
Conviction as a Noun

Definitions of "Conviction" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "conviction" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- The quality of showing that one is firmly convinced of what one believes or says.
- An unshakable belief in something without need for proof or evidence.
- (criminal law) a final judgment of guilty in a criminal case and the punishment that is imposed.

- A formal declaration by the verdict of a jury or the decision of a judge in a court of law that someone is guilty of a criminal offence.
- A firmly held belief or opinion.





Synonyms of "Conviction" as a noun (21 Words)

article of faith	A determiner that may indicate the specificity of reference of a noun phrase.
assurance	A statement intended to inspire confidence. Assurance of faith depends on our trust in God.
belief	Something one accepts as true or real; a firmly held opinion. <i>The medieval system of fervent religious</i> belief .
<u>certainty</u>	The state of being certain. <i>He was expected to be a certainty for a gold medal.</i>
certitude	Something that someone firmly believes is true. The question may never be answered with certitude .



condemnation	The act of condemning (as land forfeited for public use) or judging to be unfit for use (as a food product or an unsafe building. <i>There was strong international condemnation of the attack.</i>
confidence	A state of confident hopefulness that events will be favorable. I have confidence in our team.
declaration of guilt	The highest bid becomes the contract setting the number of tricks that the bidder must make.
idea	The content of cognition; the main thing you are thinking about. I took a job with the idea of getting some money together.
judgement	The act of judging or assessing a person or situation or event. The events of last week are a judgement on us for our sinful ways.
judgment of conviction	An opinion formed by judging something.
opinion	A belief or sentiment shared by most people; the voice of the people. My opinion differs from yours.
persuasion	The action or process of persuading someone or of being persuaded to do or believe something. <i>Half a dozen gents of British persuasion.</i>
position	A condition or position in which you find yourself. The party s position on abortion.
positiveness	The quality of being encouraging or promising of a successful outcome.
pronouncement of guil	t An authoritative declaration.
sentence	The punishment assigned to a defendant found guilty by a court, or fixed by law for a particular offence. Slander of an official carried an eight year prison sentence .
<u>stance</u>	Standing posture. She altered her stance resting all her weight on one leg.
<u>sureness</u>	The quality of being steady and unfailing. <i>Sureness</i> of hand.
thought	The organized beliefs of a period or group or individual. I asked him if he had any thought s on how it had happened.
view	Purpose the phrase with a view to means with the intention of or for the purpose of. <i>He tried to get a better view of it.</i>





Usage Examples of "Conviction" as a noun

- His conviction that the death was no accident was stronger.
- She takes pride in stating her political convictions.
- She had a previous conviction for a similar offence.
- The conviction came as no surprise.
- She had been speaking for some five minutes with force and conviction.

<u>acquittal</u>	A judgment of not guilty. The women felt their chances of acquittal were poor.
<u>arraign</u>	Call before a court to answer an indictment. Her sister was arraign ed on charges of attempted murder.
captivity	The state of being a slave. He was held in captivity until he died.
capture	A person or thing that has been captured. The militia capture d the castle.
committal	The official act of consigning a person to confinement (as in a prison or mental hospital. <i>Committal proceedings.</i>



condemnation	(criminal law) a final judgment of guilty in a criminal case and the punishment that is imposed. <i>His uncompromising condemnation of racism.</i>
<u>convict</u>	A person who has been convicted of a criminal offense. Twelve people were convict ed for their part in an attempted coup.
criminal	Guilty of crime or serious offense. <i>Criminal</i> abuse.
<u>culprit</u>	A person who is responsible for a crime or other misdeed. Low level ozone pollution is the real culprit .
detention	A punishment in which a student must stay at school after others have gone home. <i>His detention</i> was politically motivated.
<u>dungeon</u>	Imprison someone in a dungeon.
felon	A person who has committed a felony. The felon undermining hand of dark corruption.
felony	A crime regarded in the US and many other judicial systems as more serious than a misdemeanour. <i>An accusation of felony.</i>
guilty	Justly chargeable with a particular fault or error. She was guilty of a serious error of judgement.
<u>imprisonment</u>	The act of confining someone in a prison (or as if in a prison. The imprisonment of captured soldiers.
incarcerate	Lock up or confine, in or as in a jail. Many are incarcerate d for property offences.
indictment	A formal charge or accusation of a serious crime. An indictment for conspiracy.
inmate	A patient who is residing in the hospital where he is being treated. Inmate s of the Louisiana State Penitentiary.
jail	Put someone in jail. A jail sentence.
misbehave	(of a machine) fail to function correctly. Josh misbehave d pushing his food off the table.
<u>murderer</u>	A person who commits murder. Convicted murderer s.
offender	A person or thing that does something wrong or causes problems. An institution for young offender s.



parole	Release a criminal from detention and place him on parole. A good many French officers had been living on parole in Melrose.
penitentiary	(in the Roman Catholic Church) a priest appointed to administer penance. <i>Penitentiary</i> institutions.
perjury	The offence of wilfully telling an untruth or making a misrepresentation under oath. <i>He claimed two witnesses at his trial had committed perjury.</i>
<u>perpetrator</u>	Someone who perpetrates wrongdoing. The perpetrator s of this horrific crime must be brought to justice.
<u>prison</u>	A prisonlike situation a place of seeming confinement. <i>Both men were sent to prison.</i>
<u>prisoner</u>	A person who is confined especially a prisoner of war. A prisoner serving a life sentence.
<u>sinner</u>	A person who sins (without repenting. <i>God forgives repentant sinners.</i>
turpitude	Depraved or wicked behaviour or character. <i>Acts of moral turpitude</i> .
