in mathematics. <i>The rank of Feldwebel in the German forces nominally <b>corresponded</b> to the British rank of sergeant.</i>
<b><u>necessarily</u></b>	In an essential manner. <i>Such expenses are <b>necessarily</b> incurred.</i>
<b>ok</b>	An expression of agreement normally occurring at the beginning of a sentence. <i>Things are <b>okay</b>.</i>
<b>okay</b>	In a satisfactory or adequate manner; ('alright' is a nonstandard variant of 'all right'). <i>Things are <b>okay</b>.</i>
<b>permission</b>	The act of giving a formal (usually written) authorization. <i>They had entered the country without <b>permission</b>.</i>
<b>unanimously</b>	Of one mind; without dissent. <i>We voted <b>unanimously</b>.</i>
<b><u>yes</u></b>	An affirmative. <i>I was hoping for a <b>yes</b>.</i>
