## Associations of "Coo" (30 Words)

<b>beak</b>	A beaklike tapering tip on certain plant structures. <i>A parent bird with a caterpillar in its <b>beak</b>.</i>
<b>bird</b>	The flesh of a bird or fowl wild or domestic used as food. <i>Carve the <b>bird</b> and arrange on a warmed serving plate.</i>
<b>blackbird</b>	A black or Polynesian captive on a slave ship.
<b>bluebird</b>	Fruit-eating mostly brilliant blue songbird of the East Indies. <i>A week of <b>bluebird</b> skies.</i>
<b>dove</b>	Flesh of a pigeon suitable for roasting or braising flesh of a dove young squab may be broiled. <i>He was the cabinet s leading <b>dove</b> the only minister to advocate peace talks.</i>
<b>eagle</b>	A figure of an eagle especially as a symbol of the US. <i>He <b>eagled</b> the last to share fourth place.</i>
<b>falcon</b>	A female falcon especially a peregrine. <i>The tribes like to <b>falcon</b> in the desert.</i>
<b>finch</b>	Any of numerous small songbirds with short stout bills adapted for crushing seeds.
<b>hawk</b>	Hunt with hawks. <i>The tribes like to <b>hawk</b> in the desert.</i>
<b>jackdaw</b>	Common black-and-grey Eurasian bird noted for thievery.
<b>lark</b>	Used in names of birds of other families that are similar to the lark e g meadowlark.
<b><u>mimic</u></b>	An animal or plant that mimics another. <i>The drug ephedrine <b>mimics</b> noradrenaline.</i>
<b>mockingbird</b>	A long-tailed songbird with greyish plumage, found mainly in tropical America and noted for its mimicry of the calls and songs of other birds.
<b>nonviolent</b>	Abstaining (on principle) from the use of violence.

<b>owl</b>	Nocturnal bird of prey with hawk-like beak and claws and large head with front-facing eyes.
<b><u>pacifist</u></b>	Holding the belief that war and violence are unjustifiable. <i>She was a committed <b>pacifist</b> all her life.</i>
<b>parrot</b>	Repeat mindlessly. <i>Encouraging students to <b>parrot</b> back information.</i>
<b>peaceable</b>	Inclined to avoid conflict or dissent. <i><b>Peaceable</b> demonstrations for democratic reform.</i>
<b>peacetime</b>	A period when a country is not at war. <i>In <b>peacetime</b> regiments were billeted upon towns and villages.</i>
<b>peck</b>	Eat by pecking at like a bird. <i>She <b>pecked</b> him on the cheek.</i>
<b>pigeon</b>	A pigeon descended from the wild rock dove kept for racing showing and carrying messages and common as a feral bird in towns.
<b>quail</b>	Flesh of quail suitable for roasting or broiling if young otherwise must be braised.
<b>robin</b>	Any of a number of birds that resemble the European robin especially in having a red breast.
<b>skylark</b>	A common Eurasian and North African lark of farmland and open country, noted for its prolonged song given in hovering flight. <i>He was <b>skylarking</b> with a friend when he fell into a pile of boxes.</i>
<b>sparrow</b>	Any of a number of birds that resemble true sparrows in size or colour.
<b>turkey</b>	The flesh of the turkey as food. <i>The first experiment was a real <b>turkey</b>.</i>
<b>volant</b>	(of an animal) able to fly or glide. <i>Newly <b>volant</b> young.</i>
<b>vulture</b>	Someone who attacks in search of booty. <i>Rock musicians are set upon by <b>vulture</b> managers.</i>
<b>winged</b>	Having wings or as if having wings of a specified kind. <i>The <b>winged</b> feet of Mercury.</i>
<b>woodcock</b>	A woodland bird of the sandpiper family, with a long bill, brown camouflaged plumage, and a distinctive display flight.
