allegation	A claim or assertion that someone has done something illegal or wrong, typically one made without proof. An <b>allegation</b> of malpractice.
arguing	A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement.
<u>argument</u>	An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression y F x x the arguments of the function F are x and x and the value is y. <i>I ve had an <b>argument</b> with my father.</i>
claim	An application for compensation under the terms of an insurance policy. <i>His claim that he was innocent.</i>
competition	Interaction between animal or plant species, or individual organisms, that are attempting to gain a share of a limited environmental resource. <i>A beauty competition</i> .



contestation	A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. Ideological <b>contestation</b> over social policy in the European Union.
<u>controversy</u>	Prolonged public disagreement or heated discussion. The design of the building has caused <b>controversy</b> .
<u>disagreement</u>	A conflict of people's opinions or actions or characters. There was some <b>disagreement</b> about the details.
disceptation	Disputation, debate, discussion; an instance of this.
disputation	A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. <i>Scholastic disputations</i> .
dispute	A disagreement or argument. <i>He had a <b>dispute</b> with his wife.</i>
<u>plea</u>	A defendant's answer by a factual matter (as distinguished from a demurrer. Her <b>plea</b> of a headache was not entirely false.
<u>rivalry</u>	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. There always has been intense <b>rivalry</b> between the clubs.
submission	The condition of having submitted to control by someone or something else. <i>They were forced into submission</i> .
tilt	A combat between two mounted knights tilting against each other with blunted lances. <i>The court s tilt toward conservative rulings.</i>
<u>variance</u>	The fact or quality of being different, divergent, or inconsistent. <i>A zoning variance</i> .



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### Usage Examples of "Contention" as a noun

- Freud's contention that all dreams were wish fulfilment.
- The teams were in fierce contention for first place.
- The captured territory was the main area of contention between the two countries.

Causing or likely to cause an argument; controversial. A central and <b>contentious</b> element of the book.
An inclination to be quarrelsome and contentious.
An occasion on which a winner is selected from among two or more contestants. A coalition was formed to <b>contest</b> the presidential elections.
Prolonged public disagreement or heated discussion. The design of the building has caused <b>controversy</b> .
Make a counterattack.
Open to doubt or debate. It is <b>debatable</b> whether the country is coming out of recession.
Have an argument about something. Last night s <b>debate</b> on the Education Bill.
The speech act of disagreeing or arguing or disputing. <b>Disagreement</b> s between parents and adolescents.
Lack of agreement or harmony between things. <i>We <b>discord</b>ed commonly on two points.</i>
Fond of having heated arguments. It s a congenial hang out for <b>disputatious</b> academics.
A disagreement or argument about something important. An industrial <b>dispute</b> .
Disagreement that leads to discord. The mill was the cause of a <b>dissension</b> in 1620.
Be engaged in a fight carry on a fight. The men were <b>fight</b> ing.
Norwegian chemist noted for his research on organic molecules (1897-1981.
Prepare and issue for public distribution or sale. I like him though I have some <b>issue</b> s with the guy.
Of or relating to litigation. Our increasingly <b>litigious</b> society.
Of or involving strongly critical or disputatious writing or speech. A <b>polemical</b> essay.



<u>quarrel</u>	A heated argument or disagreement, typically about a trivial issue and between people who are usually on good terms. <i>They had a <b>quarrel</b>.</i>
quarrelsome	Given to or characterized by quarrelling. <i>Quarrelsome</i> when drinking.
<u>rivalry</u>	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. There always has been intense <b>rivalry</b> between the clubs.
row	The act of rowing as a sport. Her villa stood in a <b>row</b> of similar ones.
strife	Trouble or difficulty of any kind. Decades of civil <b>strife</b> .
<u>wrangle</u>	Have a long, complicated dispute or argument. An insurance <b>wrangle</b> is holding up compensation payments.
wrangling	An instance of intense argument (as in bargaining. Weeks of political <b>wrangling</b> .
