<u>metamorphosis</u>	The marked and rapid transformation of a larva into an adult that occurs in some animals. <i>His metamorphosis from presidential candidate to talk show host.</i>
pangs of conscience	A sharp spasm of pain.
penitence	The action of feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong; repentance. <i>A public display of penitence.</i>
prickings of conscience	Conformity to one's own sense of right conduct.
<u>rebirth</u>	A period of new life, growth, or activity; a revival. <i>The rebirth of a defeated nation.</i>
rebuilding	Building again.
<u>reconstruction</u>	The action or process of reconstructing or being reconstructed. <i>Comparison between the original and the reconstruction.</i>
redesign	The action or process of redesigning something. <i>It was achieved by the redesign of the product.</i>
redevelopment	The action or process of developing something again or differently. <i>The redevelopment of the university website.</i>
<u>reformation</u>	Improvement (or an intended improvement) in the existing form or condition of institutions or practices etc.; intended to make a striking change for the better in social or political or religious affairs. <i>The reformation of the Senate.</i>
<u>regeneration</u>	The action or process of regenerating or being regenerated. <i>The regeneration of inner cities.</i>
regret	Used in polite formulas to express apology for or sadness at an occurrence or an inability to accept an invitation. <i>She expressed her regret at Virginia's death.</i>
<u>remorse</u>	Deep regret or guilt for a wrong committed. <i>They were filled with remorse and shame.</i>
ruefulness	Sadness associated with some wrong done or some disappointment.
sea change	Anything apparently limitless in quantity or volume.

self-condemnation	An admission that you have failed to do or be something you know you should do or be.
self-reproach	A feeling of deep regret (usually for some misdeed). A painful emotion resulting from an awareness of inadequacy or guilt.
<u>shame</u>	<i>Ignorance of Latin would be a disgrace and a shame to any public man.</i>
<u>sorrow</u>	An event or circumstance that causes sorrow. <i>He tried to express his sorrow at her loss.</i>
sorrowfulness	A state of gloomy sorrow.
spiritual rebirth	A kind of religious song originated by Blacks in the southern United States.
transfiguration	The Church festival commemorating Christ's transfiguration held on 6 August. <i>In this light the junk undergoes a transfiguration it shines.</i>
transformation	A function that changes the position or direction of the axes of a coordinate system. <i>British society underwent a radical transformation.</i>
transition	A musical passage moving from one key to another. <i>She had been living as a woman for eight years at that point and had completed her transition in 2001.</i>
translation	(mathematics) a transformation in which the origin of the coordinate system is moved to another position but the direction of each axis remains the same. <i>A photograph is a translation of a scene onto a two dimensional surface.</i>
transmutation	The supposed alchemical process of changing base metals into gold. <i>The transmutation of base metals into gold proved to be impossible.</i>
turning	Shavings of wood resulting from turning wood on a lathe. <i>Take the first turning on the right.</i>

compatible	Capable of forming a homogeneous mixture that neither separates nor is altered by chemical interaction. <i>A compatible married couple.</i>
congruous	Suitable or appropriate together. <i>This explanation is congruous with earlier observations.</i>
convert	A person who has been converted to another religious or political belief. <i>Modernization has converted the country from a primitive society to a near industrial one.</i>
defection	The desertion of one's country or cause in favour of an opposing one. <i>His defection from the Labour Party.</i>
defector	A person who abandons their duty (as on a military post). <i>Staff interviewed escapees and defectors to the West.</i>
harmonious	Tuneful; not discordant. <i>Harmonious music.</i>
<u>heresy</u>	A belief that rejects the orthodox tenets of a religion. <i>The heresy of being uncommitted to the right political dogma.</i>
metamorphose	Change or cause to change completely in form or nature. <i>The salesman metamorphosed into an ugly beetle.</i>
proselyte	A new convert; especially a gentile converted to Judaism.
proselytize	Advocate or promote (a belief or course of action). <i>Davis wanted to share his concept and proselytize his ideas.</i>
<u>renegade</u>	Become a renegade. <i>He was a renegade and social malcontent.</i>
renunciation	Rejecting or disowning or disclaiming as invalid. <i>The life of the Spirit required renunciation of marriage.</i>
<u>traitor</u>	A person who says one thing and does another. <i>He was a traitor to his own class.</i>

transfigure	Elevate or idealize, in allusion to Christ's transfiguration. <i>The treatment and diet transfigured her into a beautiful young woman.</i>
transformation	A metamorphosis during the life cycle of an animal. <i>British society underwent a radical transformation.</i>
transition	Undergo or cause to undergo a process or period of transition. <i>Once the decision was finally made to transition she was overwhelmed with the support from her immediate family.</i>
transmogrify	Change completely the nature or appearance of. <i>His home was transmogrified into a hippy crash pad.</i>
turncoat	A person who deserts one party or cause in order to join an opposing one. <i>They denounced him as a turncoat.</i>
unreasonable	Beyond normal limits. <i>Unreasonable demands.</i>
untenable	Incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This argument is clearly untenable.</i>
variant	(biology) a group of organisms within a species that differ in trivial ways from similar groups. <i>A variant spelling.</i>
