### Definitions of "Contest" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “contest” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An occasion on which a winner is selected from among two or more contestants.*
- *A competition for a political position.*
- *A struggle between rivals.*
- *An event in which people compete for supremacy in a sport or other activity, or in a quality.*
- *A dispute or conflict.*



## Synonyms of "Contest" as a noun (18 Words)

- battle** An open clash between two opposing groups (or individuals).  
*The **battle** lasted for several hours.*
- clash** A sports fixture (used chiefly in journalism).  
*A **clash** of tweeds and a striped shirt.*
- collision** An instance of simultaneous transmission by more than one node of a network.  
*The **collision** of the two ships resulted in a serious oil spill.*
- combat** Non-violent conflict or opposition.  
*A **combat** zone.*
- competition** The activity or condition of striving to gain or win something by defeating or establishing superiority over others.  
***Competition** with ungulates or condylarths appears to have been the undoing of marsupials in North America.*

<b>conflict</b>	A state of mind in which a person experiences a clash of opposing feelings or needs. <i>He was immobilized by <b>conflict</b> and indecision.</i>
<b>confrontation</b>	A situation where two players or sides compete to win a sporting contest. <i>The race promised a classic <b>confrontation</b> between the two top runners in the world.</i>
<b>duel</b>	A contest with deadly weapons arranged between two people in order to settle a point of honour. <i>He won by a short head after a great final furlong <b>duel</b>.</i>
<b>feud</b>	A prolonged and bitter quarrel or dispute. <i>His long standing <b>feud</b> with Universal Pictures.</i>
<b>fight</b>	The act of fighting any contest or struggle. <i>He had another <b>fight</b> with Katie.</i>
<b>game</b>	The equipment for a game especially a board game or a video game. <i>This was a <b>game</b> of shuttle diplomacy at which I had become adept.</i>
<b>match</b>	The score needed to win a match. <i>Stones of a perfect <b>match</b> and colour.</i>
<b>meet</b>	A meeting typically one with an illicit purpose. <i>The <b>meet</b> with Frank is on for 10 o'clock.</i>
<b>race</b>	A series of races for horses or dogs held at a fixed time on a set course. <i>Some biologists doubt that there are important genetic differences between <b>races</b> of human beings.</i>
<b>skirmish</b>	A minor short-term fight. <i>The unit was caught in several <b>skirmishes</b> and the commanding officer was killed.</i>
<b>struggle</b>	A very difficult task. <i>The <b>struggle</b> to get through the crowd exhausted her.</i>
<b>tournament</b>	A modern event involving display of military techniques and exercises. <i>The Royal <b>Tournament</b>.</i>
<b>tussle</b>	Disorderly fighting. <i>There was a <b>tussle</b> for the ball.</i>

<b>enter</b>	Set out on an enterprise or subject of study. <i>A solicitor <b>entered</b> a plea of guilty on her behalf.</i>
<b>fight for</b>	Be engaged in a fight; carry on a fight.
<b>fight in</b>	Make a strenuous or labored effort.
<b>fight over</b>	Exert oneself continuously, vigorously, or obtrusively to gain an end or engage in a crusade for a certain cause or person; be an advocate for.
<b>go in for</b>	Be abolished or discarded.
<b>object to</b>	Be averse to or express disapproval of.
<b>oppose</b>	Be resistant to. <i>A majority of the electorate <b>opposed</b> EC membership.</i>
<b>participate in</b>	Become a participant; be involved in.

<b>put one's name down for</b>	Cause (someone) to undergo something.
<b>quarrel over</b>	Have a disagreement over something.
<b>repugn</b>	To affect a person with repugnance or aversion Also without object to cause repugnance.
<b><u>resist</u></b>	Stand up or offer resistance to somebody or something. <i>Antibodies help us to <b>resist</b> infection.</i>
<b>strive against</b>	Attempt by employing effort.
<b>struggle against</b>	Be engaged in a fight; carry on a fight.
<b>struggle for</b>	Make a strenuous or labored effort.
<b>take a stand against</b>	Have with oneself; have on one's person.
<b>take issue with</b>	Accept or undergo, often unwillingly.
<b>take part in</b>	Travel or go by means of a certain kind of transportation, or a certain route.
<b>tussle for</b>	Make messy or untidy.
<b>vie for</b>	Compete for something; engage in a contest; measure oneself against others.

<b>competitive</b>	Involving competition or competitiveness. <i>A car industry <b>competitive</b> with any in the world.</i>
<b>competitor</b>	An organization or country engaged in commercial or economic competition with others. <i>Our main industrial <b>competitors</b>.</i>
<u><b>contend</b></u>	Succeed in doing, achieving, or producing (something) with the limited or inadequate means available. <i>He <b>contends</b> that the judge was wrong.</i>
<u><b>contender</b></u>	A person or group competing with others to achieve something. <i>The major <b>contenders</b> in the football championship.</i>
<u><b>contention</b></u>	A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. <i>The teams were in fierce <b>contention</b> for first place.</i>
<u><b>contentious</b></u>	Inclined or showing an inclination to dispute or disagree, even to engage in law suits. <i>A style described as abrasive and <b>contentious</b>.</i>
<b>contestant</b>	A person who participates in competitions. <i>An anxious <b>contestant</b> on a television quiz show.</i>
<u><b>discord</b></u>	Lack of agreement or harmony between things. <i>A prosperous family who showed no signs of <b>discord</b>.</i>
<u><b>divisive</b></u>	Tending to cause disagreement or hostility between people. <i>The highly <b>divisive</b> issue of abortion.</i>
<b>internecine</b>	Destructive to both sides in a conflict. <i>The region's history of savage <b>internecine</b> warfare.</i>
<b>interscholastic</b>	Used of competition or cooperation between secondary schools.
<b>opponent</b>	Someone who offers opposition. <i>The news will delight <b>opponents</b> of GM foods.</i>
<b>opposing</b>	Facing; opposite. <i>The brothers fought on <b>opposing</b> sides in the war.</i>
<b>pentathlon</b>	An athletic event comprising five different events for each competitor in particular also modern pentathlon an event involving fencing shooting swimming riding and cross country running.
<b>popularity</b>	The state or condition of being liked, admired, or supported by many people. <i>The universal <b>popularity</b> of American movies.</i>

<b>quiz</b>	An examination consisting of a few short questions. <i>A pub <b>quiz</b>.</i>
<b>rival</b>	Be the rival of be in competition with. <i>Nothing can <b>rival</b> cotton for durability.</i>
<b>rivalry</b>	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. <i>There always has been intense <b>rivalry</b> between the clubs.</i>
<b>strive</b>	To exert much effort or energy. <i>We must <b>strive</b> to secure steady growth.</i>
<b>struggle</b>	A forceful or violent effort to get free of restraint or resist attack. <i>Many families on income support have to <b>struggle</b> to make ends meet.</i>
<b>vie</b>	Compete for something; engage in a contest; measure oneself against others. <i>The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.</i>
<b>win</b>	Win something through one's efforts. <i><b>Win</b> points.</i>
