- *The same throughout in structure or composition.*
- *(sometimes followed by `with') in agreement or consistent or reliable.*
- *In agreement or consistent or reliable.*
- *Compatible or in agreement with something.*

- cogent** Powerfully persuasive.

- compatible** Capable of being used with or connected to other devices or components without modification.
*Her deeds were **compatible** with her ideology.*
- congruous** In agreement or harmony.

| even | Being level or straight or regular and without variation as e g in shape or texture or being in the same plane or at the same height as something else i e even with. <i>She was known to have an even temper and to be difficult to rile.</i> |
| harmonious | Free from disagreement or dissent. <i>The tailored clothes were harmonious with her military bearing.</i> |

| sound | In good condition; free from defect or damage or decay. <i>Sound advice.</i> |
| <u>stable</u> | Firm and dependable; subject to little fluctuation. <i>The officer concerned is mentally and emotionally stable.</i> |

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| <u>steady</u> | (of a person) sensible, reliable, and self-restrained. <i>I thought I d better get a steady job.</i> |
| <u>unchanging</u> | Not changing; remaining the same. <i>The party stood for unchanging principles.</i> |
| undeviating | Showing no deviation; constant and steady. <i>The undeviating loyalty of his wife.</i> |
| unfluctuating | Not liable to fluctuate or especially to fall. |
| <u>uniform</u> | Denoting a garment forming part of a person s uniform. <i>Black uniform jackets.</i> |
| unswerving | Going directly ahead from one point to another without veering or turning aside. <i>A straight and narrow tree lined road unswerving across the lowlands.</i> |
| unvarying | Unvarying in nature. <i>Principles of unvarying validity.</i> |
| <u>unwavering</u> | Not showing abrupt variations- Louis Auchincloss. <i>She fixed him with an unwavering stare.</i> |
| <u>valid</u> | Well grounded in logic or truth or having legal force. <i>The visas are valid for thirty days.</i> |
| well reasoned | In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury. |
| well thought out | In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury. |

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| constantly | Without variation or change, in every case. <i>The world is constantly changing.</i> |
| continual | Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>Some patients need continual safeguarding.</i> |
| continually | Repeated frequently in the same way; regularly. <i>This information is continually updated.</i> |
| continued | Without stop or interruption. <i>To insure the continued success of the war.</i> |
| endless | Having no known beginning and presumably no end. <i>Endless ocean wastes.</i> |
| equable | Not easily irritated. <i>He could look sterner than his equable temperament would suggest.</i> |
| immutable | Unchanging over time or unable to be changed. <i>The view of that time was that all species were immutable created by God.</i> |
| incessant | Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>Night and day we live with the incessant noise of the city.</i> |
| incessantly | With unflagging resolve. <i>She talked about him incessantly.</i> |
| indestructible | Not able to be destroyed. <i>Indestructible plastic containers.</i> |
| invariable | (of a noun in an inflected language) having the same form in both the singular and the plural, as does <i>relais</i> in French. <i>An invariable rule.</i> |
| invariant | Unvarying in nature. <i>The pattern of cell divisions was found to be invariant.</i> |
| lasting | Lasting a long time without change. <i>A long lasting friendship.</i> |
| nonstop | A flight made without intermediate stops between source and destination. <i>A nonstop flight to Atlanta.</i> |
| perpetual | Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>He grows perpetual flowering carnations.</i> |
| persistent | Continuing to exist or occur over a prolonged period. <i>One of the government's most persistent critics.</i> |
| relentless | Never-ceasing. <i>The relentless beat of the drums.</i> |

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| <u>stable</u> | Shelter in a stable. <i>The officer concerned is mentally and emotionally stable.</i> |
| <u>steadily</u> | At a steady rate or pace. <i>The mountain got steadily steeper.</i> |
| <u>steady</u> | Make steady. <i>A steady increase.</i> |
| sustained | Continuing for an extended period or without interruption. <i>Sustained flight.</i> |
| unceasing | Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>Man s unceasing warfare with drought and isolation.</i> |
| <u>unchangeable</u> | Not changeable or subject to change-Ashley Montagu. <i>A fixed and unchangeable part of the germ plasm.</i> |
| <u>unchanging</u> | Conforming to the same principles or course of action over time. <i>The party stood for unchanging principles.</i> |
| <u>unrelenting</u> | Never-ceasing. <i>The heat was unrelenting.</i> |
