Definitions of "Convene" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “convene” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Come or bring together for a meeting or activity; assemble.*
- *Meet formally.*
- *Call together.*

Synonyms of "Convene" as a verb (13 Words)

assemble	Collect in one place. <i>The males assemble and hang by their front legs within a yard or two of the female.</i>
call	Lure by imitating the characteristic call of an animal. <i>I was called at 5 A M this morning.</i>
call together	Order or request or give a command for.
collect	Gather or collect. <i>I ve started collecting stamps.</i>
come together	Have a certain priority.

congregate	Come together, usually for a purpose. <i>Some 4 000 demonstrators had congregated at a border point.</i>
convoke	Call together. <i>She sent messages convoking a Council of Ministers.</i>
gather	Collect or gather. <i>He gathered himself for a tremendous leap.</i>
get together	Move into a desired direction of discourse.
meet	Fill or meet a want or need. <i>The curtains failed to meet in the middle.</i>
muster	Collect or assemble (a number or amount). <i>My father needed help with mustering sheep.</i>
order	Bring order to or into. <i>Her normally well ordered life.</i>
summon	Make an effort to produce (a particular quality or reaction) from within oneself. <i>Summon a lawyer.</i>

Usage Examples of "Convene" as a verb

- *The committee had convened for its final plenary session.*
- *The council convened last week.*
- *The students were convened in the auditorium.*
- *He had convened a secret meeting of military personnel.*

Associations of "Convene" (30 Words)

agenda	The underlying intentions or motives of a particular person or group. <i>The government had its own agenda.</i>
aggregation	A cluster of things that have come or been brought together. <i>The pelican is the other bird likely to be found in large aggregations in East Africa s wetlands.</i>
assemblage	A system of components assembled together for a particular purpose. <i>The assemblage of electronic image and text databases.</i>
assembly	The action of gathering together as a group for a common purpose. <i>An assembly of dockers and labourers.</i>
associational	Of or relating to associations or associationism.

<u>attend</u>	Escort and wait on (a member of royalty or other important person). <i>The children in the audience attended the recital quietly.</i>
attendee	A person who attends a conference or other gathering. <i>The gathering satisfied both organizers and attendees.</i>
caucus	Hold or form a legislative caucus. <i>He was forced out by a hard left caucus which had taken over his constituency party.</i>
ceremony	A formal religious or public occasion, especially one celebrating a particular event, achievement, or anniversary. <i>The ceremony of smelling the cork and tasting the wine.</i>
<u>chamber</u>	Place in a chamber. <i>The chambers of his heart were healthy.</i>
collect	Gather or collect. <i>She returned to her room to collect her thoughts.</i>
<u>collectible</u>	Things considered to be worth collecting (not necessarily valuable or antique). <i>A collectible bill.</i>
commission	A work produced in response to a commission. <i>She intended to apply for a commission in the army.</i>
<u>conclave</u>	The meeting place for a conclave.
<u>conference</u>	Take part in a conference or conference call. <i>He gathered all the men around the baize table for a conference.</i>
<u>congregate</u>	Gather into a crowd or mass. <i>The crowds congregated in front of the Vatican on Christmas Eve.</i>
congress	(often in names) a political society or organization. <i>An international congress of mathematicians.</i>
convocation	A large formal assembly of people. <i>The arguments delayed the convocation of the first congress planned for February 1992.</i>
convoke	Call together. <i>She sent messages convoking a Council of Ministers.</i>
cumulate	Be gathered together and combined. <i>The systems cumulate data over a period of years.</i>
debrief	Put someone through a debriefing and make him report. <i>In the debrief Gary gave his assessment of the trip and his performance.</i>
ecclesiastic	Of or associated with a church (especially a Christian Church). <i>Ecclesiastic history.</i>

fraternity	A religious or Masonic society or guild. <i>The ideals of liberty equality and fraternity.</i>
gathering	The act of gathering something. <i>A family gathering.</i>
meeting	A gathering of people, especially Quakers, for worship. <i>His meeting with the salesmen was the high point of his day.</i>
minutes	A written account of what transpired at a meeting.
placement	The temporary posting of someone in a workplace to enable them to gain work experience. <i>Students spend one year on industrial placement.</i>
plenary	Unqualified; absolute. <i>The House is expected to bring the legislative procedures bill to a plenary meeting.</i>
session	A period of recording music in a studio especially by a session musician. <i>He did the sessions for a Great Country Hits album.</i>
synod	A council convened to discuss ecclesiastical business. <i>The deanery synod.</i>
