## Continuation as a Noun

### Definitions of "Continuation" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “continuation” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The consequence of being lengthened in duration.*
- *The action of carrying something on over time or the state of being carried on.*
- *A Gestalt principle of organization holding that there is an innate tendency to perceive a line as continuing its established direction.*
- *The act of continuing an activity without interruption.*
- *A part that is attached to and is an extension of something else.*
- *A part added to a book or play that continues and extends it.*
- *The state of remaining in a particular position or condition.*



## Synonyms of "Continuation" as a noun (13 Words)

<b>addition</b>	A component that is added to something to improve it. <i>He was a new <b>addition</b> to the staff.</i>
<b>carrying on</b>	The act of carrying something.
<b>continuance</b>	The state of remaining in existence or operation. <i>The trademarks shall be used only during the <b>continuance</b> of this agreement.</i>
<b><u>extension</u></b>	Amount or degree or range to which something extends. <i>The railway's southern <b>extension</b>.</i>
<b>good continuation</b>	Articles of commerce.
<b>law of continuation</b>	Legal document setting forth rules governing a particular kind of activity.
<b>lengthiness</b>	The consequence of being lengthened in duration.

<b>prolongation</b>	Extension of the spatial length of something. <i>The position is advertised for two years but <b>prolongation</b> is possible.</i>
<b>protraction</b>	The consequence of being lengthened in duration. <i>The <b>protraction</b> of the war.</i>
<b>renewal</b>	The conversion of wasteland into land suitable for use of habitation or cultivation. <i>A <b>renewal</b> of his passport.</i>
<a href="#">restart</a>	A new start or beginning. <i>They ordered the <b>restart</b> of the talks.</i>
<b>resumption</b>	The action, on the part of the Crown or other authority, of reassuming possession of lands, rights, etc., previously granted to another. <i>No decision was made for a <b>resumption</b> of diplomatic relations.</i>
<b>sequel</b>	Something that takes place after or as a result of an earlier event. <i>This encouragement to grow potatoes had a disastrous <b>sequel</b> some fifty years later.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Continuation" as a noun

- *Once a separate village, it is now a continuation of the suburbs.*
- *The government's continuation in office.*
- *The continuation of discussions about a permanent peace.*



## Associations of "Continuation" (30 Words)

### ceaseless

Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.  
*The fort was subjected to **ceaseless** bombardment.*

### constant

A number representing a quantity assumed to have a fixed value in a specified mathematical context.  
***Constant** as the northern star.*

### continual

Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption.  
*His plane went down after **continual** attacks.*

### continuance

The property of enduring or continuing in time.  
*The king's ministers depended on his favour for their **continuance** in office.*

<b>continuing</b>	Of long duration. <i>The act provided a <b>continuing</b> annual appropriation.</i>
<b>duration</b>	Continuance in time. <i>The ceremony was of short <b>duration</b>.</i>
<b>ever</b>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i><b>Ever</b> busy.</i>
<b>everlasting</b>	A flower of the daisy family with a papery texture, retaining its shape and colour after being dried, especially a helichrysum. <i>An <b>everlasting</b> reminder of this evening.</i>
<b>extend</b>	Continue or extend. <i><b>Extend</b> the TV antenna.</i>
<b>extension</b>	An additional telephone set that is connected to the same telephone line. <i>Most applications provide <b>extensions</b> for the files they create.</i>
<b>forever</b>	A very long time (used hyperbolically). <i>She took <b>forever</b> to write the paper.</i>
<b>grinding</b>	A harsh and strident sound as of the grinding of gears. <i>Crush it and add it to the honey with a <b>grinding</b> of pepper and salt.</i>
<b>incessant</b>	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>Night and day we live with the <b>incessant</b> noise of the city.</i>
<b>intension</b>	The internal content of a concept.
<b>lasting</b>	Lasting a long time without change. <i>A <b>lasting</b> relationship.</i>
<b>long</b>	Long dated securities especially gilts. <i>An experience they will <b>long</b> remember.</i>
<b>ongoing</b>	Currently happening. <i>An <b>ongoing</b> economic crisis.</i>
<b>perennial</b>	A perennial plant. <i><b>Perennial</b> manifestations of urban crisis.</i>
<b>permanence</b>	The state or quality of lasting or remaining unchanged indefinitely. <i>The clarity and <b>permanence</b> of the dyes.</i>
<b>permanency</b>	The property of being able to exist for an indefinite duration.
<b>perpetual</b>	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>A <b>perpetual</b> bond.</i>
<b>perpetuation</b>	The continuation or preservation of a situation, idea, etc. <i><b>Perpetuation</b> of the species is our purpose.</i>

- preservation** A process that saves organic substances from decay.  
*The chapel is in a poor state of **preservation**.*
- prolongation** The consequence of being lengthened in duration.  
*An agreement on further **prolongation** of the boundary proved difficult.*
- sequel** Something that follows something else.  
*This encouragement to grow potatoes had a disastrous **sequel** some fifty years later.*
- sequence** Ascertain the sequence of amino acid or nucleotide residues in a protein DNA etc.  
*The **sequence** of names was alphabetical.*
- stretch** Easily stretched.  
*I **stretched** out a weary arm to turn on my radio.*
- succession** The action of following in order.  
*The new king was already elderly at the time of his **succession**.*
- unceasing** Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.  
*Man s **unceasing** warfare with drought and isolation.*
- uninterrupted** Continuing in time or space without interruption.  
*Moving midweek holidays to the nearest Monday or Friday allows **uninterrupted** work weeks.*
