alliance	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>Divisions within the alliance.</i>
amalgamation	The action, process, or result of combining or uniting. <i>The threat of amalgamation with another college.</i>
coalition	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. <i>A coalition between Liberals and Conservatives.</i>
confederacy	A union of political organizations. <i>The Yakuza is a secret confederacy of criminal fraternities.</i>

<u>confederation</u>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. A confederation of trade unions.
conglomerate	A thing consisting of a number of different and distinct parts or items that are grouped together. <i>The sediments vary from coarse conglomerate to fine silt and clay.</i>
<u>cooperative</u>	A farm, business, or other organization which is owned and run jointly by its members, who share the profits or benefits. <i>We run the agency as a workers cooperative.</i>
corporation	A business firm whose articles of incorporation have been approved in some state. <i>Multinational corporations.</i>
<u>federation</u>	The action of forming states or organizations into a single group with centralized control. <i>A first step in the federation of Europe.</i>
<u>guild</u>	A group of species that have similar requirements and play a similar role within a community.
<u>league</u>	The contest for the championship of a league. <i>The leading goalscorer in the league.</i>
merger	A combination of two things, especially companies, into one. <i>Merger can be applied for when the freehold and leasehold estates become vested in the same person.</i>
partnership	A business or firm owned and run by two or more partners. <i>We should go on working together in partnership.</i>
<u>pool</u>	Any of various games played on a pool table having 6 pockets. <i>Everyone contributed to the pool.</i>
<u>syndicate</u>	A news agency that sells features or articles or photographs etc. to newspapers for simultaneous publication. <i>A crime syndicate.</i>
<u>union</u>	A part of a flag with an emblem symbolizing national union typically occupying the upper corner next to the staff. <i>Lightning produced an unusual union of the metals.</i>

Associations of "Consortium" (30 Words)

agreement	Compatibility of observations. <i>Agreement between experimental observations and theory.</i>
alliance	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>The shifting alliances within a large family.</i>
association	(ecology) a group of organisms (plants and animals) that live together in a certain geographical region and constitute a community with a few dominant species. <i>Flints were found in association with the prehistoric remains of the bear.</i>
brainstorming	Group discussion to produce ideas or solve problems. <i>Brainstorming can generate some wonderful ideas.</i>
<u>brotherhood</u>	People engaged in a particular occupation. <i>The bonds of brotherhood.</i>
collaboration	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>They worked either in collaboration or independently.</i>
<u>communal</u>	Involving the sharing of work and property. <i>Violent communal riots.</i>
<u>confederation</u>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>A confederation of trade unions.</i>
<u>consolidate</u>	Combine (a number of financial accounts or funds) into a single overall account or set of accounts. <i>The mud had consolidated overnight.</i>
cooperation	Assistance, especially by complying readily with requests. <i>Economic cooperation.</i>
<u>federation</u>	A group of states with a central government but independence in internal affairs. <i>A first step in the federation of Europe.</i>
<u>global</u>	Relating to the whole world; worldwide. <i>Give students a global picture of what is involved in the task.</i>
globalize	Make world-wide in scope or application. <i>Markets are being increasingly globalized.</i>
<u>immigration</u>	The place at an airport or country's border where government officials check the documents of people entering that country. <i>A barrier to control illegal immigration from Mexico.</i>
<u>international</u>	Any of several international socialist organizations. <i>Large international hotels.</i>

league	The contest for the championship of a league. <i>Austin s in a league of his own.</i>
oneness	The state of being in harmony with someone or something. <i>The oneness of all suffering people.</i>
reconcilable	Capable of being reconciled; compatible. <i>The theory was quite reconcilable with industrialization.</i>
society	A specified section of society. <i>The analogy between insect society and human city is not new.</i>
syndicate	Control or manage by a syndicate. <i>A crime syndicate.</i>
together	Self-confident, level-headed, or well organized. <i>She s really together.</i>
transnational	Extending or operating across national boundaries. <i>Transnational terrorist networks.</i>
unification	The state of being joined or united or linked. <i>There were conversations about unification between the Church of England and the Methodist Church.</i>
union	A trade union. <i>You have to join the union in order to get a job.</i>
united	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. <i>Presented a united front.</i>
unity	Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action. <i>The slope of each dotted line is less than unity.</i>
universal	A thing having universal effect currency or application. <i>Universal experience.</i>
voting	A choice that is made by counting the number of people in favor of each alternative.
world	Human and social interaction. <i>All the world loves a lover.</i>
worldwide	Of worldwide scope or applicability Christopher Morley. <i>Worldwide sales of television rights.</i>
