- *Be in contradiction with.*
- *Be in conflict with.*
- *Be resistant to.*
- *Deny the truth of (a statement) by asserting the opposite.*

<b>be at odds with</b>	Form or compose.
<b>be at variance with</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>be inconsistent with</b>	Be priced at.

<b>belie</b>	(of an appearance) fail to give a true impression of (something). <i>His lively alert manner <b>belied</b> his years.</i>
<b>challenge</b>	Issue a challenge to. <i>The illegal immigrant was <b>challenged</b> by the border guard.</i>
<b>clash with</b>	Crash together with violent impact.
<b>conflict with</b>	Go against, as of rules and laws.
<b>contravene</b>	Go against, as of rules and laws. <i>He <b>contravened</b> the Official Secrets Act.</i>
<b>controvert</b>	Deny the truth of (something). <i>The views in the article have been <b>controverted</b>.</i>
<b>counter</b>	Act in advance of; deal with ahead of time. <i>He <b>countered</b> with some very persuasive arguments.</i>
<b>deny</b>	Deny formally an allegation of fact by the opposing party in a legal suit. <i>There was no way that I was going to <b>deny</b> myself ice cream.</i>
<b>disagree with</b>	Be of different opinions.
<b>dispute</b>	Compete for; strive to win. <i>He taught and <b>disputed</b> with local poets.</i>
<b>give the lie to</b>	Endure the loss of.
<b>go against</b>	Pass from physical life and lose all bodily attributes and functions necessary to sustain life.
<b>negate</b>	Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of. <i>Alcohol <b>negates</b> the effects of the drug.</i>
<b>oppose</b>	Contrast with equal weight or force. <i>A candidate to <b>oppose</b> the leader in the presidential contest.</i>
<b>rebut</b>	Drive back or repel (a person or attack). <i>But he their sharp assault right boldly did <b>rebut</b>.</i>
<b>refute</b>	Prove that (someone) is wrong. <i>These claims have not been convincingly <b>refuted</b>.</i>
<b>run counter to</b>	Pass over, across, or through.

## Usage Examples of "Contradict" as a verb

- *He did not contradict her but just said nothing.*
- *The existing layout of the city contradicted the logic of the new centre.*
- *He did not contradict what he said last week.*
- *The survey appears to contradict the industry's claims.*

- *Within five minutes he had contradicted himself twice.*

<b>abnegation</b>	The denial and rejection of a doctrine or belief. <i><b>Abnegation</b> of political power.</i>
<b>belie</b>	Be in contradiction with. <i>His lively alert manner <b>belied</b> his years.</i>
<b>conflicting</b>	In disagreement- John Morley. <i>There are <b>conflicting</b> accounts of what occurred.</i>
<b>contravene</b>	Conflict with (a right, principle, etc.), especially to its detriment. <i>The Privy Council held that the prosecution <b>contravened</b> the rights of the individual.</i>
<b>contravention</b>	Coming into conflict with. <i>The publishing of misleading advertisements was a <b>contravention</b> of the Act.</i>
<b>controvert</b>	Be resistant to. <i>The views in the article have been <b>controverted</b>.</i>
<b>deny</b>	Deny oneself something restrain especially from indulging in some pleasure. <i>Both firms <b>deny</b> any responsibility for the tragedy.</i>
<b>disavow</b>	Deny any responsibility or support for. <i>Her husband <b>disavowed</b> her after 30 years of marriage and six children.</i>
<b>disavowal</b>	The denial of any responsibility or support for something; repudiation. <i>They know this despite their <b>disavowals</b>.</i>
<b>disclaim</b>	Make a disclaimer about. <i>He <b>disclaimed</b> any responsibility.</i>
<b>disown</b>	Refuse to acknowledge or maintain any connection with. <i>Lovell s rich family had <b>disowned</b> him because of his marriage.</i>
<b>dispute</b>	A disagreement or argument about something important. <i>The estate <b>disputes</b> that it is responsible for the embankment.</i>
<b>impugn</b>	Attack as false or wrong. <i>The father does not <b>impugn</b> her capacity as a good mother.</i>
<b>inadmissible</b>	(especially of evidence in court) not accepted as valid. <i>An <b>inadmissible</b> interference in the affairs of the Church.</i>
<b>misrepresent</b>	Give a false or misleading account of the nature of. <i>You are <b>misrepresenting</b> the views of the government.</i>

<b>negate</b>	Deny the existence of. <i>Alcohol <b>negates</b> the effects of the drug.</i>
<b>neutralize</b>	Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of. <i>The treaty <b>neutralized</b> the small republic.</i>
<b>no</b>	Not in any degree or manner not at all. <i><b>No</b> eggs left and <b>no</b> money to buy any.</i>
<b>nullify</b>	Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of. <i>Judges were unwilling to <b>nullify</b> government decisions.</i>
<b>objection</b>	(law) a procedure whereby a party to a suit says that a particular line of questioning or a particular witness or a piece of evidence or other matter is improper and should not be continued and asks the court to rule on its impropriety or illegality. <i>They have raised <b>no objections</b> to the latest plans.</i>
<b>oppose</b>	Contrast with equal weight or force. <i>A workers movement <b>opposed</b> the regime.</i>
<b>rebut</b>	Claim or prove that (evidence or an accusation) is false. <i>He had to <b>rebut</b> charges of acting for the convenience of his political friends.</i>
<b>rebuttal</b>	The speech act of refuting by offering a contrary contention or argument.
<b>refutation</b>	The act of determining that something is false. <i>Scientific theory is always tentative open to <b>refutation</b>.</i>
<b>refute</b>	Prove that (someone) is wrong. <i>His voice challenging his audience to rise and <b>refute</b> him.</i>
<b>reject</b>	Reject with contempt. <i>Some of the team s <b>rejects</b> have gone on to prove themselves in championships.</i>
<b>renounce</b>	Refuse to continue to recognize or abide by. <i>He <b>renounced</b> alcohol completely.</i>
<b>repudiate</b>	Refuse to acknowledge, ratify, or recognize as valid. <i>Breach of a condition gives the other party the right to <b>repudiate</b> a contract.</i>
<b>rescind</b>	Cancel officially. <i>The government eventually <b>rescinded</b> the directive.</i>
<b>resist</b>	Resist immunologically the introduction of some foreign tissue or organ. <i>The trees <b>resisted</b> her.</i>
