<b><u>metamorphosis</u></b>	The marked and rapid transformation of a larva into an adult that occurs in some animals. <i>His <b>metamorphosis</b> from presidential candidate to talk show host.</i>
<b>pangs of conscience</b>	A sharp spasm of pain.
<b>penitence</b>	The action of feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong; repentance. <i>A public display of <b>penitence</b>.</i>
<b>prickings of conscience</b>	Conformity to one's own sense of right conduct.
<b><u>rebirth</u></b>	A period of new life, growth, or activity; a revival. <i>The <b>rebirth</b> of a defeated nation.</i>
<b>rebuilding</b>	Building again.
<b><u>reconstruction</u></b>	The action or process of reconstructing or being reconstructed. <i>Comparison between the original and the <b>reconstruction</b>.</i>
<b>redesign</b>	The action or process of redesigning something. <i>It was achieved by the <b>redesign</b> of the product.</i>
<b>redevelopment</b>	The action or process of developing something again or differently. <i>The <b>redevelopment</b> of the university website.</i>
<b><u>reformation</u></b>	Improvement (or an intended improvement) in the existing form or condition of institutions or practices etc.; intended to make a striking change for the better in social or political or religious affairs. <i>The <b>reformation</b> of the Senate.</i>
<b><u>regeneration</u></b>	The action or process of regenerating or being regenerated. <i>The <b>regeneration</b> of inner cities.</i>
<b>regret</b>	Used in polite formulas to express apology for or sadness at an occurrence or an inability to accept an invitation. <i>She expressed her <b>regret</b> at Virginia's death.</i>
<b><u>remorse</u></b>	Deep regret or guilt for a wrong committed. <i>They were filled with <b>remorse</b> and shame.</i>
<b>ruefulness</b>	Sadness associated with some wrong done or some disappointment.
<b>sea change</b>	Anything apparently limitless in quantity or volume.

<b>self-condemnation</b>	An admission that you have failed to do or be something you know you should do or be.
<b>self-reproach</b>	A feeling of deep regret (usually for some misdeed). A painful emotion resulting from an awareness of inadequacy or guilt.
<b><u>shame</u></b>	<i>Ignorance of Latin would be a disgrace and a <b>shame</b> to any public man.</i>
<b><u>sorrow</u></b>	An event or circumstance that causes sorrow. <i>He tried to express his <b>sorrow</b> at her loss.</i>
<b>sorrowfulness</b>	A state of gloomy sorrow.
<b>spiritual rebirth</b>	A kind of religious song originated by Blacks in the southern United States.
<b>transfiguration</b>	The Church festival commemorating Christ's transfiguration held on 6 August. <i>In this light the junk undergoes a <b>transfiguration</b> it shines.</i>
<b>transformation</b>	A function that changes the position or direction of the axes of a coordinate system. <i>British society underwent a radical <b>transformation</b>.</i>
<b>transition</b>	A musical passage moving from one key to another. <i>She had been living as a woman for eight years at that point and had completed her <b>transition</b> in 2001.</i>
<b>translation</b>	(mathematics) a transformation in which the origin of the coordinate system is moved to another position but the direction of each axis remains the same. <i>A photograph is a <b>translation</b> of a scene onto a two dimensional surface.</i>
<b>transmutation</b>	The supposed alchemical process of changing base metals into gold. <i>The <b>transmutation</b> of base metals into gold proved to be impossible.</i>
<b>turning</b>	Shavings of wood resulting from turning wood on a lathe. <i>Take the first <b>turning</b> on the right.</i>

<b>compatibility</b>	Capability of existing or performing in harmonious or congenial combination. <i>Software <b>compatibility</b> is another important factor to consider.</i>
<b>compatible</b>	Capable of forming a homogeneous mixture that neither separates nor is altered by chemical interaction. <i>A <b>compatible</b> married couple.</i>
<b>congruous</b>	Suitable or appropriate together. <i>This explanation is <b>congruous</b> with earlier observations.</i>
<b>convert</b>	A person who has been converted to another religious or political belief. <i>Modernization has <b>converted</b> the country from a primitive society to a near industrial one.</i>
<b>defection</b>	The desertion of one's country or cause in favour of an opposing one. <i>His <b>defection</b> from the Labour Party.</i>
<b>defector</b>	A person who abandons their duty (as on a military post). <i>Staff interviewed escapees and <b>defectors</b> to the West.</i>
<b>harmonious</b>	Tuneful; not discordant. <i><b>Harmonious</b> music.</i>
<b><u>heresy</u></b>	A belief that rejects the orthodox tenets of a religion. <i>The <b>heresy</b> of being uncommitted to the right political dogma.</i>
<b>metamorphose</b>	Change or cause to change completely in form or nature. <i>The salesman <b>metamorphosed</b> into an ugly beetle.</i>
<b>proselyte</b>	A new convert; especially a gentile converted to Judaism.
<b>proselytize</b>	Advocate or promote (a belief or course of action). <i>Davis wanted to share his concept and <b>proselytize</b> his ideas.</i>
<b><u>renegade</u></b>	Become a renegade. <i>He was a <b>renegade</b> and social malcontent.</i>
<b>renunciation</b>	Rejecting or disowning or disclaiming as invalid. <i>The life of the Spirit required <b>renunciation</b> of marriage.</i>
<b><u>traitor</u></b>	A person who says one thing and does another. <i>He was a <b>traitor</b> to his own class.</i>



<b>transfigure</b>	Elevate or idealize, in allusion to Christ's transfiguration. <i>The treatment and diet <b>transfigured</b> her into a beautiful young woman.</i>
<b>transformation</b>	A metamorphosis during the life cycle of an animal. <i>British society underwent a radical <b>transformation</b>.</i>
<b>transition</b>	Undergo or cause to undergo a process or period of transition. <i>Once the decision was finally made to <b>transition</b> she was overwhelmed with the support from her immediate family.</i>
<b>transmogrify</b>	Change completely the nature or appearance of. <i>His home was transmogrified into a hippy crash pad.</i>
<b>turncoat</b>	A person who deserts one party or cause in order to join an opposing one. <i>They denounced him as a <b>turncoat</b>.</i>
<b>unreasonable</b>	Beyond normal limits. <i><b>Unreasonable</b> demands.</i>
<b>untenable</b>	Incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This argument is clearly <b>untenable</b>.</i>
<b>variant</b>	(biology) a group of organisms within a species that differ in trivial ways from similar groups. <i>A <b>variant</b> spelling.</i>
