| beak | A beaklike tapering tip on certain plant structures. <i>A parent bird with a caterpillar in its beak.</i> |
| bird | The flesh of a bird or fowl wild or domestic used as food. <i>Carve the bird and arrange on a warmed serving plate.</i> |
| blackbird | A black or Polynesian captive on a slave ship. |
| bluebird | Fruit-eating mostly brilliant blue songbird of the East Indies. <i>A week of bluebird skies.</i> |
| dove | Flesh of a pigeon suitable for roasting or braising flesh of a dove young squab may be broiled. <i>He was the cabinet s leading dove the only minister to advocate peace talks.</i> |
| eagle | A figure of an eagle especially as a symbol of the US. <i>He eagled the last to share fourth place.</i> |
| falcon | A female falcon especially a peregrine. <i>The tribes like to falcon in the desert.</i> |
| finch | Any of numerous small songbirds with short stout bills adapted for crushing seeds. |
| hawk | Hunt with hawks. <i>The tribes like to hawk in the desert.</i> |
| jackdaw | Common black-and-grey Eurasian bird noted for thievery. |
| lark | Used in names of birds of other families that are similar to the lark e g meadowlark. |
| <u>mimic</u> | An animal or plant that mimics another. <i>The drug ephedrine mimics noradrenaline.</i> |
| mockingbird | A long-tailed songbird with greyish plumage, found mainly in tropical America and noted for its mimicry of the calls and songs of other birds. |
| nonviolent | Abstaining (on principle) from the use of violence. |

| owl | Nocturnal bird of prey with hawk-like beak and claws and large head with front-facing eyes. |
| <u>pacifist</u> | Holding the belief that war and violence are unjustifiable. <i>She was a committed pacifist all her life.</i> |
| parrot | Repeat mindlessly. <i>Encouraging students to parrot back information.</i> |
| peaceable | Inclined to avoid conflict or dissent. <i>Peaceable demonstrations for democratic reform.</i> |
| peacetime | A period when a country is not at war. <i>In peacetime regiments were billeted upon towns and villages.</i> |
| peck | Eat by pecking at like a bird. <i>She pecked him on the cheek.</i> |
| pigeon | A pigeon descended from the wild rock dove kept for racing showing and carrying messages and common as a feral bird in towns. |
| quail | Flesh of quail suitable for roasting or broiling if young otherwise must be braised. |
| robin | Any of a number of birds that resemble the European robin especially in having a red breast. |
| skylark | A common Eurasian and North African lark of farmland and open country, noted for its prolonged song given in hovering flight. <i>He was skylarking with a friend when he fell into a pile of boxes.</i> |
| sparrow | Any of a number of birds that resemble true sparrows in size or colour. |
| turkey | The flesh of the turkey as food. <i>The first experiment was a real turkey.</i> |
| volant | (of an animal) able to fly or glide. <i>Newly volant young.</i> |
| vulture | Someone who attacks in search of booty. <i>Rock musicians are set upon by vulture managers.</i> |
| winged | Having wings or as if having wings of a specified kind. <i>The winged feet of Mercury.</i> |
| woodcock | A woodland bird of the sandpiper family, with a long bill, brown camouflaged plumage, and a distinctive display flight. |
