## Continual as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Continual" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “continual” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Having no interruptions.*
- *Forming a sequence in which the same action or event is repeated frequently.*
- *Occurring without interruption; chiefly restricted to what recurs regularly or frequently in a prolonged and closely spaced series.*
- *Recurring regularly or frequently in a prolonged and closely spaced series.*
- *`continual' (meaning seemingly uninterrupted) is often used interchangeably with `continuous' (meaning without interruption).*



## Synonyms of "Continual" as an adjective (14 Words)

<b>constant</b>	Occurring continuously over a period of time. <i>Maintained a <b>constant</b> temperature.</i>
<b>continuous</b>	Forming a series with no exceptions or reversals. <i>A <b>continuous</b> bout of illness lasting six months.</i>
<b>endless</b>	Countless; innumerable. <i>The list is <b>endless</b>.</i>
<b><u>eternal</u></b>	Lasting or existing forever; without end. <i><b>Eternal</b> quarreling.</i>
<b>everlasting</b>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>The damned would suffer <b>everlasting</b> torment.</i>
<b><u>frequent</u></b>	Frequently encountered. <i><b>Frequent</b> changes in policy.</i>
<b>never-ending</b>	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.
<b><u>perennial</u></b>	Apparently permanently engaged in a specified role or way of life. <i><b>Perennial</b> happiness.</i>
<b>perpetual</b>	Denoting or having a position, job, or trophy held for life. <i>Deep caves in <b>perpetual</b> darkness.</i>
<b><u>recurrent</u></b>	Occurring often or repeatedly. <i>She had a <b>recurrent</b> dream about falling.</i>

<b><u>recurring</u></b>	(of a thought, image, or memory) repeatedly coming back to a person's mind. <i>Gratitude is a <b>recurring</b> theme in the book.</i>
<b>regular</b>	In accord with regular practice or procedure. <i>I couldn't get an appointment with my <b>regular</b> barber.</i>
<b>repeated</b>	Done or occurring again several times in the same way. <i>There were <b>repeated</b> attempts to negotiate.</i>
<b><u>unending</u></b>	Having or seeming to have no end. <i>The <b>unending</b> bliss of heaven.</i>



### Usage Examples of "Continual" as an adjective

- *His plane went down after continual attacks.*
- *The continual banging of the shutters.*
- *Some patients need continual safeguarding.*
- *'continual' is often used interchangeably with 'continuous.'*

<b><u>ceaseless</u></b>	Constant and unending. <i>The fort was subjected to <b>ceaseless</b> bombardment.</i>
<b>changeless</b>	Remaining the same. <i><b>Changeless</b> truths.</i>
<b>constant</b>	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>Maintained a <b>constant</b> temperature.</i>
<b>continuous</b>	Continuing in time or space without interruption- James Jeans. <i>The whole performance is enacted in one <b>continuous</b> movement.</i>
<b>endless</b>	Infinitely great in number. <i><b>Endless</b> debates.</i>
<b><u>ever</u></b>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>He toyed with his <b>ever</b> present cigar.</i>

<b>everlasting</b>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>The damned would suffer <b>everlasting</b> torment.</i>
<b>incessant</b>	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>Night and day we live with the <b>incessant</b> noise of the city.</i>
<b>incessantly</b>	Without interruption. <i>She talked about him <b>incessantly</b>.</i>
<b><u>nonstop</u></b>	At all times. <i>How many <b>nonstops</b> are there to Dallas.</i>
<b><u>perennial</u></b>	A perennial plant. <i>His <b>perennial</b> distrust of the media.</i>
<b>perpetual</b>	Occurring repeatedly; so frequent as to seem endless and uninterrupted. <i>The <b>perpetual</b> struggle to maintain standards in a democracy.</i>
<b><u>perpetuity</u></b>	A bond or other security with no fixed maturity date. <i>He did not believe in the <b>perpetuity</b> of military rule.</i>
<b>persistent</b>	Continuing to exist or occur over a prolonged period. <i>One of the government's most <b>persistent</b> critics.</i>
<b><u>recurrence</u></b>	The fact of occurring again. <i>A drug used to prevent the <b>recurrence</b> of breast cancer.</i>
<b><u>recurrent</u></b>	Recurring again and again. <i>She had a <b>recurrent</b> dream about falling.</i>
<b><u>recurring</u></b>	Occurring again periodically or repeatedly. <i>They are haunted by a <b>recurring</b> image of their daughter on the night she died.</i>
<b><u>relentless</u></b>	Unceasingly intense. <i>The <b>relentless</b> beat of the drums.</i>
<b>repeated</b>	Recurring again and again. <i>There were <b>repeated</b> attempts to negotiate.</i>
<b><u>repetitive</u></b>	Repetitive and persistent. <i><b>Repetitive</b> movement.</i>
<b><u>sequence</u></b>	Ascertain the sequence of amino acid or nucleotide residues in a protein DNA etc. <i>The poems should be read in <b>sequence</b>.</i>
<b>seriatim</b>	Taking one subject after another in regular order; point by point. <i>It is proposed to deal with these matters <b>seriatim</b>.</i>
<b><u>steady</u></b>	In a steady manner. <i>A <b>steady</b> gaze.</i>

<b>unceasing</b>	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The <b>unceasing</b> efforts of the staff.</i>
<b>unceasingly</b>	With unflagging resolve.
<b>unchanging</b>	Not changing; remaining the same. <i>The party stood for <b>unchanging</b> principles.</i> (of a view) unobstructed.
<b>uninterrupted</b>	<i>Moving midweek holidays to the nearest Monday or Friday allows <b>uninterrupted</b> work weeks.</i>
<b>unrelenting</b>	Not giving way to kindness or compassion. <i>The heat was <b>unrelenting</b>.</i>
<b>unremitting</b>	Never relaxing or slackening; incessant. <i><b>Unremitting</b> demands of hunger.</i>
