bountiful	Producing in abundance. <i>Bountiful compliments.</i>
bumper	Exceptionally large, fine, or successful. <i>A bumper crop.</i>
considerable	Large or relatively large in number or amount or extent or degree. <i>Snow was a limited but still considerable novelist.</i>
effusive	Showing or expressing gratitude, pleasure, or approval in an unrestrained or heartfelt manner. <i>Effusive volcanism.</i>
excessive	Beyond normal limits. <i>Excessive charges.</i>
extensive	Broad in scope or content- T.G.Winner. <i>An extensive garden.</i>
extravagant	Recklessly wasteful. <i>Extravagant praise.</i>
full	Constituting the full quantity or extent complete. <i>She was full of confidence.</i>
fulsome	Unpleasantly and excessively suave or ingratiating in manner or speech. <i>The press are embarrassingly fulsome in their appreciation.</i>
generous	(of a thing) larger or more plentiful than is usual or necessary. <i>A generous portion.</i>
gushing	Flowing profusely. <i>Gushing praise.</i>
immoderate	Beyond reasonable limits. <i>Immoderate laughter.</i>
inordinate	Unusually or disproportionately large; excessive. <i>A book of inordinate length.</i>
lavish	(of a person) very generous or extravagant. <i>The critics were lavish in their praise.</i>
liberal	(in a political context) favouring policies that are socially progressive and promote social welfare. <i>She is under attack from the right wing for making her own liberal political views known.</i>
overflowing	Covered with water. <i>An overflowing river swamped dozens of villages.</i>
plenteous	Affording an abundant supply. <i>A plenteous grape harvest.</i>

plentiful	Existing in or yielding great quantities; abundant. <i>A plentiful year.</i>
profuse	Produced or growing in extreme abundance. <i>They are profuse in hospitality.</i>
prolific	Bearing in abundance especially offspring. <i>In captivity tigers are prolific breeders.</i>
rich	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. <i>Rich countries can afford to spend money on the environment.</i>
substantial	Of good quality and condition; solidly built. <i>The first meal of the day should be substantial.</i>
superabundant	Most excessively abundant.
teeming	Full of people or things; crowded. <i>She walked through the teeming streets.</i>
unrestrained	Marked by uncontrolled excitement or emotion. <i>Unrestrained laughter.</i>
unstinting	Very generous. <i>He was unstinting in his praise.</i>
voluminous	(of clothes) very loose or full; having much fabric. <i>A voluminous purple cloak.</i>

exceeding	Extremely exceedingly. <i>A night of exceeding darkness.</i>
galore	Existing in abundance. <i>Whiskey galore.</i>
large	A garment size for a large person. <i>The concert attracted large crowds.</i>
lavishly	In a wasteful manner. <i>Members of the band spent lavishly on their families.</i>
lot	A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use. <i>He played tennis a lot last year.</i>
luxurious	Displaying luxury and furnishing gratification to the senses. <i>A luxurious wallow in a scented bath.</i>
plenitude	An abundance. <i>The plenitude of the Pope's powers.</i>
plenteous	Plentiful. <i>The meal was astonishingly plenteous.</i>
plentiful	Affording an abundant supply. <i>Food is plentiful.</i>
plentitude	A full supply.
plenty	A situation in which food and other necessities are available in sufficiently large quantities. <i>She has plenty more ideas.</i>
profuse	(especially of something offered or discharged) very plentiful; abundant. <i>I offered my profuse apologies.</i>

prosperity	The state of being prosperous. <i>A long period of peace and prosperity.</i>
replete	Deeply filled or permeated. <i>Sensational popular fiction replete with adultery and sudden death.</i>
stacked	(of a woman) having large breasts. <i>You were playing against a stacked deck.</i>
sufficient	Of a quantity that can fulfill a need or requirement but without being abundant. <i>Sufficient food.</i>
sybarite	A person addicted to luxury and pleasures of the senses.
voluminous	Marked by repeated turns and bends. <i>He sank into a voluminous armchair.</i>
voluptuary	A person addicted to luxury and pleasures of the senses. <i>A voluptuary decade when high living was in style.</i>
voluptuous	Relating to or characterized by luxury or sensual pleasure. <i>A voluptuous woman.</i>
