## Consist as a Verb

### Definitions of "Consist" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “consist” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Be composed of.*
- *Originate (in).*
- *Be composed or made up of.*
- *Have its essential character; be comprised or contained in; be embodied in.*
- *Be consistent in form, tenor, or character; be congruous.*
- *Have (something) as an essential or the main feature.*
- *Be consistent with.*



## Synonyms of "Consist" as a verb (16 Words)

<b>be composed</b>	Be identical or equivalent to.
<b>be contained</b>	Have life, be alive.
<b>be formed</b>	Spend or use time.
<b>be inherent</b>	Be identical to; be someone or something.
<b>be made up</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>be present</b>	Be priced at.
<b><u>comprise</u></b>	Form or compose. <i>Documents are <b>comprised</b> of words.</i>
<b><u>dwell</u></b>	Originate (in). <i>This kind of fish <b>dwells</b> near the bottom of the ocean.</i>
<b>exist</b>	Have an existence be extant. <i>How am I going to <b>exist</b> without you.</i>
<b>have its being</b>	Get something; come into possession of.
<b>have its existence</b>	Undergo (as of injuries and illnesses).

<b>inhere</b>	Be inherent in something. <i>The potential for change that <b>inheres</b> within the adult education world.</i>
<b>lie</b>	Be, remain, or be kept in a specified state. <i>An action for restitution would <b>lie</b> for money paid in breach of the law.</i>
<b>lie in</b>	Be and remain in a particular state or condition. <i>(of power or a right) belong to a person or body.</i>
<b>reside</b>	People who work in the city actually <b>reside</b> in neighbouring towns.
<b>subsist</b>	Remain in force or effect. <i>The court may treat a contract as still <b>subsisting</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Consist" as a verb

- *Much propaganda simply consists in presenting the officially approved version of the truth as reality.*
- *Desires are to be satisfied only so far as consists with an approved end.*
- *The crew consists of five men.*
- *The payment consists in food.*



- *The information perfectly consists with our friend's account.*
- *What does this dish consist of?*
- *What does love consist in?*



## Associations of "Consist" (30 Words)

<b>chiefly</b>	For the most part; mostly. <i>He is remembered <b>chiefly</b> for his organ sonatas.</i>
<b>commonly</b>	Very often; frequently. <i>Shift workers <b>commonly</b> complain of not getting enough sleep.</i>
<b>comprehensive</b>	A comprehensive school. <i>A <b>comprehensive</b> victory for Swansea.</i>
<b>comprise</b>	Include or contain; have as a component. <i>This single breed <b>comprises</b> 50 per cent of the Swiss cattle population.</i>
<b>connote</b>	Involve as a necessary condition of consequence; as in logic. <i>Spinsterhood <b>connoted</b> failure.</i>

<u>constitute</u>	Be (a part) of a whole. <i>Lone parents <b>constitute</b> a great proportion of the poor.</i>
<b>contain</b>	Contain or hold have within. <i>He must <b>contain</b> his hatred.</i>
<b>element</b>	Each of more than one hundred substances that cannot be chemically interconverted or broken down into simpler substances and are primary constituents of matter Each element is distinguished by its atomic number i e the number of protons in the nuclei of its atoms. <i>A component or constituent <b>element</b> of a system.</i>
<b>encompass</b>	Surround and have or hold within. <i>This group <b>encompasses</b> a wide range of people from different backgrounds.</i>
<u>entail</u>	The act of entailing property the creation of a fee tail from a fee simple. <i>The spinning mills were not part of the <b>entail</b>.</i>
<b>entangle</b>	Cause to become twisted together with or caught in. <i>The child <b>entangled</b> the cord.</i>
<u>factor</u>	Be a contributing factor. <i>A key <b>factor</b> in her success.</i>
<b>have</b>	Have as a feature. <i>Do you <b>have</b> a client named Peters.</i>
<u>implicate</u>	Impose, involve, or imply as a necessary accompaniment or result. <i>He is <b>implicated</b> in the scheme to defraud the government.</i>
<u>implicit</u>	Implied though not directly expressed; inherent in the nature of something. <i><b>Implicit</b> trust.</i>
<b>include</b>	Allow (someone) to share in an activity or privilege. <i>The price <b>includes</b> dinner bed and breakfast.</i>
<b>incorporate</b>	Constitute (a company, city, or other organization) as a legal corporation. <i>He has <b>incorporated</b> in his proposals a number of measures.</i>
<u>largely</u>	In large part; mainly or chiefly. <i>These accounts are <b>largely</b> inactive.</i>
<u>mainly</u>	More than anything else. <i>He is <b>mainly</b> concerned with fiction.</i>
<b>makeup</b>	Cosmetics applied to the face to improve or change your appearance. <i>The two teams played a <b>makeup</b> one week later.</i>
<u>mostly</u>	As regards the greater part or number. <i>I made some good friends but <b>mostly</b> met closed minded people.</i>

<u>normally</u>	Under normal conditions. <i><b>Normally</b> it takes three or four years to complete the training.</i>
<b>ordinarily</b>	In a normal way. <i>A person who is <b>ordinarily</b> resident in the United Kingdom.</i>
<u>organize</u>	Arrange or form into a living being or tissue. <i>We all believed in the need to <b>organize</b> women.</i>
<u>overwhelmingly</u>	To a very great degree or with a great majority. <i>The candy looked <b>overwhelmingly</b> desirable to the dieting man.</i>
<u>primarily</u>	For the most part. <i>Around 80 per cent of personal computers are used <b>primarily</b> for word processing.</i>
<b>principally</b>	For the most part. <i>He was <b>principally</b> a landscape painter.</i>
<u>redefine</u>	Give a new or different definition to. <i>The role of the Emperor was <b>redefined</b>.</i>
<b>usually</b>	Under normal conditions. <i><b>Usually</b> she was late.</i>
<u>wont</u>	An established custom. <i>He was <b>wont</b> to arise at 5 30 every morning.</i>
