- *The quality of achieving a level of performance which does not vary greatly in quality over time.*
- *A harmonious uniformity or agreement among things or parts.*
- *The way in which a substance holds together; thickness or viscosity.*
- *Logical coherence and accordance with the facts.*

*Early mariners relied on the **constancy** of the trade winds.*

degree of density

A measure for arcs and angles.

degree of thickness

A unit of temperature on a specified scale.

density

The spatial property of being crowded together.
*A low **density** floppy disk.*

equilibrium	A situation in which supply and demand are matched and prices stable. <i>The task is the maintenance of social equilibrium.</i>
evenness	The quality of being balanced.
firmness	The quality of having a solid, almost unyielding surface or structure. <i>The continuing firmness of oil prices.</i>
heaviness	Lack of delicacy or grace; coarseness. <i>The heaviness of the rains in the valley caused flooding.</i>
lack of change	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
lack of deviation	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
orderliness	A male hospital attendant who has general duties that do not involve the medical treatment of patients.
regularity	The state or quality of being regular. <i>He came to see her with increasing regularity.</i>
solidity	The quality or state of being firm or strong in structure. <i>He exuded an aura of reassuring solidity.</i>
<u>stability</u>	The quality or attribute of being firm and steadfast. <i>There are fears for the political stability of the area.</i>
steadiness	The quality of being steady-regular and unvarying. <i>The relative steadiness of prices during 2013 was an indication that the market was adequately supplied.</i>
substance	A particular kind or species of matter with uniform properties. <i>The claim has no substance.</i>
thickness	Indistinct articulation. <i>The gateway is several feet in thickness.</i>
<u>uniformity</u>	The quality or state of being uniform. <i>An attempt to impose administrative and cultural uniformity.</i>
<u>unity</u>	Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action. <i>The slope of each dotted line is less than unity.</i>
<u>viscosity</u>	The state of being thick, sticky, and semi-fluid in consistency, due to internal friction. <i>Cooling the fluid raises its viscosity.</i>

<u>harmony</u>	An arrangement of the four Gospels, or of any parallel narratives, which presents a single continuous narrative text. <i>Man and machine in perfect harmony.</i>
indivisible	Unable to be divided or separated. <i>Privilege was indivisible from responsibility.</i>
inseparable	A person or thing inseparable from another. <i>Inseparable pieces of rock.</i>
integrity	The state of being whole and undivided. <i>Integrity checking.</i>
often	In many cases or instances. <i>We often met over a cup of coffee.</i>
oneness	The state of being in harmony with someone or something. <i>The oneness of all suffering people.</i>
