According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "continual" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Having no interruptions.
- Forming a sequence in which the same action or event is repeated frequently.
- Occurring without interruption; chiefly restricted to what recurs regularly or frequently in a prolonged and closely spaced series.
- Recurring regularly or frequently in a prolonged and closely spaced series.
- `continual' (meaning seemingly uninterrupted) is often used interchangeably with `continuous' (meaning without interruption.

There were **repeated** attempts to negotiate.

unending Having or seeming to have no end. The **unending** bliss of heaven.
