link

The means of connection between things linked in series.

*A chain made of steel **links**.*

middleman

Someone who buys large quantities of goods and resells to merchants rather than to the ultimate customers.

*We maintain value for money by cutting out the **middleman** and selling direct.*

striking

The action of striking.

*Substantial damage was caused by the **striking** of a submerged object.*

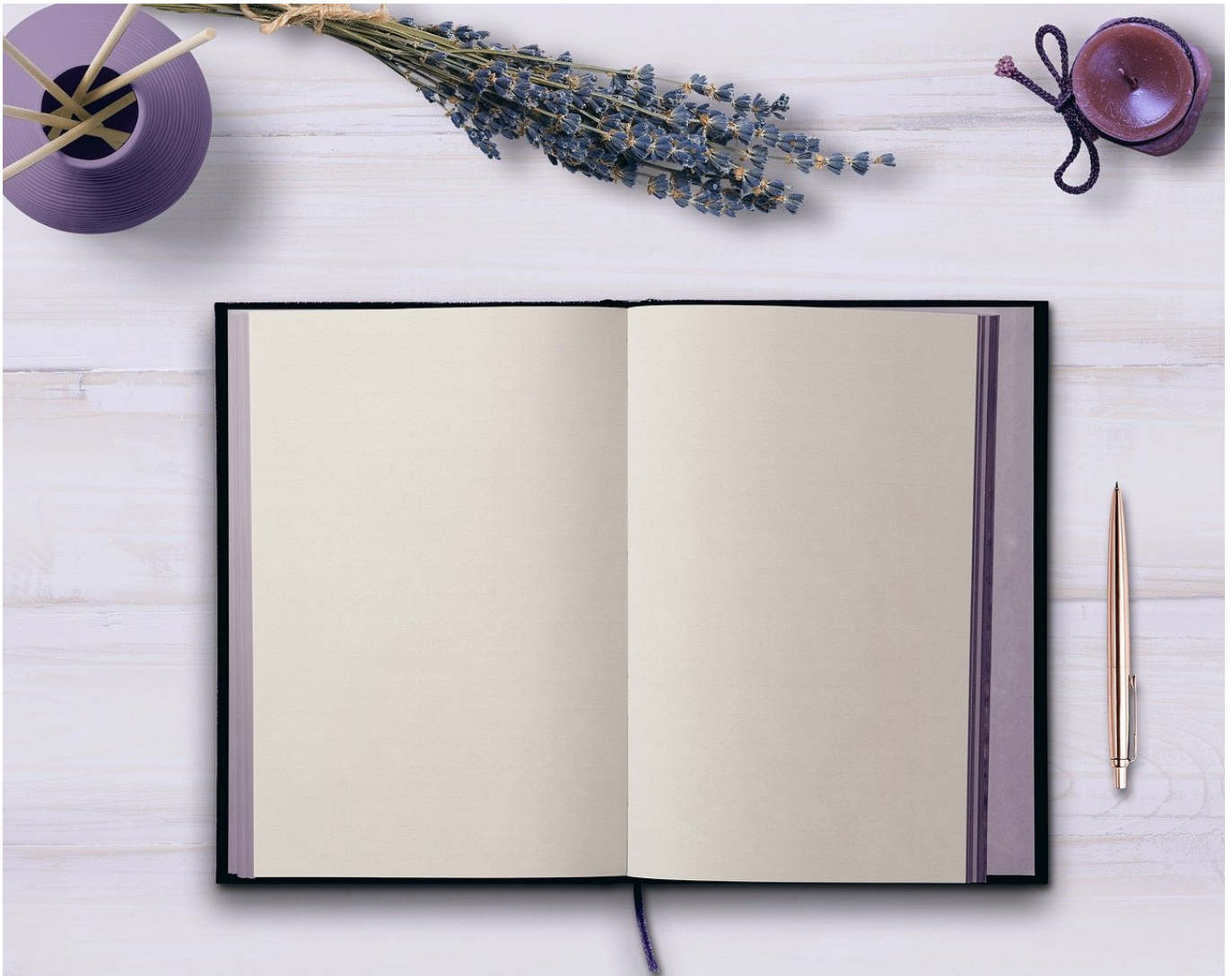
tangency

touch

An act of touching someone or something.

