- A secret agreement between two or more people to perform an unlawful act.
- The action of plotting or conspiring.
- A plot to carry out some harmful or illegal act (especially a political plot.
- A group of conspirators banded together to achieve some harmful or illegal purpose.
- A secret plan by a group to do something unlawful or harmful.





Synonyms of "Conspiracy" as a noun (13 Words)

<u>cabal</u>	A clique (often secret) that seeks power usually through intrigue. A cabal of dissidents.
collaboration	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>His recent opera was a collaboration with Lessing.</i>
<u>collusion</u>	Collusion between ostensible opponents in a lawsuit. <i>The armed forces were working in collusion with drug traffickers.</i>
confederacy	A secret agreement between two or more people to perform an unlawful act. The Yakuza is a secret confederacy of criminal fraternities.
connivance	Willingness to allow or be secretly involved in an immoral or illegal act. <i>This infringement of the law had taken place with the connivance of officials.</i>



intrigue	A mysterious or fascinating quality. Within the region s borders is a wealth of interest and intrigue .
machination	A plot or scheme.
palace intrigue	• The governing group of a kingdom.
plan	A drawing or diagram made by projection on a horizontal plane especially one showing the layout of a building or one floor of a building. <i>The plans for City Hall were on file.</i>
<u>plot</u>	A chart or graph showing the movements or progress of an object. The plot consists almost entirely of a man and woman falling in love.
plotting	A small area of ground covered by specific vegetation.
scheme	A schematic or preliminary plan. The whole scheme is plunged into darkness bar the light in Victor s house.
stratagem	An elaborate or deceitful scheme contrived to deceive or evade. A series of devious stratagem s.

<u>abet</u>	Assist or encourage, usually in some wrongdoing. We are aiding and abet ting this illegal traffic.
affair	An event or sequence of events of a specified kind or that has previously been referred to. <i>The board admitted responsibility for the affair.</i>
amour	A love affair or lover, especially one that is secret. <i>He is enraged at this revelation of his past amours.</i>
bamboozle	Conceal one's true motives from especially by elaborately feigning good intentions so as to gain an end. He bamboozle d Canada s largest banks in a massive counterfeit scam.
bribery	The giving or offering of a bribe. His opponent had been guilty of bribery and corruption.
<u>cabal</u>	A clique (often secret) that seeks power usually through intrigue. A cabal of dissidents.
cheat	An act of cheating a fraud or deception. She cheat s on her husband.
cheating	Not faithful to a spouse or lover.
<u>collude</u>	Cooperate in a secret or unlawful way in order to deceive or gain an advantage over others. The president accused his opponents of colluding with foreigners.
<u>collusion</u>	Collusion between ostensible opponents in a lawsuit. The armed forces were working in collusion with drug traffickers.
complicity	Guilt as an accomplice in a crime or offense. They were accused of complicity in the attempt to overthrow the government.
<u>conspire</u>	Engage in plotting or enter into a conspiracy, swear together. Everything conspire s to exacerbate the situation.
deceive	Fail to admit to oneself that something is true. I didn t intend to deceive people into thinking it was French champagne.
dishonor	Bring shame or dishonor upon. He dishonor ed his family by committing a serious crime.
embezzlement	Theft or misappropriation of funds placed in one's trust or belonging to one's employer. <i>Charges of fraud and embezzlement.</i>
fraud	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>He was convicted of fraud</i> .



hoodwink	Deceive or trick. Staff were hoodwink ed into thinking the cucumber was a sawn off shotgun.
insider	An officer of a corporation or others who have access to private information about the corporation's operations. <i>Political insiders.</i>
junto	A clique (often secret) that seeks power usually through intrigue.
<u>liaison</u>	Introduction of a consonant between a word that ends in a vowel and another that begins with a vowel, as in English law and order. <i>He provided a liaison with the guerrillas.</i>
liar	A person who has lied or who lies repeatedly. Shelley wasn t a good liar .
<u>manipulation</u>	The action of manipulating something in a skilful manner. There was no deliberate manipulation of visitors emotions.
patsy	A person who is easily taken advantage of, especially by being cheated or blamed for something. There is a mischievous sparkle in his eyes that suggests he is no patsy .
peculation	The fraudulent appropriation of funds or property entrusted to your care but actually owned by someone else.
perfidy	Betrayal of a trust. It was an example of his perfidy .
<u>perpetrate</u>	Carry out or commit (a harmful, illegal, or immoral action. <i>Perpetrate</i> a crime.
<u>rebel</u>	A person who takes part in an armed rebellion against the constituted authority especially in the hope of improving conditions. <i>Rebel forces.</i>
scam	A fraudulent business scheme. An insurance scam .
scandal	Rumour or malicious gossip about scandalous events or actions. Divorce was cause for scandal in the island.
swindle	The act of swindling by some fraudulent scheme. A businessman swindle d investors out of millions of pounds.
