Definitions of "Contentment" as a noun

- *Happiness with one's situation in life.*
- *A state of happiness and satisfaction.*



Synonyms of "Contentment" as a noun (4 Words)

- content** The state of being contented with your situation in life.
*The greater part of the century was a time of **content**.*
- contentedness** A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement.
*He relaxed in sleepy **contentedness**.*
- fulfilment** The achievement of something desired, promised, or predicted.
*The need to eliminate excess by the security forces in **fulfilment** of their duties.*
- satisfaction** The payment of a debt or fulfilment of an obligation or claim.
*In full and final **satisfaction** of the claim.*



Usage Examples of "Contentment" as a noun

- *He found contentment in living a simple life in the country.*



Associations of "Contentment" (30 Words)

- blessedness** The state of being blessed with divine favour.
- bliss** A state of extreme happiness.
*The **bliss** of heaven.*
- complacency** A feeling of smug or uncritical satisfaction with oneself or one's achievements.
*The figures are better but there are no grounds for **complacency**.*
- content** The state of being contented with your situation in life.
*They could read to their hearts **content**.*
- delectation** Pleasure and delight.
*They had all manner of rock n roll goodies for our **delectation**.*
- delight** Take delight in.
*She took great **delight** in telling your story.*

delighted	Feeling or showing great pleasure. <i>We were delighted to see her.</i>
ecstasy	A state of being carried away by overwhelming emotion. <i>There was a look of ecstasy on his face.</i>
enjoy	Derive or receive pleasure from get enjoyment from take pleasure in. <i>The security forces enjoy legal immunity from prosecution.</i>
enjoyable	Affording satisfaction or pleasure. <i>The company was enjoyable.</i>
euphoria	A feeling or state of intense excitement and happiness. <i>In his euphoria he had become convinced he could defeat them.</i>
exult	Feel extreme happiness or elation. <i>Who cannot exult in Spring.</i>
exultant	Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the exultant crowds.</i>
felicity	Intense happiness. <i>Domestic felicity.</i>
glad	Causing happiness. <i>Glad of the fire s warmth.</i>
gladden	Make glad. <i>The high childish laugh was a sound that gladdened her heart.</i>
gratification	Pleasure, especially when gained from the satisfaction of a desire. <i>Dull repetitious work gives no gratification.</i>
gratify	Yield (to); give satisfaction to. <i>She was gratified to see the shock in Jim's eyes.</i>
happiness	State of well-being characterized by emotions ranging from contentment to intense joy. <i>She struggled to find happiness in her life.</i>
happy	Used in greetings. <i>I m happy with his performance.</i>
joy	A thing that causes joy. <i>A joy to behold.</i>
joyous	Full of or characterized by joy. <i>Joyous laughter.</i>
merriment	Gaiety and fun. <i>Her eyes sparkled with merriment.</i>
please	It is someone's choice to do something. <i>What type of fish is this please.</i>

- pleasure** Sexual gratification.
*The touch of his fingers gave her such **pleasure**.*
- rapture** Expressions of intense pleasure or enthusiasm about something.
*People will be **raptured** out of automobiles as they are driving along.*
- rejoice** Used ironically to draw attention to a strange characteristic, especially a name.
*The guard **rejoiced** in the name of Blossom.*
- satisfaction** What is felt to be owed or due to one, especially in reparation of an injustice or wrong.
*I looked round with **satisfaction**.*
- satisfy** Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction.
*There was insufficient collateral to **satisfy** the loan.*
- thrilled** Feeling intense pleasurable excitement.
