- *Serve as a means for expressing something.*
- *Go or come after and bring or take back.*
- *(of information) make known; pass on.*
- *Communicate (a message or information).*
- *Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission.*
- *Transmit a title or property.*
- *Take something or somebody with oneself somewhere.*
- *Make known; pass on, of information.*

devolve	Be inherited by. <i>The estate devolved to an heir that everybody had assumed to be dead.</i>
<u>emanate</u>	(of a feeling, quality, or sensation) issue or spread out from (a source). <i>He emanated a powerful brooding air.</i>
<u>emit</u>	Produce and discharge (something, especially gas or radiation). <i>She emitted a sound like laughter.</i>
express	Serve as a means for expressing something. <i>With a diplomatic smile she expressed herself more subtly.</i>
exude	(of a place) have a strong atmosphere of. <i>Slime exudes from the fungus.</i>
ferry	Transport by ferry. <i>Ambulances ferryed the injured to hospital.</i>
fetch	Inflict (a blow or slap) on (someone). <i>Kind offers fetched tears from me.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>You'll get used to it.</i>
get across	Communicate with a place or person; establish communication with, as if by telephone.
get over	Reach with a blow or hit in a particular spot.
give the right of	Execute and deliver.
give the title of	Submit for consideration, judgment, or use.
grant	Give (a right, power, property, etc.) formally or legally to. <i>This bill grants us new rights.</i>
hand on	Guide or conduct or usher somewhere.
<u>impart</u>	Bestow (a quality). <i>Impart a new skill to the students.</i>
indicate	Indicate a place direction person or thing either spatially or figuratively. <i>Sales indicate a growing market for such art.</i>
lease	Hold under a lease or rental agreement of goods and services. <i>Land was leased from the Duchy of Cornwall.</i>
make known	Carry out or commit.
move	Move so as to change position perform a nontranslational motion. <i>He moved his hand slightly to the right.</i>
pass on	Allow to go without comment or censure.
project	Draw a projection of. <i>Men may sometimes project their own fears on to women.</i>

put across	Make an investment.
put over	Arrange thoughts, ideas, temporal events.
relay	Control or operate by relay. <i>She intended to relay everything she had learned.</i>
say	Communicate or express nonverbally. <i>The padre finished saying the Nunc Dimittis.</i>
send	Send a message or letter. <i>Send me your latest results.</i>
send forth	Assign to a station.
shift	Make a shift in or exchange of. <i>Shift one's attention.</i>
shuttle	Transport in a shuttle. <i>The river taxi shuttled employees between the newspaper's offices and the capital.</i>
take	Take into consideration for exemplifying purposes. <i>I'll take a pound of that sausage.</i>
tell	Let something be known. <i>You can tell they're in love.</i>
transfer	Transfer somebody to a different position or location of work. <i>A transferred use of the Old English noun.</i>
transmit	Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission. <i>Sexually transmitted diseases.</i>
transport	Transport commercially. <i>The bulk of freight traffic was transported by lorry.</i>

- *She conveyed the message to me.*
- *The real virtues and diversity of America had never been conveyed in the movies.*
- *No application for registration is required when the property is conveyed following a court order.*
- *Mr Harvey and his daughter have asked me to convey their very kind regards.*

communicate	(of two people) be able to share and understand each other's thoughts and feelings. <i>The prisoner was forbidden to communicate with his family.</i>
conveyance	The legal process of transferring property from one owner to another. <i>A busy centre for the conveyance of agricultural produce from the Billingshurst area.</i>
<u>dispatch</u>	Kill without delay. <i>The traitor was dispatched by the conspirators.</i>
<u>dock</u>	A device in which a laptop smartphone or other mobile device may be placed for charging providing access to a power supply and to peripheral devices or auxiliary features a docking station. <i>The ship docked at Southampton.</i>
email	Send an email to someone. <i>Reading email has become the first task of the morning.</i>
embarkation	The act of passengers and crew getting aboard a ship or aircraft.
ferry	Convey in a ferry or other ship or boat especially across a short stretch of water. <i>Ambulances ferried the injured to hospital.</i>
ferryboat	A boat that transports people or vehicles across a body of water and operates on a regular schedule.
ferryman	A man who operates a ferry.
fetch	The action of fetching. <i>The land could fetch over a million pounds.</i>
<u>interact</u>	Act in such a way as to have an effect on each other. <i>People who interact daily.</i>
mail	A vehicle such as a train carrying mail. <i>Your mail is on the table.</i>
mailing	Mail sent by a sender at one time. <i>The postmark indicates the time of mailing.</i>
<u>messenger</u>	Send a document or package by messenger. <i>Nitric oxide is an intercellular messenger.</i>
passenger	A member of a team or group who does far less effective work than the other members. <i>He had been a superlative teacher but his health was gone and he was now a passenger.</i>
pier	A platform on pillars projecting from the shore into the sea, typically incorporating entertainment arcades and places to eat.

port	Drink port. <i>The big ship was slowly porting.</i>
post	Publicize with or as if with a poster. <i>He set a row of posts in the ground and strung barbwire between them.</i>
reassign	Transfer somebody to a different position or location of work. <i>He ordered the ministries to reassign the vehicles.</i>
recipient	A person who receives something. <i>The recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize.</i>
relay	A signal or broadcast transmitted by a relay. <i>A 550 metre relay race.</i>
send	Send a message or letter. <i>It s the spectacle and music that send us not the words.</i>
sender	Someone who transmits a message. <i>Senders of unwanted emails.</i>
spam	Unwanted or intrusive advertising on the internet. <i>An autogenerated spam website.</i>
transfer	Transferring ownership. <i>Transfer the packet from his trouser pockets to a pocket in his jacket.</i>
transmit	Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission. <i>Sexually transmitted diseases.</i>
transport	The action of transporting something or the state of being transported. <i>The bulk of freight traffic was transported by lorry.</i>
transportation	The United States federal department that institutes and coordinates national transportation programs created in 1966. <i>The sentence was one of transportation for life.</i>
