- *Send (goods) by a public carrier.*
- *Commit forever; commit irrevocably.*
- *Send to an address.*
- *Deliver (something) to a person's keeping.*
- *Put someone or something in (a place) in order to be rid of it or them.*

allocate	Distribute (resources or duties) for a particular purpose. <i>Students are allocated accommodation on a yearly basis.</i>
assign	Give an assignment to a person to a post or assign a task to a person. <i>The biologist assigned the mushroom to the proper class.</i>
banish	Get rid of (something unwanted). <i>All thoughts of romance were banished from her head.</i>
bequeath	Leave or give by will after one's death. <i>He ditched the unpopular policies bequeathed to him.</i>
charge	Enter a certain amount as a charge. <i>Will I get charged for this service.</i>
commit	Refer a parliamentary or legislative bill to a committee. <i>They were reluctant to commit themselves to an opinion.</i>

deposit	Lay (an egg). <i>He deposited a pile of school books on the kitchen table.</i>
dispatch	Kill without delay. <i>The Welsh team were dispatched comfortably by the opposition.</i>
entrust	Put into the care or protection of someone. <i>The messenger was entrusted with the general s secret.</i>
give over	Move in order to make room for someone for something.
grant	Be willing to concede. <i>They will grant you asylum.</i>
hand down	Place into the hands or custody of.
hand over	Guide or conduct or usher somewhere.
mail	Send someone email. <i>I ll mail you the paper when it s written.</i>
place	Take a place in a competition often followed by an ordinal. <i>The children were placed with foster parents.</i>
post	Assign to a post put into a post. <i>I ll post an article next week revealing the results of the poll.</i>
put	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>Put your ideas in writing.</i>
put away	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
relegate	Assign to a lower position; reduce in rank. <i>United were relegated to division two.</i>
remit	Consign again to a previous state. <i>The movers refused Mr Tierney s request to remit the motion.</i>
send	Send a message or letter. <i>It s the spectacle and music that send us not the words.</i>
send off	Cause to be admitted; of persons to an institution.
sentence	Pronounce a sentence on somebody in a court of law. <i>Ten army officers were sentenced to life imprisonment.</i>
ship	Transport goods or people on a ship. <i>Jack you shipped with the Admiral once didn t you.</i>
transfer	Transfer from one place or period to another. <i>Between Latin and English the sense was transferred from the inhabitants to the place.</i>

transmit

Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission.

Sexually **transmitted** diseases.

turn over

To break and turn over earth especially with a plow.

dedicate	Formally open or unveil (a building or monument). <i>Today the President dedicates the new Second World War memorial in Washington.</i>
dedicated	Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high or sacred purpose. <i>A dedicated high speed rail link from the Channel Tunnel.</i>
<u>dedication</u>	An inscription or form of words dedicating a building, book, etc. to a person or deity. <i>The hardback edition contained a fulsome dedication to his wife.</i>
<u>devote</u>	Dedicate. <i>I wanted to devote more time to my family.</i>
<u>devotion</u>	Feelings of ardent love. <i>She was the epitome of wifely devotion.</i>
<u>faith</u>	Strong belief in the doctrines of a religion, based on spiritual conviction rather than proof. <i>He lost his faith but not his morality.</i>
holy	Morally and spiritually excellent. <i>Saints and holy men.</i>
loyalty	Feelings of allegiance. <i>They felt no loyalty to a losing team.</i>
oblation	The act of contributing to the funds of a church or charity. <i>Oblations for aid to the poor.</i>
offering	The verbal act of offering. <i>Everyone transported their offerings to the bring and buy stall.</i>
passionately	With passion. <i>He fell passionately in love with her.</i>
patricide	A person who kills their father.
perjury	The offence of wilfully telling an untruth or making a misrepresentation under oath. <i>He claimed two witnesses at his trial had committed perjury.</i>
piety	The quality of being religious or reverent. <i>Acts of piety and charity.</i>
<u>pour</u>	Pour out. <i>She poured a little whisky into a glass.</i>
sacred	Made or declared or believed to be holy; devoted to a deity or some religious ceremony or use. <i>A private office sacred to the President.</i>

sacrifice	Make a sacrifice of in religious rituals. <i>He sacrificed his queen on the 34th move.</i>
sanctify	Set apart as or declare holy; consecrate. <i>A small shrine was built to sanctify the site.</i>
sanctity	The quality of being holy. <i>The sanctity of human life.</i>
votary	A priest or priestess (or consecrated worshipper) in a non-Christian religion or cult. <i>A votary of Aphrodite.</i>
votive	An object offered in fulfilment of a vow, such as a candle used as a vigil light. <i>Votive offerings.</i>
vow	Dedicate to a deity by a vow. <i>Never again he vowed.</i>
wholehearted	With unconditional and enthusiastic devotion. <i>You have my wholehearted support.</i>
