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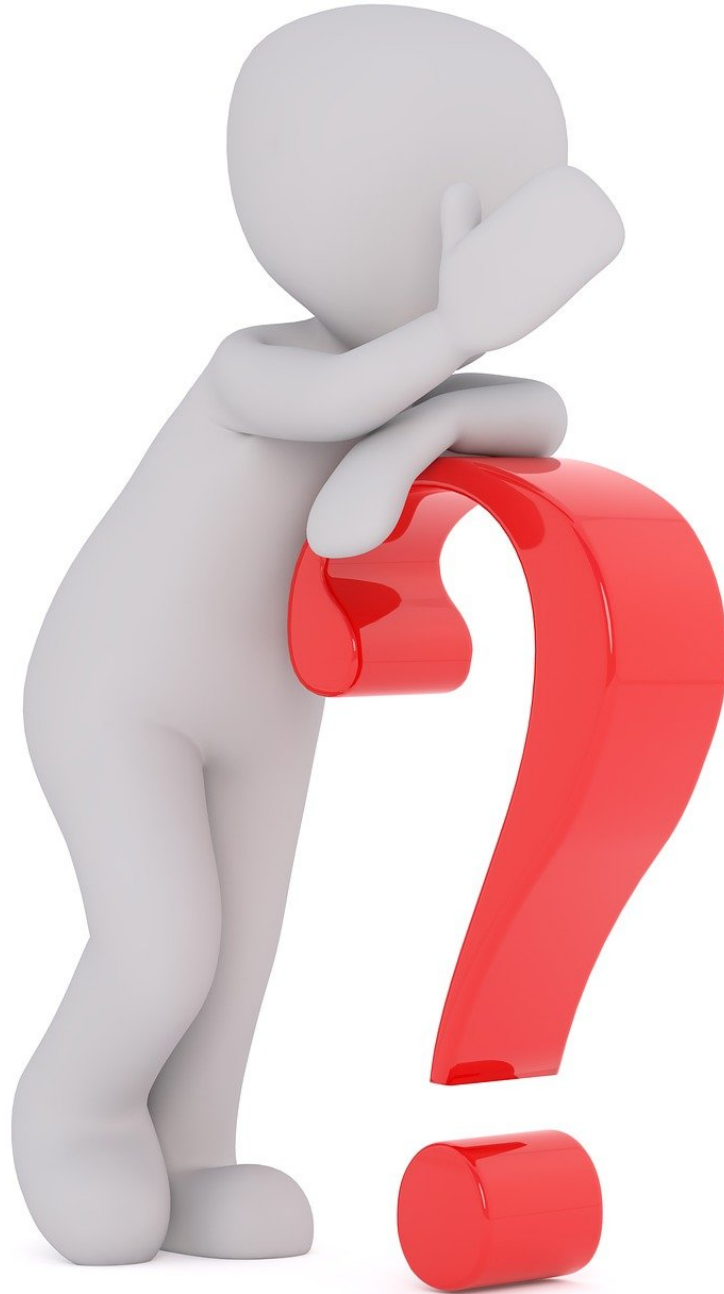

Synonyms of "Considerate" as an adjective (11 Words)

accommodating Helpful in bringing about a harmonious adaptation.
*We always found the our local branch most **accommodating**.*

<u>attentive</u>	(often followed by `to') giving care or attention. <i>Never before had she had such an attentive audience.</i>
concerned	Worried, troubled, or anxious. <i>Concerned parents of youthful offenders.</i>
<u>cooperative</u>	Willing to be of assistance. <i>Every member has clearly defined tasks in a cooperative enterprise.</i>
heedful	Aware of and attentive to. <i>Heedful of what they were doing.</i>
helpful	Providing assistance or serving a useful function. <i>Pages of helpful information.</i>
<u>mindful</u>	Focusing one's awareness on the present moment, especially as part of a therapeutic or meditative technique. <i>Mindful of these criticisms I shall attempt to justify my action.</i>
obliging	Willing to do a service or kindness; helpful. <i>One of the most obliging stewards.</i>
patient	Enduring trying circumstances with even temper or characterized by such endurance. <i>A patient smile.</i>
solicitous	Full of anxiety and concern. <i>Made solicitous inquiries about our family.</i>
thoughtful	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>How very thoughtful of you.</i>

absorbed	Giving or marked by complete attention to- Walter de la Mare. <i>The stones warm slowly throughout the day then radiate absorbed heat at night.</i>
altruistic	Showing a disinterested and selfless concern for the well-being of others; unselfish. <i>It was an entirely altruistic act.</i>
<u>amiable</u>	Diffusing warmth and friendliness. <i>An amiable villain with a cocky sidelong grin.</i>
beneficent	Doing or producing good. <i>A beneficent democracy.</i>
benevolent	Generous in assistance to the poor. <i>He was something of a benevolent despot.</i>

<u>careful</u>	Exercising caution or showing care or attention. <i>Careful about one's behavior.</i>
<u>cautious</u>	People who are fearful and cautious. <i>The plan received a cautious welcome.</i>
<u>contemplative</u>	A person devoted to the contemplative life. <i>She regarded me with a contemplative eye.</i>
<u>deliberate</u>	Fully considered; not impulsive. <i>With all deliberate speed.</i>
disinterested	Not influenced by considerations of personal advantage. <i>A banker is under an obligation to give disinterested advice.</i>
generous	Showing kindness towards others. <i>Unusually generous in his judgment of people.</i>
<u>gentle</u>	Make or become gentle. <i>A gentle sensitive man.</i>
giver	Person who makes a gift of property. <i>Care givers.</i>
<u>humane</u>	Inflicting the minimum of pain. <i>A humane education.</i>
kind	Each of the elements (bread and wine) of the Eucharist. <i>More data of this kind would be valuable.</i>
<u>lenient</u>	Tolerant or lenient. <i>Lenient magistrates.</i>
magnanimous	Generous or forgiving, especially towards a rival or less powerful person. <i>Magnanimous toward his enemies.</i>
meditative	Relating to or absorbed in meditation or considered thought. <i>Meditative techniques.</i>
<u>meek</u>	Evidencing little spirit or courage; overly submissive or compliant. <i>She looked meek but had the heart of a lion.</i>
merciful	Showing or exercising mercy. <i>Our merciful king.</i>
<u>mild</u>	Humble in spirit or manner suggesting retiring mildness or even cowed submissiveness. <i>Fortunately the pain was mild.</i>
<u>muse</u>	The source of an artist's inspiration. <i>Yeats muse Maud Gonne.</i>
pensive	Showing pensive sadness. <i>A pensive mood.</i>

philanthropic	(of a person or organization) seeking to promote the welfare of others; generous and benevolent. <i>Philanthropic contributions.</i>
preoccupied	Having or showing excessive or compulsive concern with something. <i>Got no help from his wife who was preoccupied with the children.</i>
reflective	Providing a reflection; capable of reflecting light or other radiation. <i>Reflective clothing.</i>
selfless	Concerned more with the needs and wishes of others than with one's own; unselfish. <i>An act of selfless devotion.</i>
thoughtful	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>A thoughtful paper.</i>
tolerant	Tolerant and forgiving under provocation. <i>These fish are quite tolerant as long as extremes of pH are avoided.</i>
unselfish	Not greedy. <i>Unselfish devotion.</i>
