<b>coordinated</b>	Intentionally matched. She was usually good with her hands and well <b>coordinated</b> .
<b>eager to help</b>	Having or showing keen interest or intense desire or impatient expectancy.
<b>eager to please</b>	Having or showing keen interest or intense desire or impatient expectancy.
<b>glad to be of assistance</b>	Cheerful and bright.
<b>harmonious</b>	Tuneful; not discordant. The tailored clothes were <b>harmonious</b> with her military bearing.

<b>mass</b>	Formed of separate units gathered into a mass or whole. A <b>mass</b> exodus of refugees.
<b>mutual</b>	Held in common by two or more parties. <b>Mutual</b> respect.
<b>obliging</b>	Willing to do a service or kindness; helpful. The <b>obliging</b> waiter was in no hurry for us to leave.

**shared**

Distributed in portions (often equal) on the basis of a plan or purpose.

*I lived in a **shared** house.*

**unanimous**

In complete agreement.

*The decision to go ahead was **unanimous**.*

**unified**

Formed or united into a whole.

*A **unified** utility system.*

**united**

Characterized by unity; being or joined into a single entity.

*Women acting together in a **united** way.*

- accomplice** A person who helps another commit a crime.

- alliance** The act of forming an alliance or confederation.  
*His party is in **alliance** with the Greens.*
- allied** Of or relating to or denoting the Allies in World War II.  
***Allied** species.*
- ally** A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose.  
*He was forced to dismiss his closest political **ally**.*
- association** The state of occurring with something else; co-occurrence.

<b>collaborative</b>	Produced by or involving two or more parties working together. <i><b>Collaborative</b> research.</i>
<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>Oxygen <b>combines</b> with haemoglobin.</i>
<b><u>communal</u></b>	Shared by all members of a community; for common use. <i><b>Communal</b> living.</i>
<b>concerted</b>	Jointly arranged or carried out; coordinated. <i>You must make a <b>concerted</b> effort to curb this.</i>
<b>concurrent</b>	Agreeing or consistent. <i>There are three <b>concurrent</b> art fairs around the city.</i>
<b>concurrently</b>	At the same time; simultaneously. <i>Journal articles published <b>concurrently</b> with the exhibition.</i>
<b><u>confederate</u></b>	A person who joins with another in carrying out some plan (especially an unethical or illegal plan). <i>Some local groups united to form <b>confederate</b> councils.</i>
<b><u>consolidate</u></b>	Unite into one. <i><b>Consolidate</b> fibers into boards.</i>
<b>cooperate</b>	Work together on a common enterprise or project. <i>The leaders promised to <b>cooperate</b> in ending the civil war.</i>
<b>cooperation</b>	The formation and operation of cooperatives. <i>Their <b>cooperation</b> with us was essential for the success of our mission.</i>
<b><u>equalize</u></b>	Make equal, uniform, corresponding, or matching. <i>The purpose is to <b>equalize</b> the workload among tutors.</i>
<b><u>equate</u></b>	Consider (one thing) to be the same as or equivalent to another. <i>You cannot <b>equate</b> success in financial matters with greed.</i>
<b>federate</b>	Relating to a federated state or organization. <i>The country was <b>federated</b> after the civil war.</i>
<b><u>friendship</u></b>	A state of mutual trust and support between allied nations. <i>This is an ideal group for finding support and <b>friendship</b>.</i>
<b><u>implicate</u></b>	Bring into intimate and incriminating connection. <i>He is <b>implicated</b> in the scheme to defraud the government.</i>
<b>joint</b>	Fit as if by joints. <i>A <b>joint</b> session of Congress.</i>
<b><u>liability</u></b>	A thing for which someone is responsible, especially an amount of money owed. <i>She said the party had become a <b>liability</b> to green politics.</i>

- merge** Combine or cause to combine to form a single entity.  
*The cells **merge**.*
- simultaneous** Occurring or operating at the same time.  
*A **simultaneous** withdrawal of troops.*
- sync** Make synchronous and adjust in time or manner.  
*Images flash on to your screen in **sync** with the music.*
- together** With or in proximity to another person or people.  
*Taken **together** these measures would significantly improve people s chances of surviving a coach crash.*
- united** Used in names of soccer and other sports teams formed by amalgamation.  
*Women acting together in a **united** way.*
