### Definitions of "Conserve" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "conserve" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Keep in safety and protect from harm, decay, loss, or destruction.*
- *Retain (a particular amino acid, nucleotide, or sequence of these) unchanged in different protein or DNA molecules.*
- *Protect (something, especially something of environmental or cultural importance) from harm or destruction.*
- *Preserve with sugar.*
- *Preserve (fruit) with sugar.*
- *Keep constant through physical or chemical reactions or evolutionary change.*
- *Prevent the wasteful overuse of (a resource).*

- *Use cautiously and frugally.*
- *Maintain (a quantity such as energy) at a constant overall total.*

(of a word or unit of text) be carried over automatically as the margin is reached.

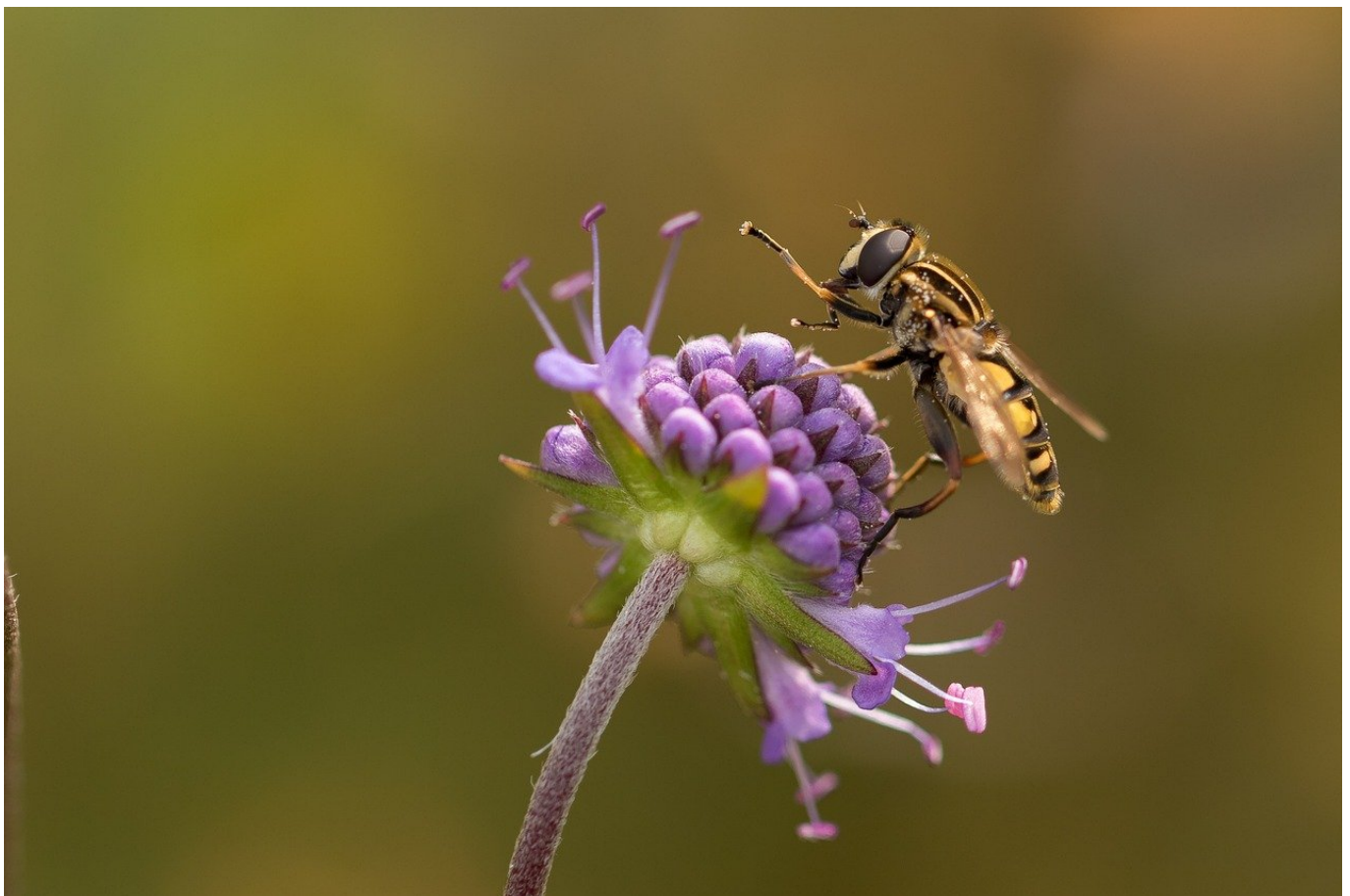
