## Associations of "Containment" (30 Words)

<b><u>bulge</u></b>	Bulge out form a bulge outward or be so full as to appear to bulge. <i>The gun in his pocket made an obvious <b>bulge</b>.</i>
<b><u>carry</u></b>	An act of carrying something from one place to another. <i>I always <b>carry</b> money.</i>
<b>comprehensive</b>	A comprehensive school. <i>A <b>comprehensive</b> list of sources.</i>
<b><u>comprise</u></b>	Form or compose. <i>A totally new idea is <b>comprised</b> in this paper.</i>
<b>connote</b>	Involve as a necessary condition of consequence; as in logic. <i>Spinsterhood <b>connoted</b> failure.</i>
<b><u>correlate</u></b>	Either of two or more related or complementary variables. <i>Do these facts <b>correlate</b>.</i>
<b>cover</b>	Cover as if with a shroud. <i>Is this enough to <b>cover</b> the check.</i>
<b>encompass</b>	Include comprehensively. <i>An act designed to <b>encompass</b> the death of the king.</i>
<b><u>entail</u></b>	The act of entailing property the creation of a fee tail from a fee simple. <i>Her father s estate was <b>entailed</b> on a cousin.</i>
<b>entangle</b>	Twist together or entwine into a confusing mass. <i>They were suspicious of becoming <b>entangled</b> in a civil war.</i>
<b>envelop</b>	Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>A figure <b>enveloped</b> in a black cloak.</i>
<b>fill</b>	Fill or meet a want or need. <i>He had <b>filled</b> the post in an acting capacity for some time.</i>
<b>filled</b>	Of purchase orders that have been filled. <i>Fog <b>filled</b> air.</i>

<b>full</b>	Make something full fill up. <i>The <b>fuller</b> figure.</i>
<b>have</b>	Have sex with. <i>God <b>have</b> mercy on me.</i>
<b>hold</b>	Lessen the intensity of temper hold in restraint hold or keep within limits. <i><b>Hold</b> your breath.</i>
<b><u>implicate</u></b>	Bring into intimate and incriminating connection. <i>By saying that coffee would keep her awake Mary <b>implicated</b> that she didn't want any.</i>
<b>include</b>	Consider as part of something. <i>The list <b>includes</b> the names of many famous writers.</i>
<b>included</b>	Contained as part of a whole being considered. <i>Service tax <b>included</b>.</i>
<b>inclusion</b>	The relation of comprising something. <i>They have been selected for <b>inclusion</b> in the scheme.</i>
<b>incorporate</b>	Formed or united into a whole. <i>He has <b>incorporated</b> in his proposals a number of measures.</i>
<b><u>involve</u></b>	Have or include (something) as a necessary or integral part or result. <i>My job <b>involves</b> a lot of travelling.</i>
<b><u>occupied</u></b>	Held or filled or in use. <i>She keeps her time well <b>occupied</b>.</i>
<b><u>packed</u></b>	Pressed together or compressed. <i>A <b>packed</b> theater.</i>
<b>paperback</b>	Having a flexible binding. <i>The shelves were stacked with well thumbed <b>paperbacks</b>.</i>
<b><u>pertain</u></b>	Be appropriate, related, or applicable to. <i>The shop premises and stock and all assets <b>pertaining</b> to the business.</i>
<b>replete</b>	Fill to satisfaction. <i>Sensational popular fiction <b>replete</b> with adultery and sudden death.</i>
<b>restock</b>	Replenish (a store) with fresh stock or supplies. <i>He <b>restocked</b> his land with pheasants.</i>
<b>sate</b>	Fill to satisfaction. <i>I am <b>sated</b>.</i>
<b>subsume</b>	Consider (an instance of something) as part of a general rule or principle. <i>Most of these phenomena can be <b>subsumed</b> under two broad categories.</i>
