Giving an advantage.
*A contract **advantageous** to our country.*

agreeable

Prepared to agree or consent.
*They were **agreeable** to its publication.*

appropriate

Suitable or proper in the circumstances.
*This isn't the **appropriate** time or place.*

auspicious

Auguring favorable circumstances and good luck.
*He was respectful to his **auspicious** customers.*

beneficial

Resulting in good; favourable or advantageous.
*The **beneficial** effects of a temperate climate.*

close to

Strictly confined or guarded.

commodious

Convenient.
*A **commodious** building suitable for conventions.*

encouraging

Giving someone support or confidence; supportive.
***Encouraging** advances in medical research.*

expedient	Serving to promote your interest. <i>Either side could break the agreement if it were expedient to do so.</i>
favourable	Giving consent. <i>The exhibitions received favourable reviews.</i>
felicitous	Marked by good fortune. <i>A felicitous speaker.</i>
fit	Meeting adequate standards for a purpose. <i>In no fit state to continue.</i>
fitting	Being precisely fitting and right. <i>Loose fitting trousers.</i>
fortuitous	Happening by a lucky chance; fortunate. <i>Fortuitous encounters strange accidents of fortune.</i>
fruitful	(of a person) producing many offspring. <i>And God said unto them Be fruitful and multiply.</i>
gainful	Serving to increase wealth or resources; providing money or other benefit. <i>He soon found gainful employment.</i>
handy for	Easy to reach.
happy	Fortunate and convenient. <i>I m happy with his performance.</i>
heaven-sent	Peculiarly fortunate or appropriate; as if by divine intervention.
helpful	Providing assistance or serving a useful function. <i>Helpful staff.</i>
just around the corner from	Used especially of what is legally or ethically right or proper or fitting- A.Lincoln.
near	Located on the nearside of a vehicle. <i>Walking in these shoes is the nearest thing to floating on air.</i>
near to	Very close in resemblance.
not far from	Located at a great distance in time or space or degree.
opportune	Done or occurring at a favourable time; well timed. <i>An opportune place to make camp.</i>
profitable	(of a business or activity) yielding profit or financial gain. <i>Profitable speculation on the stock market.</i>
promising	Full or promise. <i>A promising start to the season.</i>

<u>propitious</u>	Presenting favorable circumstances; likely to result in or show signs of success. <i>Propitious</i> omens.
providential	Peculiarly fortunate or appropriate; as if by divine intervention. <i>They took it for granted that the order of the world reflects a designing providential hand.</i>
rewarding	Providing satisfaction; gratifying. <i>A rewarding career as a paramedic.</i>
<u>suitable</u>	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i>These toys are not suitable for children under five.</i>
<u>suited</u>	Meant or adapted for an occasion or use. <i>A dark suited man.</i>
<u>timely</u>	Done or occurring at a favourable or useful time; opportune. <i>With timely treatment the patient has a good chance of recovery.</i>
trouble-free	Without problems or difficulties.
useful	Having a useful function. <i>The girl felt motherly and useful.</i>
valuable	Extremely useful or important. <i>A valuable antique.</i>
welcome	Used to indicate relief at relinquishing the control or possession of something to someone else. <i>Made the children feel welcome.</i>
well placed for	Resulting favorably.
well situated for	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.
well timed	Wise or advantageous and hence advisable.

- *The site would have to be convenient for London.*
- *The new car park will make shopping much more convenient.*
- *Guests were relaxing beneath a convenient palm tree.*
- *I phoned your office to confirm that this date is convenient.*

Capable of being read with comprehension.
*Making learning opportunities more **accessible** to adults.*

assuage

Make (an unpleasant feeling) less intense.
*The letter **assuaged** the fears of most members.*

available

Obtainable or accessible and ready for use or service.
*Do you think he s **available**.*

casual

A youth belonging to a subculture characterized by the wearing of expensive casual clothing and frequently associated with football hooliganism.
*A **casual** correspondence with a former teacher.*

clarification

The act of removing solid particles from a liquid.
*Please advise us if you require further **clarification**.*

comfortable	Providing or experiencing physical well-being or relief (‘comfy’ is informal. <i>The antihistamine made her feel more comfortable.</i>
conveniently	In a convenient manner. <i>The switch was conveniently located.</i>
cozy	Suggesting connivance. <i>A cozy arrangement with the police.</i>
ease	Of share prices interest rates etc decrease in value or amount. <i>I eased down the slope with care.</i>
easiness	The quality of being easy in behavior or style. <i>A natural easiness of manner.</i>
easy	With ease easy is sometimes used informally for easily. <i>The house is easy to heat.</i>
facilitate	Make (an action or process) easy or easier. <i>You could facilitate the process by sharing your knowledge.</i>
facilitation	The enhancement of the response of a neuron to a stimulus following prior stimulation. <i>The response is dependent on the frequency of stimulation and on neuromuscular facilitation.</i>
handy	Placed or occurring conveniently. <i>Found a handy spot for the can opener.</i>
niche	Place something in a niche or recess. <i>He is now a partner at a leading law firm and feels he has found his niche.</i>
obtainable	Capable of being obtained. <i>Savings of up to 50 percent are obtainable.</i>
pacify	Bring peace to (a country or warring factions), especially by the use or threat of military force. <i>The U N troops are working to pacify Bosnia.</i>
pushover	A try in which one side in a scrum pushes the ball over the opponents’ goal line. <i>This is going to be a pushover.</i>
relaxation	An occurrence of control or strength weakening. <i>I guided my patient into a state of hypnotic relaxation.</i>
relieve	Relieve oneself of troubling information. <i>He relieved her of her baggage.</i>
roomy	(especially of accommodation) having plenty of room; spacious. <i>Roomy trousers.</i>

shuck	Remove the shucks from. <i>Shuck corn.</i>
simple	(of a leaf or stem) not divided or branched. <i>A quiet unassuming man with simple tastes.</i>
simplicity	A thing that is plain or uncomplicated. <i>The grandeur and simplicity of Roman architecture.</i>
simplification	Elimination of superfluous details. <i>He is proposing simplification of the planning system.</i>
<u>simplify</u>	Make simpler or easier or reduce in complexity or extent. <i>We had to simplify the instructions.</i>
<u>straightforward</u>	Uncomplicated and easy to do or understand. <i>A straightforward set of instructions.</i>
useful	Having a useful function. <i>Aspirins are useful for headaches.</i>
utilizable	Capable of being put to a profitable or practical use.
well	Often used as a combining form in a good or proper or satisfactory manner or to a high standard good is a nonstandard dialectal variant for well. <i>It would be some time before Sarah was completely well.</i>
