abounding	Existing in abundance. <i>Abounding</i> confidence.
abundant	Present in great quantity. <i>The riverbanks were abundant in beautiful wild plants.</i>
ample	Large and accommodating. She stood with her hands on her ample hips.



bountiful	Producing in abundance. Bountiful compliments.
bumper	Exceptionally large, fine, or successful. A bumper crop.
considerable	Large or relatively large in number or amount or extent or degree. Snow was a limited but still considerable novelist.
effusive	Showing or expressing gratitude, pleasure, or approval in an unrestrained or heartfelt manner. <i>Effusive</i> volcanism.
excessive	Beyond normal limits. <i>Excessive</i> charges.
extensive	Broad in scope or content- T.G.Winner. An extensive garden.
extravagant	Recklessly wasteful. <i>Extravagant</i> praise.
full	Constituting the full quantity or extent complete. <i>She was full of confidence.</i>
<u>fulsome</u>	Unpleasantly and excessively suave or ingratiating in manner or speech. The press are embarrassingly fulsome in their appreciation.
generous	(of a thing) larger or more plentiful than is usual or necessary. A generous portion.
gushing	Flowing profusely. <i>Gushing</i> praise.
immoderate	Beyond reasonable limits. <i>Immoderate</i> laughter.
<u>inordinate</u>	Unusually or disproportionately large; excessive. A book of inordinate length.
<u>lavish</u>	(of a person) very generous or extravagant. The critics were lavish in their praise.
<u>liberal</u>	(in a political context) favouring policies that are socially progressive and promote social welfare. She is under attack from the right wing for making her own liberal political views known.
overflowing	Covered with water. An overflowing river swamped dozens of villages.
plenteous	Affording an abundant supply. A plenteous grape harvest.



plentiful	Existing in or yielding great quantities; abundant. A plentiful year.
<u>profuse</u>	Produced or growing in extreme abundance. They are profuse in hospitality.
<u>prolific</u>	Bearing in abundance especially offspring. In captivity tigers are prolific breeders.
rich	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. Rich countries can afford to spend money on the environment.
<u>substantial</u>	Of good quality and condition; solidly built. The first meal of the day should be substantial .
superabundant	Most excessively abundant.
teeming	Full of people or things; crowded. She walked through the teeming streets.
<u>unrestrained</u>	Marked by uncontrolled excitement or emotion. Unrestrained laughter.
unstinting	Very generous. He was unstinting in his praise.
voluminous	(of clothes) very loose or full; having much fabric. A voluminous purple cloak.

<u>affluent</u>	An affluent person a person who is financially well off. The affluent societies of the western world.
ample	Large and accommodating. She stood with her hands on her ample hips.



armful	As much as a person can hold in both arms. Most of us will end up with armful s of stuff we do not need.
bountiful	Large in quantity; abundant. <i>Bountiful</i> compliments.
bountifulness	The property of copious abundance.
<u>bounty</u>	A sum paid by the state to encourage trade. They do not qualify for their bounty because they have spent insufficient time at summer camp.
copiously	In an expansive or wide-ranging way. I was drinking copiously .
enough	An adequate quantity a quantity that is large enough to achieve a purpose. <i>Food enough</i> .
exceeding	Extremely exceedingly. A night of exceeding darkness.
galore	Existing in abundance. Whiskey galore .
large	A garment size for a large person. The concert attracted large crowds.
lavishly	In a wasteful manner. Members of the band spent lavishly on their families.
lot	A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use. <i>He played tennis a lot last year.</i>
<u>luxurious</u>	Displaying luxury and furnishing gratification to the senses. A luxurious wallow in a scented bath.
plenitude	An abundance. The plenitude of the Pope s powers.
plenteous	Plentiful. The meal was astonishingly plenteous .
plentiful	Affording an abundant supply. Food is plentiful .
plentitude	A full supply.
<u>plenty</u>	A situation in which food and other necessities are available in sufficiently large quantities. <i>She has plenty more ideas.</i>
<u>profuse</u>	(especially of something offered or discharged) very plentiful; abundant. I offered my profuse apologies.



prosperity	The state of being prosperous. A long period of peace and prosperity .
replete	Deeply filled or permeated. Sensational popular fiction replete with adultery and sudden death.
<u>stacked</u>	(of a woman) having large breasts. You were playing against a stacked deck.
<u>sufficient</u>	Of a quantity that can fulfill a need or requirement but without being abundant. <i>Sufficient</i> food.
sybarite	A person addicted to luxury and pleasures of the senses.
voluminous	Marked by repeated turns and bends. <i>He sank into a voluminous armchair.</i>
voluptuary	A person addicted to luxury and pleasures of the senses. A voluptuary decade when high living was in style.
<u>voluptuous</u>	Relating to or characterized by luxury or sensual pleasure. A voluptuous woman.
