Definitions of "Consolidate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “consolidate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Combine (a number of things) into a single more effective or coherent whole.*
- *Combine (separate pieces of legislation) into a single legislative act.*
- *Form into a solid mass or whole.*
- *Combine (a number of financial accounts or funds) into a single overall account or set of accounts.*
- *Make firm or secure; strengthen.*
- *Bring together into a single whole or system.*
- *Unite into one.*
- *Make (something) physically stronger or more solid.*
- *Make or form into a solid or hardened mass.*
- *Strengthen (one's position or power).*

<u>fortify</u>	Add spirits to (wine) to make port, sherry, or a similar drink. <i>Most commercial brands of almond milk are fortified with vitamins A, D, B2, B12, calcium, and zinc.</i>
<u>fuse</u>	Equip with a fuse provide with a fuse. <i>When fired in a special kiln the metals fused on to the pot.</i>
<u>harden</u>	Cause to accept or become hardened to habituate. <i>Wait for the glue to harden.</i>
integrate	Become one become integrated. <i>Cities efforts to integrate.</i>
make secure	Act in a certain way so as to acquire.
make stable	Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner.
make stronger	Appear to begin an activity.
marry	Join in marriage. <i>They had no plans to marry.</i>
<u>merge</u>	Combine or cause to combine to form a single entity. <i>We merged our resources.</i>
<u>mingle</u>	Move among and engage with others at a social function. <i>Resourcefully he mingled music and dance.</i>
<u>reinforce</u>	Strengthen (a military force) with additional personnel or equipment. <i>Let s reinforce good behavior.</i>
<u>secure</u>	Seek to guarantee repayment of (a loan) by having a right to take possession of an asset in the event of non-payment. <i>The government is concerned to secure the economy against too much foreign ownership.</i>
<u>stabilize</u>	Become stable or more stable. <i>His condition appears to have stabilized.</i>
stiffen	Severely restrict in scope or extent. <i>Outrage over the murders stiffened the government s resolve to confront the Mafia.</i>
strengthen	Make strong or stronger. <i>Strengthen the relations between the two countries.</i>
synthesize	Make (something) by synthesis, especially chemically. <i>Pupils should synthesize the data they have gathered.</i>
tighten	Make or become tight or tighter. <i>He tightened up the clips.</i>
unite	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>His work unites theory and practice.</i>

converge	(of lines) tend to meet at a point. <i>The lines converge at this point.</i>
federate	Relating to a federated state or organization. <i>In 1901 the six colonies federated to form the Commonwealth of Australia.</i>
incorporation	Learning (of values or attitudes etc.) that is incorporated within yourself. <i>A law allowing incorporation as a company.</i>
integrate	Become one become integrated. <i>Transport planning should be integrated with energy policy.</i>
integration	The action of incorporating a racial or religious group into a community. <i>Integration is the best hope for both black and white Americans.</i>
<u>meld</u>	A thing formed by melding a combination. <i>A meld of many contributions.</i>
<u>merge</u>	Become one. <i>He agreed to merge his broadcasting company with a multinational concern.</i>
reunify	Unify again, as of a country. <i>Will Korea reunify.</i>
<u>solidify</u>	Make solid or more solid cause to solidify. <i>Social and political pressures helped to solidify national identities.</i>
<u>syndicate</u>	Sell a horse to a syndicate. <i>Large scale buyouts involving a syndicate of financial institutions.</i>

union

A device on a national flag emblematic of the union of two or more sovereignties typically in the upper inner corner.

*The **union** movement.*

unite

Be or become joined or united or linked.

*She **unites** charm with a good business sense.*

united

Of or relating to two people who are married to each other.

*Presented a **united** front.*

weld

A welded joint.

*The truck had spikes **welded** to the back.*
