## Convict as a Noun

### Definitions of "Convict" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “convict” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A person serving a sentence in a jail or prison.*
- *A person found guilty of a criminal offence and serving a sentence of imprisonment.*
- *A person who has been convicted of a criminal offense.*



## Synonyms of "Convict" as a noun (5 Words)

- con** A swindle in which you cheat at gambling or persuade a person to buy worthless property.  
*The Charter is a glossy public relations **con**.*
- inmate** One of several resident of a dwelling (especially someone confined to a prison or hospital).  
***Inmates** of the Louisiana State Penitentiary.*
- prisoner** A person who is confined especially a prisoner of war.  
*He s become a **prisoner** of the publicity he s generated.*
- yard bird** A unit of volume (as for sand or gravel).
- yardbird** A new military recruit, especially one assigned to menial tasks.



## Usage Examples of "Convict" as a noun

- *Two escaped convicts kidnapped them at gunpoint.*



## Convict as a Verb

### Definitions of "Convict" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "convict" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Declare (someone) to be guilty of a criminal offence by the verdict of a jury or the decision of a judge in a court of law.*
- *Find or declare guilty.*



## Synonyms of "Convict" as a verb (3 Words)

- declare guilty** Designate (a trump suit or no-trump) with the final bid of a hand.
- find guilty** Accept and make use of one's personality, abilities, and situation.
- pronounce guilty** Pronounce judgment on.



### **Usage Examples of "Convict" as a verb**

- *The thieves were convicted of the robbery.*
- *Twelve people were convicted for their part in an attempted coup.*
- *The man was convicted of fraud and sentenced.*



## Associations of "Convict" (30 Words)

- accused** A defendant in a criminal proceeding.  
*Two of the **accused** were sentenced to thirteen years in prison.*
- apprehend** Take into custody.  
*We enter a field of vision we could not otherwise **apprehend**.*
- capture** A person or thing that has been captured.  
*The star **captured** a comet.*
- confession** The religious body or Church sharing a confession of faith.  
*His words are a political **confession** of faith.*
- conviction** (criminal law) a final judgment of guilty in a criminal case and the punishment that is imposed.  
*She takes pride in stating her political **convictions**.*

<b>criminal</b>	Relating to crime as opposed to civil matters. <i>A <b>criminal</b> court.</i>
<b>culprit</b>	Someone who perpetrates wrongdoing. <i>Low level ozone pollution is the real <b>culprit</b>.</i>
<b>delinquent</b>	A delinquent person. <i><b>Delinquent</b> teenagers.</i>
<b>felon</b>	A person who has committed a felony. <i>The <b>felon</b> undermining hand of dark corruption.</i>
<b>guilty</b>	Culpable of or responsible for a specified wrongdoing. <i><b>Guilty</b> of murder.</i>
<b>impenitent</b>	Impervious to moral persuasion. <i><b>Impenitent</b> elitists.</i>
<b>indictment</b>	The action of indicting or being indicted. <i>The book is an <b>indictment</b> of modern philosophy.</i>
<b>inmate</b>	A person serving a sentence in a jail or prison. <i><b>Inmates</b> of the Louisiana State Penitentiary.</i>
<b>intern</b>	Work as an intern. <i>During WW II Japanese were <b>interned</b> in camps in the West.</i>
<b>murderer</b>	A criminal who commits homicide (who performs the unlawful premeditated killing of another human being). <i>Convicted <b>murderers</b>.</i>
<b>offender</b>	A person or thing that does something wrong or causes problems. <i>An institution for young <b>offenders</b>.</i>
<b>parole</b>	Release a prisoner on parole. <i>He committed a burglary while on <b>parole</b>.</i>
<b>penance</b>	Impose a penance on. <i>He had done public <b>penance</b> for those hasty words.</i>
<b>penitence</b>	Remorse for your past conduct. <i>A public display of <b>penitence</b>.</i>
<b>penitent</b>	Feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong; repentant. <i>A <b>penitent</b> expression.</i>
<b>penitential</b>	Showing or constituting penance. <i>Wrote a <b>penitential</b> letter apologizing for her hasty words.</i>
<b>penitentiary</b>	Showing or constituting penance. <i><b>Penitentiary</b> institutions.</i>
<b>perpetrator</b>	A person who carries out a harmful, illegal, or immoral act. <i>The <b>perpetrators</b> of this horrific crime must be brought to justice.</i>



- prison** A prisonlike situation a place of seeming confinement.  
*Both men were sent to **prison**.*
- prisoner** A person who is confined especially a prisoner of war.  
*She may have been held **prisoner** before being killed.*
- repent** Feel or express sincere regret or remorse about one's wrongdoing or sin.  
*Marian came to **repent** her hasty judgement.*
- repentance** The action of repenting; sincere regret or remorse.  
*Each person who turns to God in genuine **repentance** and faith will be saved.*
- repentant** Expressing or feeling sincere regret and remorse; remorseful.  
*He is truly **repentant** for his incredible naivety and stupidity.*
- sinner** A person who sins (without repenting).  
*God forgives repentant **sinner**s.*
- unrepentant** Stubbornly persistent in wrongdoing.  
*He was **unrepentant** and said that his comments were completely accurate.*
