dispute

A disagreement or argument.

He had a **dispute** with his wife.

A defendant's answer by a factual matter (as distinguished from a

plea demurrer.

Her **plea** of a headache was not entirely false.

The act of competing as for profit or a prize.

There always has been intense **rivalry** between the clubs.

submission The condition of having submitted to control by someone or something else.

They were forced into **submission**.

A combat between two mounted knights tilting against each other with

tilt blunted lances.

The court s tilt toward conservative rulings.

variance The fact or quality of being different, divergent, or inconsistent.

A zoning **variance**.
