<b>convening</b>	The act of convening.
<b>conventionalism</b>	Orthodoxy as a consequence of being conventional.
<b>conventionality</b>	Orthodoxy as a consequence of being conventional.
<b><u>formula</u></b>	A formulation. <i><b>Formula</b> two.</i>
<b>normal</b>	The usual, typical, or expected state or condition. <i>The service will be back to <b>normal</b> next week.</i>
<b>pattern</b>	Something regarded as a normative example. <i>Make a <b>pattern</b> for the zigzag edge.</i>
<b>rule</b>	A rule describing or prescribing a linguistic practice. <i>Such accidents are the exception rather than the <b>rule</b>.</i>

- *The convention of not naming the main character.*



## Associations of "Conventions" (30 Words)

- aboriginal** An aboriginal inhabitant of a place.  
*The **aboriginal** peoples of Australia.*
- basketry** The craft of basket making.
- confucian** A believer in the teachings of Confucius.
- confucianism** The teachings of Confucius emphasizing love for humanity; high value given to learning and to devotion to family (including ancestors); peace; justice; influenced the traditional culture of China.
- conservatism** The holding of political views that favour free enterprise, private ownership, and socially traditional ideas.  
*Proponents of theological **conservatism**.*
- conservative** (of surgery or medical treatment) intended to control rather than eliminate a condition, with existing tissue preserved as far as possible.  
*The film was not cheap 30 000 is a **conservative** estimate.*

<b>conventional</b>	Represented in simplified or symbolic form. <i>West made a <b>conventional</b> bid showing a hand with at least 5 spades.</i>
<b>cultural</b>	Denoting or deriving from or distinctive of the ways of living built up by a group of people- J.F.Kennedy. <i>Influenced by ethnic and <b>cultural</b> ties.</i>
<b>culture</b>	A preparation of cells obtained by culture. <i>The reason that the agency is doomed to inaction has something to do with the FBI <b>culture</b>.</i>
<b>custom</b>	Made or done to order custom made. <i>A <b>custom</b> guitar.</i>
<b>customary</b>	In accordance with convention or custom. <i>I put the kettle on for our <b>customary</b> cup of coffee.</i>
<b>diehard</b>	A person who strongly opposes change or who continues to support something in spite of opposition. <i>My stepfather was a <b>diehard</b> Republican.</i>
<b>europe</b>	The 2nd smallest continent (actually a vast peninsula of Eurasia); the British use 'Europe' to refer to all of the continent except the British Isles.
<b>feudalism</b>	The dominant social system in medieval Europe, in which the nobility held lands from the Crown in exchange for military service, and vassals were in turn tenants of the nobles, while the peasants (villeins or serfs) were obliged to live on their lord's land and give him homage, labour, and a share of the produce, notionally in exchange for military protection.
<b>folklore</b>	The unwritten lore (stories and proverbs and riddles and songs) of a culture. <i>Hollywood <b>folklore</b>.</i>
<b>hyperborean</b>	Relating to the extreme north.
<b>immemorial</b>	Originating in the distant past; very old. <i>An <b>immemorial</b> custom.</i>
<b>mores</b>	The conventions that embody the fundamental values of a group. <i>An offence against social <b>mores</b>.</i>
<b>morris</b>	United States suffragist in Wyoming (1814-1902).
<b>orthodox</b>	Adhering to what is commonly accepted. <i>A relatively <b>orthodox</b> artist.</i>
<b>orthodoxy</b>	The quality of being orthodox (especially in religion). <i>Writings of unimpeachable <b>orthodoxy</b>.</i>
<b><u>outdated</u></b>	Old; no longer valid or fashionable. <i><b>Outdated</b> equipment.</i>

<b>primeval</b>	(of emotion or behaviour) strongly instinctive and unreasoning. <i>A <b>primeval</b> desire.</i>
<b>regulation</b>	Prescribed by or according to regulation. <i>Planning <b>regulations</b>.</i>
<b>renaissance</b>	The revival of learning and culture.
<b>stodgy</b>	Heavy and starchy and hard to digest. <i><b>Stodgy</b> food.</i>
<b>stuffy</b>	Lacking fresh air. <i>Inhaling vapour from a bowl of hot water may help to clear a <b>stuffy</b> nose.</i>
<b>tradition</b>	(in Christianity) doctrine not explicit in the Bible but held to derive from the oral teaching of Christ and the Apostles. <i>Japan s unique cultural <b>traditions</b>.</i>
<b>traditional</b>	(of jazz) in the style of the early 20th century. <i>The simple security of <b>traditional</b> assumptions has vanished.</i>
<b>tuscan</b>	A dialect of Italian spoken in Tuscany (especially Florence).