*This room needs a woman s **touch**.*

- *Litmus paper turns red on contact with an acid.*

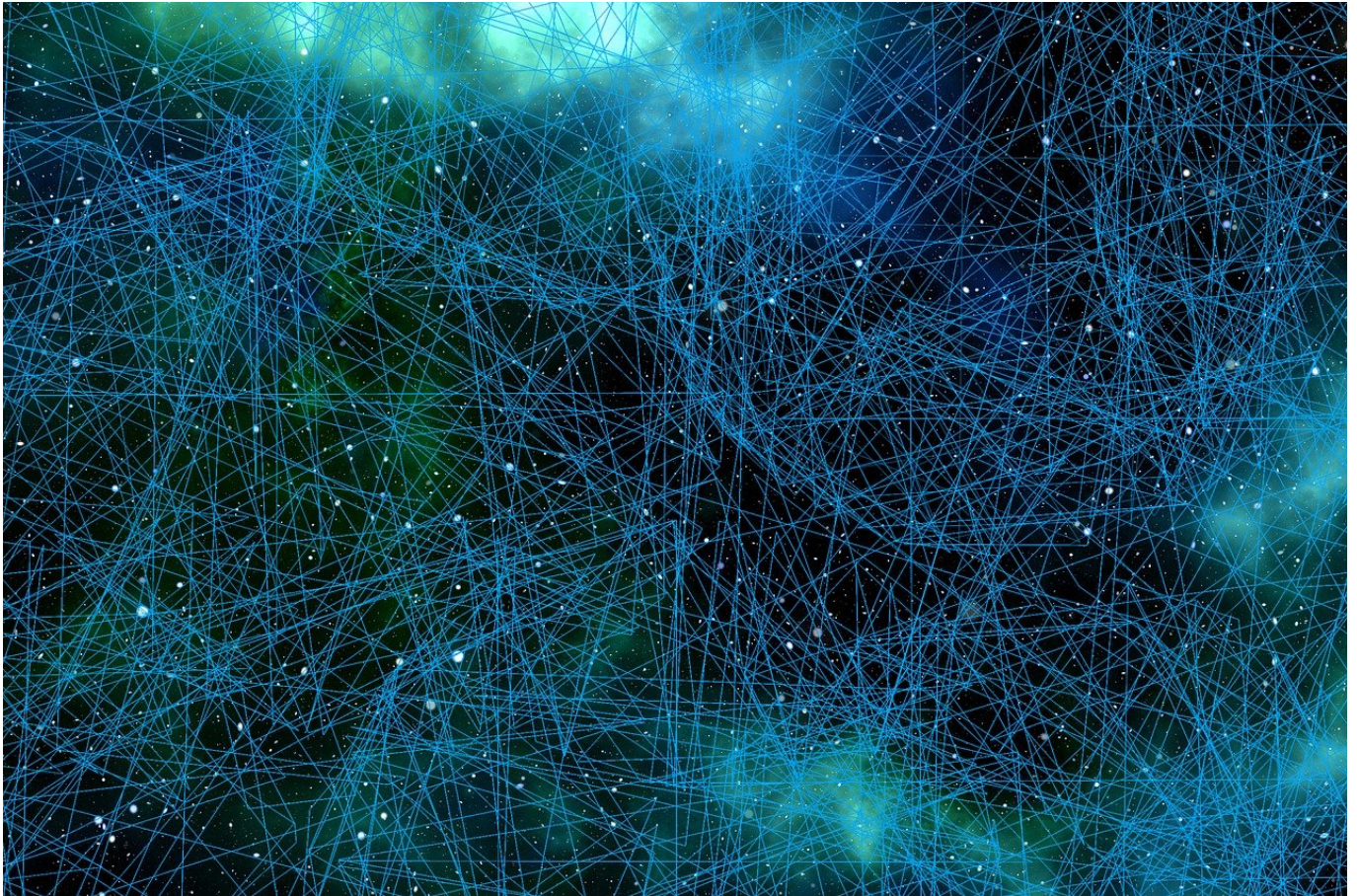


Contacts as a Verb

Definitions of "Contacts" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "contacts" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Be in direct physical contact with; make contact.*
- *Be in or establish communication with.*



Synonyms of "Contacts" as a verb (6 Words)

adjoin Lie adjacent to another or share a boundary.
*Canada **adjoins** the U.S.*

get hold of Receive as a retribution or punishment.

get through Receive a specified treatment (abstract).

meet	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition no restriction. <i>Meet a violent death.</i>
reach	Reach a goal e.g. <i>Television reached those parts of the electorate that other news sources could not.</i>
touch	Perceive via the tactile sense. <i>There is no one who can touch him at lightweight judo.</i>

- *The wire must not contact the metal cover.*
- *He never contacted his children after he emigrated to Australia.*

available	(of a person) not otherwise occupied; free to do something. <i>Community health services available to Londoners.</i>
communicate	Convey or transmit (an emotion or feeling) in a non-verbal way. <i>He communicated his anxieties to the psychiatrist.</i> A bold challenge.
confrontation	<i>Four months of violent confrontation between government and opposition forces.</i>
conjugal	Relating to marriage or the relationship between a married couple. <i>Conjugal loyalty.</i>
connect	Make a logical or causal connection. <i>The planes don't connect and you will have to wait for four hours.</i>
connected	Wired together to an alarm system. <i>First check to see whether the appliance is connected.</i>
convenient	Large and roomy convenient is archaic in this sense. <i>I phoned your office to confirm that this date is convenient.</i>
entree	The act of entering. <i>She made a graceful entree into the ballroom.</i>
freely	Not under the control of another; as one wishes. <i>Air can freely circulate.</i>
handy	Ready to hand. <i>The brush is handy for vacuuming stubborn dust and dirt.</i>
introduce	Put or introduce into something. <i>Introduce a rule.</i>
involvement	The condition of sharing in common with others (as fellows or partners etc). <i>He escaped involvement in the accident.</i>
liaison	A usually secretive or illicit sexual relationship. <i>The head porter works in close liaison with the reception office.</i>
link	Link with or as with a yoke. <i>She linked up with an artistic group.</i>
meet	Meet by design be present at the arrival of. <i>Meet a violent death.</i>
network	Broadcast a programme on a network. <i>The networks compete to broadcast important sports events.</i>
obtainable	Able to be obtained. <i>Savings of up to 50 percent are obtainable.</i>

<u>phone</u>	Phonetics an individual sound unit of speech without concern as to whether or not it is a phoneme of some language. <i>It was not the typing but the earphones that she disliked.</i>
platonic	Free from physical desire. <i>Their relationship is purely platonic.</i>
relationship	A relation between people relationship is often used where relation would serve as in the relationship between inflation and unemployment but the preferred usage of relationship is for human relations or states of relatedness. <i>The landlord tenant relationship.</i>
<u>reunite</u>	Unify again, as of a country. <i>The three friends reunited in 1959.</i>
scandal	The outrage or anger caused by a scandalous action or event. <i>It s a scandal that many older patients are dismissed as untreatable.</i>
tangency	(electronics) a junction where things (as two electrical conductors) touch or are in physical contact.
usable	Fit or ready for use or service. <i>Usable byproducts.</i>
