Convict as a Noun

Definitions of "Convict" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “convict” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A person serving a sentence in a jail or prison.*
- *A person found guilty of a criminal offence and serving a sentence of imprisonment.*
- *A person who has been convicted of a criminal offense.*



Synonyms of "Convict" as a noun (5 Words)

- con** A swindle in which you cheat at gambling or persuade a person to buy worthless property.
*The Charter is a glossy public relations **con**.*
- inmate** One of several resident of a dwelling (especially someone confined to a prison or hospital).
***Inmates** of the Louisiana State Penitentiary.*
- prisoner** A person who is confined especially a prisoner of war.
*He s become a **prisoner** of the publicity he s generated.*
- yard bird** A unit of volume (as for sand or gravel).
- yardbird** A new military recruit, especially one assigned to menial tasks.



Usage Examples of "Convict" as a noun

- *Two escaped convicts kidnapped them at gunpoint.*



Convict as a Verb

Definitions of "Convict" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "convict" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Declare (someone) to be guilty of a criminal offence by the verdict of a jury or the decision of a judge in a court of law.*
- *Find or declare guilty.*



Synonyms of "Convict" as a verb (3 Words)

- declare guilty** Designate (a trump suit or no-trump) with the final bid of a hand.
- find guilty** Accept and make use of one's personality, abilities, and situation.
- pronounce guilty** Pronounce judgment on.



Usage Examples of "Convict" as a verb

- *The thieves were convicted of the robbery.*
- *Twelve people were convicted for their part in an attempted coup.*
- *The man was convicted of fraud and sentenced.*



Associations of "Convict" (30 Words)

- accused** A defendant in a criminal proceeding.
*Two of the **accused** were sentenced to thirteen years in prison.*
- apprehend** Take into custody.
*We enter a field of vision we could not otherwise **apprehend**.*
- capture** A person or thing that has been captured.
*The star **captured** a comet.*
- confession** The religious body or Church sharing a confession of faith.
*His words are a political **confession** of faith.*
- conviction** (criminal law) a final judgment of guilty in a criminal case and the punishment that is imposed.
*She takes pride in stating her political **convictions**.*

criminal	Relating to crime as opposed to civil matters. <i>A criminal court.</i>
culprit	Someone who perpetrates wrongdoing. <i>Low level ozone pollution is the real culprit.</i>
delinquent	A delinquent person. <i>Delinquent teenagers.</i>
felon	A person who has committed a felony. <i>The felon undermining hand of dark corruption.</i>
guilty	Culpable of or responsible for a specified wrongdoing. <i>Guilty of murder.</i>
impenitent	Impervious to moral persuasion. <i>Impenitent elitists.</i>
indictment	The action of indicting or being indicted. <i>The book is an indictment of modern philosophy.</i>
inmate	A person serving a sentence in a jail or prison. <i>Inmates of the Louisiana State Penitentiary.</i>
intern	Work as an intern. <i>During WW II Japanese were interned in camps in the West.</i>
murderer	A criminal who commits homicide (who performs the unlawful premeditated killing of another human being). <i>Convicted murderers.</i>
offender	A person or thing that does something wrong or causes problems. <i>An institution for young offenders.</i>
parole	Release a prisoner on parole. <i>He committed a burglary while on parole.</i>
penance	Impose a penance on. <i>He had done public penance for those hasty words.</i>
penitence	Remorse for your past conduct. <i>A public display of penitence.</i>
penitent	Feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong; repentant. <i>A penitent expression.</i>
penitential	Showing or constituting penance. <i>Wrote a penitential letter apologizing for her hasty words.</i>
penitentiary	Showing or constituting penance. <i>Penitentiary institutions.</i>
perpetrator	A person who carries out a harmful, illegal, or immoral act. <i>The perpetrators of this horrific crime must be brought to justice.</i>

<u>prison</u>	A prisonlike situation a place of seeming confinement. <i>Both men were sent to prison.</i>
<u>prisoner</u>	A person who is confined especially a prisoner of war. <i>She may have been held prisoner before being killed.</i>
repent	Feel or express sincere regret or remorse about one's wrongdoing or sin. <i>Marian came to repent her hasty judgement.</i>
<u>repentance</u>	The action of repenting; sincere regret or remorse. <i>Each person who turns to God in genuine repentance and faith will be saved.</i>
repentant	Expressing or feeling sincere regret and remorse; remorseful. <i>He is truly repentant for his incredible naivety and stupidity.</i>
<u>sinner</u>	A person who sins (without repenting). <i>God forgives repentant sinners.</i>
unrepentant	Stubbornly persistent in wrongdoing. <i>He was unrepentant and said that his comments were completely accurate.</i>
