Continual as an Adjective

Definitions of "Continual" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “continual” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Having no interruptions.*
- *Forming a sequence in which the same action or event is repeated frequently.*
- *Occurring without interruption; chiefly restricted to what recurs regularly or frequently in a prolonged and closely spaced series.*
- *Recurring regularly or frequently in a prolonged and closely spaced series.*
- *'continual' (meaning seemingly uninterrupted) is often used interchangeably with 'continuous' (meaning without interruption).*



Synonyms of "Continual" as an adjective (14 Words)

- constant** Occurring continuously over a period of time.
*Maintained a **constant** temperature.*
- continuous** Forming a series with no exceptions or reversals.
*A **continuous** bout of illness lasting six months.*
- endless** Countless; innumerable.
*The list is **endless**.*
- eternal** Lasting or existing forever; without end.
***Eternal** quarreling.*
- everlasting** Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers.
*The damned would suffer **everlasting** torment.*
- frequent** Frequently encountered.
***Frequent** changes in policy.*
- never-ending** Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.
- perennial** Apparently permanently engaged in a specified role or way of life.
***Perennial** happiness.*
- perpetual** Denoting or having a position, job, or trophy held for life.
*Deep caves in **perpetual** darkness.*
- recurrent** Occurring often or repeatedly.
*She had a **recurrent** dream about falling.*

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| recurring | (of a thought, image, or memory) repeatedly coming back to a person's mind. <i>Gratitude is a recurring theme in the book.</i> |
| regular | In accord with regular practice or procedure. <i>I couldn't get an appointment with my regular barber.</i> |
| repeated | Done or occurring again several times in the same way. <i>There were repeated attempts to negotiate.</i> |
| unending | Having or seeming to have no end. <i>The unending bliss of heaven.</i> |



Usage Examples of "Continual" as an adjective

- *His plane went down after continual attacks.*
- *The continual banging of the shutters.*
- *Some patients need continual safeguarding.*
- *'continual' is often used interchangeably with 'continuous.'*

| <u>perennial</u> | A perennial plant. <i>His perennial distrust of the media.</i> |
| perpetual | Occurring repeatedly; so frequent as to seem endless and uninterrupted. <i>The perpetual struggle to maintain standards in a democracy.</i> |
| <u>perpetuity</u> | A bond or other security with no fixed maturity date. <i>He did not believe in the perpetuity of military rule.</i> |
| persistent | Continuing to exist or occur over a prolonged period. <i>One of the government's most persistent critics.</i> |
| <u>recurrence</u> | The fact of occurring again. <i>A drug used to prevent the recurrence of breast cancer.</i> |
| <u>recurrent</u> | Recurring again and again. <i>She had a recurrent dream about falling.</i> |
| <u>recurring</u> | Occurring again periodically or repeatedly. <i>They are haunted by a recurring image of their daughter on the night she died.</i> |
| <u>relentless</u> | Unceasingly intense. <i>The relentless beat of the drums.</i> |
| repeated | Recurring again and again. <i>There were repeated attempts to negotiate.</i> |
| <u>repetitive</u> | Repetitive and persistent. <i>Repetitive movement.</i> |
| <u>sequence</u> | Ascertain the sequence of amino acid or nucleotide residues in a protein DNA etc. <i>The poems should be read in sequence.</i> |
| seriatim | Taking one subject after another in regular order; point by point. <i>It is proposed to deal with these matters seriatim.</i> |
| <u>steady</u> | In a steady manner. <i>A steady gaze.</i> |

- unceasing** Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.
*The **unceasing** efforts of the staff.*
- unceasingly** With unflagging resolve.
- unchanging** Not changing; remaining the same.
*The party stood for **unchanging** principles.*
- uninterrupted** (of a view) unobstructed.
*Moving midweek holidays to the nearest Monday or Friday allows **uninterrupted** work weeks.*
- unrelenting** Not giving way to kindness or compassion.
*The heat was **unrelenting**.*
- unremitting** Never relaxing or slackening; incessant.
***Unremitting** demands of hunger.*
