The part of a cathedral or large church between the high altar and the nave used by the choir and clergy.

*A clarinet **choir**.*

**companion** A person who shares the experiences of another, especially when these are unpleasant or unwelcome.

*My **companions** in misfortune.*

**helpmate** A helpful partner.

*She acted as his pleasant but by no means uncritical **helpmate**.*

**helpmeet** A helpful partner.

**mate** South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate.

*His table **mates**.*

**partner** A person's partner in marriage.

*Arrange the children in pairs so that each person has a **partner**.*

## Consort as a Verb

### Definitions of "Consort" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "consort" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Habitually associate with (someone), typically with the disapproval of others.*
- *Agree or be in harmony with.*
- *Go together.*
- *Keep company with; hang out with.*
- *Keep company.*

### Synonyms of "Consort" as a verb (19 Words)

**accord** Allow to have.

*His views **accorded** well with those of Merivale.*

**affiliate** Officially attach or connect (a subsidiary group or a person) to an organization.

*Almost all students **affiliate** to the Students Union.*

**agree** Be in accord be in agreement.

*We both **agreed** on issues such as tougher penalties for criminals.*

<b>associate</b>	Be involved with. <i>He <b>associates</b> with strange people.</i>
<b>assort</b>	(of genes or characteristics) become distributed among cells or progeny. <i>The chromosomes of the father and the mother <b>assort</b> into 23 pairs.</i>
<b>concord</b>	Arrange the words of a text so as to create a concordance. <i>Their ideas <b>concorded</b>.</i>
<b>fit in</b>	Provide with (something) usually for a specific purpose.
<b>fraternize</b>	Be on friendly terms with someone, as if with a brother, especially with an enemy. <i>She ignored Elisabeth's warning glare against fraternizing with the enemy.</i>
<b>go around</b>	To be spent or finished.
<b>harmonise</b>	Bring into consonance, harmony, or accord while making music or singing.
<b>harmonize</b>	Make consistent or compatible. <i>The colors don't <b>harmonize</b>.</i>
<b>have dealings</b>	Suffer from; be ill with.
<b>keep company</b>	Allow to remain in a place or position or maintain a property or feature.
<b>mingle</b>	Mix or cause to mix together. <i>A smell which <b>mingled</b> disinfectant and soap.</i>
<b>mix</b>	Mix together different elements. <i>Peppercorns are sometimes <b>mixed</b> with other spices.</i>
<b>rub shoulders</b>	Cause friction.
<b>run</b>	Run stand or compete for an office or a position. <i>He announced that he intended to <b>run</b> for President.</i>
<b>socialize</b>	Train for a social environment. <i>Children have to be <b>socialized</b> in school.</i>
<b>spend time</b>	Spend completely.

## Usage Examples of "Consort" as a verb

- *It did not consort with his idea of scientific government.*
- *You chose to consort with the enemy.*

## Associations of "Consort" (30 Words)

<b>affiliate</b>	A subsidiary or subordinate organization that is affiliated with another organization. <i>They <b>affiliated</b> with a national group.</i>
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<b>associate</b>	Allow oneself to be connected with or seen to be supportive of. <i>I cannot <b>associate</b> myself with some of the language used.</i>
<b>beau</b>	A man who is the lover of a man or woman.
<b>bigamy</b>	The offense of marrying someone while you have a living spouse from whom no valid divorce has occurred.
<b>cohabit</b>	Coexist. <i>An increasing number of couples are <b>cohabiting</b>.</i>
<b>colleague</b>	A person with whom one works in a profession or business. <i>The surgeon consulted his <b>colleagues</b>.</i>
<b><u>companion</u></b>	Be a companion to somebody. <i>Steve and his live in <b>companion</b>.</i>
<b>compatriot</b>	A fellow citizen or national of a country. <i>Stich defeated his <b>compatriot</b> Boris Becker in the quarter finals.</i>
<b><u>comrade</u></b>	Used as a term of address for those male persons engaged in the same movement. <i>Greetings <b>comrade</b>.</i>
<b>conjoin</b>	Join; combine. <i>An approach which <b>conjoins</b> theory and method.</i>
<b><u>couple</u></b>	A small indefinite number. <i>We got some eggs would you like a <b>couple</b>.</i>
<b><u>estranged</u></b>	Caused to be unloved. <i>Her <b>estranged</b> father.</i>
<b>ex</b>	Out of fashion. <i>All his <b>exes</b> live in Texas.</i>
<b><u>fellow</u></b>	A man who is the lover of a man or woman. <i>A tutorial <b>fellow</b>.</i>
<b><u>friendship</u></b>	A state of mutual trust and support between allied nations. <i>Because of the <b>friendship</b> between our countries we had a very frank exchange.</i>
<b>harmonize</b>	Go together. <i>The colors don't <b>harmonize</b>.</i>
<b><u>husband</u></b>	Use (resources) economically. <i>She <b>husbanded</b> their financial resources through difficult times.</i>
<b>married</b>	Married people. <i>A happily <b>married</b> man.</i>
<b>marry</b>	Join in marriage. <i>Most Chardonnays don't <b>marry</b> well with salmon.</i>

<b>mate</b>	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>Camels hate leaving their <b>mates</b>.</i>
<b>morganatic</b>	Of a marriage between one of royal or noble birth and one of lower rank; valid but with the understanding that the rank of the inferior remains unchanged and offspring do not succeed to titles or property of the superior. <i>He contracted a <b>morganatic</b> marriage with a German born actress.</i>
<b>partner</b>	A person who is a member of a partnership. <i>Scotland is the rest of the UK s second biggest trading <b>partner</b>.</i>
<b>partnership</b>	The state of being a partner or partners. <i>We should go on working together in <b>partnership</b>.</i>
<b>peer</b>	A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage. <i>The towers <b>peer</b> over the roofs.</i>
<b>polygamy</b>	Having more than one spouse at a time.
<b>reconcile</b>	Make someone accept (a disagreeable or unwelcome thing). <i>The king and the archbishop were publicly <b>reconciled</b>.</i>
<b>spouse</b>	A husband or wife, considered in relation to their partner.
<b>union</b>	The operation of forming a union. <i>The <b>union</b> of opposing factions.</i>
<b>wife</b>	The wife of a person with a specified occupation. <i>A clergy <b>wife</b>.</i>
<b>workmate</b>	A person with whom one works.
